Curator as a Noun

Definitions of "Curator" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “curator” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person who selects acts to perform at a music festival.*
- *The custodian of a collection (as a museum or library).*
- *A keeper or custodian of a museum or other collection.*



Synonyms of "Curator" as a noun (6 Words)

caretaker	An official who performs the duties of an office temporarily. <i>Two lions escaped from their cage and killed their caretaker.</i> The custodian of a collection (as a museum or library).
conservator	<i>The wall decoration was discovered by conservators repairing damage caused by a leaking roof.</i>
custodian	A person who has responsibility for taking care of or protecting something. <i>The custodian of the Great Seal in Canada is always the Secretary of State.</i>
guardian	A person who is legally responsible for the care of someone who is unable to manage their own affairs, especially a child whose parents have died. <i>Self appointed guardians of public morality.</i>
keeper	A ring worn to keep a more valuable one on the finger. <i>This disc is a keeper and one that belongs on every serious DVD collector's shelf.</i>
steward	A person responsible for supplies of food to a college, club, or other institution. <i>Farmers pride themselves on being stewards of the countryside.</i>

Associations of "Curator" (30 Words)

archive	Put into an archive. <i>The entire directory will be archived.</i>
archives	Collection of records especially about an institution.
archivist	A person who maintains and is in charge of archives.
assist	Act as an assistant in a subordinate or supportive function. <i>Two midwives who assisted at a water birth.</i>
assistant	A person who contributes to the fulfillment of a need or furtherance of an effort or purpose. <i>An assistant manager.</i>
attest	Enrol as ready for military service. <i>His numerous drawings of babies attest to his fascination with them.</i>
bibliophile	Someone who loves (and usually collects) books.

<u>corroborate</u>	Give evidence for. <i>The witness had corroborated the boy's account of the attack.</i>
corroborative	Serving to support or corroborate.
<u>custodian</u>	A person who has responsibility for taking care of or protecting something. <i>The custodian of the Great Seal in Canada is always the Secretary of State.</i>
demonstrate	Take part in a public demonstration. <i>Their shameful silence demonstrates their ineptitude.</i>
depository	A place where things are stored. <i>Irish libraries became depositories for material from all over the world.</i>
easel	A wooden frame for holding an artist's work while it is being painted or drawn.
<u>espouse</u>	Marry. <i>The candidate espouses Republican ideals.</i>
exhibit	An exhibition. <i>No foreign painters were exhibited.</i>
<u>exhibition</u>	A collection of things (goods or works of art etc.) for public display. <i>An exhibition of French sculpture.</i>
<u>gallery</u>	Narrow recessed balcony area along an upper floor on the interior of a building; usually marked by a colonnade. <i>An art gallery.</i>
<u>janitor</u>	A person employed to look after a building; a caretaker.
<u>librarian</u>	A person in charge of or assisting in a library.
<u>museum</u>	A building in which objects of historical, scientific, artistic, or cultural interest are stored and exhibited. <i>A museum curator.</i>
repository	A person to whom a secret is entrusted. <i>His mind was a rich repository of the past.</i>
showcase	A place or occasion for presenting something favourably to general attention. <i>The gallery will provide a showcase for Scotland's young photographers.</i>
stand	Withstand the force of something. <i>His traditionalist stand.</i>
steward	Manage or look after (another's property). <i>Farmers pride themselves on being stewards of the countryside.</i>
<u>substantiate</u>	Provide evidence to support or prove the truth of. <i>Our ideas must be substantiated into actions.</i>

support	A musical part vocal or instrumental that supports or provides background for other musical parts. <i>The proposal was supported by many delegates.</i>
supporter	Someone who supports or champions something. <i>All their supporters came out for the game.</i>
testify	Give testimony in a court of law. <i>The bleak lines testify to inner torment.</i>
validate	Recognize or affirm the validity or worth of (a person or their feelings or opinions); cause (a person) to feel valued or worthwhile. <i>Validate a ticket.</i>
verify	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>Verify a claim.</i>
