## Curator as a Noun

### Definitions of "Curator" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “curator” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person who selects acts to perform at a music festival.*
- *The custodian of a collection (as a museum or library).*
- *A keeper or custodian of a museum or other collection.*



## Synonyms of "Curator" as a noun (6 Words)

<b>caretaker</b>	An official who performs the duties of an office temporarily. <i>Two lions escaped from their cage and killed their <b>caretaker</b>.</i> The custodian of a collection (as a museum or library).
<b>conservator</b>	<i>The wall decoration was discovered by <b>conservators</b> repairing damage caused by a leaking roof.</i>
<b>custodian</b>	A person who has responsibility for taking care of or protecting something. <i>The <b>custodian</b> of the Great Seal in Canada is always the Secretary of State.</i>
<b>guardian</b>	A person who is legally responsible for the care of someone who is unable to manage their own affairs, especially a child whose parents have died. <i>Self appointed <b>guardians</b> of public morality.</i>
<b>keeper</b>	A ring worn to keep a more valuable one on the finger. <i>This disc is a <b>keeper</b> and one that belongs on every serious DVD collector's shelf.</i>
<b>steward</b>	A person responsible for supplies of food to a college, club, or other institution. <i>Farmers pride themselves on being <b>stewards</b> of the countryside.</i>

## Associations of "Curator" (30 Words)

<b>archive</b>	Put into an archive. <i>The entire directory will be <b>archived</b>.</i>
<b>archives</b>	Collection of records especially about an institution.
<b>archivist</b>	A person who maintains and is in charge of archives.
<b>assist</b>	Act as an assistant in a subordinate or supportive function. <i>Two midwives who <b>assisted</b> at a water birth.</i>
<b>assistant</b>	A person who contributes to the fulfillment of a need or furtherance of an effort or purpose. <i>An <b>assistant</b> manager.</i>
<b>attest</b>	Enrol as ready for military service. <i>His numerous drawings of babies <b>attest</b> to his fascination with them.</i>
<b>bibliophile</b>	Someone who loves (and usually collects) books.

<b>corroborate</b>	Give evidence for. <i>The witness had <b>corroborated</b> the boy's account of the attack.</i>
<b>corroborative</b>	Serving to support or corroborate.
<b>custodian</b>	A person who has responsibility for taking care of or protecting something. <i>The <b>custodian</b> of the Great Seal in Canada is always the Secretary of State.</i>
<b>demonstrate</b>	Take part in a public demonstration. <i>Their shameful silence <b>demonstrates</b> their ineptitude.</i>
<b>depository</b>	A place where things are stored. <i>Irish libraries became depositories for material from all over the world.</i>
<b>easel</b>	A wooden frame for holding an artist's work while it is being painted or drawn.
<b>espouse</b>	Marry. <i>The candidate <b>espouses</b> Republican ideals.</i>
<b>exhibit</b>	An exhibition. <i>No foreign painters were <b>exhibited</b>.</i>
<b>exhibition</b>	A collection of things (goods or works of art etc.) for public display. <i>An <b>exhibition</b> of French sculpture.</i>
<b>gallery</b>	Narrow recessed balcony area along an upper floor on the interior of a building; usually marked by a colonnade. <i>An art <b>gallery</b>.</i>
<b>janitor</b>	A person employed to look after a building; a caretaker.
<b>librarian</b>	A person in charge of or assisting in a library.
<b>museum</b>	A building in which objects of historical, scientific, artistic, or cultural interest are stored and exhibited. <i>A <b>museum</b> curator.</i>
<b>repository</b>	A person to whom a secret is entrusted. <i>His mind was a rich <b>repository</b> of the past.</i>
<b>showcase</b>	A place or occasion for presenting something favourably to general attention. <i>The gallery will provide a <b>showcase</b> for Scotland's young photographers.</i>
<b>stand</b>	Withstand the force of something. <i>His traditionalist <b>stand</b>.</i>
<b>steward</b>	Manage or look after (another's property). <i>Farmers pride themselves on being <b>stewards</b> of the countryside.</i>
<b>substantiate</b>	Provide evidence to support or prove the truth of. <i>Our ideas must be <b>substantiated</b> into actions.</i>

<b>support</b>	A musical part vocal or instrumental that supports or provides background for other musical parts. <i>The proposal was <b>supported</b> by many delegates.</i>
<b>supporter</b>	Someone who supports or champions something. <i>All their <b>supporters</b> came out for the game.</i>
<b>testify</b>	Give testimony in a court of law. <i>The bleak lines <b>testify</b> to inner torment.</i>
<b>validate</b>	Recognize or affirm the validity or worth of (a person or their feelings or opinions); cause (a person) to feel valued or worthwhile. <i><b>Validate</b> a ticket.</i>
<b>verify</b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i><b>Verify</b> a claim.</i>
