## Dabble as a Verb

### Definitions of "Dabble" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dabble” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Bob forward and under so as to feed off the bottom of a body of water.*
- *Take part in an activity in a casual or superficial way.*
- *Immerse (one's hands or feet) partially in water and move them around gently.*
- *(of a duck or other waterbird) move the bill around in shallow water while feeding.*
- *Dip a foot or hand briefly into a liquid.*
- *Work with in an amateurish manner.*
- *Play in or as if in water, as of small children.*

<b>dally with</b>	Behave carelessly or indifferently.
<b><u>dampen</u></b>	Lessen in force or effect. <i>Slider switches on the mixers can <b>dampen</b> the drums.</i>
<b>dip</b>	Dip into a liquid while eating. <i>The president's popularity has <b>dipped</b>.</i>
<b>dip into</b>	Dip into a liquid.
<b>fiddle with</b>	Play around with or alter or falsify, usually secretly or dishonestly.
<b>flirt with</b>	Behave carelessly or indifferently.
<b>have a smattering of</b>	Get something; come into possession of.
<b>immerse</b>	Cause to be immersed. <i>He <b>immersed</b> himself into his studies.</i>
<b>moisten</b>	Moisten with fine drops. <i>The dew <b>moistened</b> the meadows.</i>

<b>paddle</b>	Beat someone with a paddle as a punishment. <i>He was teaching trainees to <b>paddle</b> canoes.</i>
<b>play around</b>	Replay (as a melody).
<b>play with</b>	Perform on a stage or theater.
<b>potter about with</b>	Move around aimlessly.
<b>potter around with</b>	Work lightly.
<b>potter round with</b>	Move around aimlessly.
<b>scratch the surface of</b>	Cut the surface of; wear away the surface of.
<b>smatter</b>	Speak with spotty or superficial knowledge. <i>She <b>smatters</b> Russian.</i>
<b>splash</b>	Make wet by splashing. <i>A tear fell and <b>splashed</b> on to the pillow.</i>
<b>splash around</b>	Make a splashing sound.
<b>tinker with</b>	Try to fix or mend.
<b>toy with</b>	Engage in an activity as if it were a game rather than take it seriously.
<a href="#"><u>trail</u></a>	Draw or be drawn along behind someone or something. <i>The bank's plans have been extensively <b>trailed</b>.</i>
<b>trifle with</b>	Waste time; spend one's time idly or inefficiently.
<a href="#"><u>wet</u></a>	Cause to become wet. <i>She said she'd <b>wet</b> the tea immediately because they must be parched.</i>

<b>always</b>	Without variation or change, in every case. <i>He <b>always</b> arrives on time.</i>
<b><u>amplitude</u></b>	The maximum difference of an alternating electric current or potential from the average value. <i>The detection of signals only a few microvolts in <b>amplitude</b>.</i>
<b>carelessly</b>	In a rakish manner. <i>Roadsides are full of litter thrown <b>carelessly</b> by passers by.</i>
<b>dip</b>	A candle that is made by repeated dipping in a pool of wax or tallow. <i>The big hedge at the bottom of the <b>dip</b>.</i>
<b><u>ever</u></b>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Don t you <b>ever</b> regret giving up all that money.</i>
<b><u>frequency</u></b>	The number of occurrences within a given time period. <i>An increase in the <b>frequency</b> of accidents due to increased overtime.</i>
<b><u>frequently</u></b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>They go abroad <b>frequently</b>.</i>



<b><u>hardly</u></b>	Only with great difficulty. <i>I can <b>hardly</b> hear what she is saying.</i>
<b><u>incidence</u></b>	The relative frequency of occurrence of something. <i>An increased <b>incidence</b> of cancer.</i>
<b>infrequently</b>	Not many times. <i>A storage area for <b>infrequently</b> used items.</i>
<b>intermittently</b>	In an intermittent manner. <i>He has worked <b>intermittently</b> in a variety of jobs.</i>
<b>modulated</b>	Changed or adjusted in pitch, tone, or volume.
<b>occasional</b>	Occurring, appearing, or done infrequently and irregularly. <i>An <b>occasional</b> table.</i>
<b><u>occasionally</u></b>	At infrequent or irregular intervals; now and then. <i>Very <b>occasionally</b> the condition can result in death.</i>
<b>oft</b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>We <b>often</b> met over a cup of coffee.</i>
<b>often</b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>Vocabulary <b>often</b> reflects social standing.</i>
<b>oftentimes</b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>I would <b>oftentimes</b> go there.</i>
<b>periodically</b>	At regularly occurring intervals. <i>I will <b>periodically</b> check on your progress.</i>
<b><u>quite</u></b>	To a degree (not used with a negative). <i>You've no intention of coming back I'm <b>quite</b> sorry but no I have not.</i>
<b><u>rare</u></b>	(of an event, situation, or condition) not occurring very often. <i>Total eclipses are <b>rare</b> events.</i>
<b><u>rarely</u></b>	To an unusual degree; exceptionally. <i>I <b>rarely</b> drive above 50 mph.</i>
<b>rareness</b>	Noteworthy scarcity.
<b><u>rarity</u></b>	Something unusual — perhaps worthy of collecting. <i>The <b>rarity</b> of the condition.</i>
<b><u>recidivism</u></b>	The tendency of a convicted criminal to reoffend. <i>The prison has succeeded in reducing <b>recidivism</b>.</i>
<b><u>seldom</u></b>	Not common; infrequent. <i>Islay is <b>seldom</b> visited by tourists.</i>
<b>smatter</b>	To talk foolishly. <i>She <b>smatters</b> Russian.</i>
