Synonyms of "Daily" as a noun (11 Words)

attendant	An event or situation that happens at the same time as or in connection with another. <i>He had become a regular attendant at chapel.</i>
<u>bulletin</u>	A short official statement or broadcast summary of news.
<u>digest</u>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <i>A digest of their findings.</i>
gazette	An official publication containing lists of government appointments and promotions and other public notices. <i>An announcement in Tuesday's London Gazette will make clear that he is being stripped of the honour.</i>

magazine	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>He works for a magazine.</i>
newsletter	A bulletin issued periodically to the members of a society or other organization.
periodical	A magazine or newspaper published at regular intervals.
professional organ	An authority qualified to teach apprentices.
<u>publication</u>	The act of issuing printed materials. <i>Scientific publications.</i>
retainer	A reduced rent paid to retain accommodation during a period of non-occupancy. <i>A guitar string retainer.</i>
review	A subsequent examination of a patient for the purpose of monitoring earlier treatment. <i>Cue and review which plays the tape backwards or forwards at high speed.</i>



Usage Examples of "Daily" as a noun

- *As a co-producer he has to view the dailies.*
- *The trial was reported in all the popular dailies.*

Definitions of "Daily" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "daily" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Done, produced, or occurring every day or every weekday.*
- *Of or belonging to or occurring every day.*
- *Appropriate for ordinary or routine occasions.*
- *Relating to the period of a single day.*



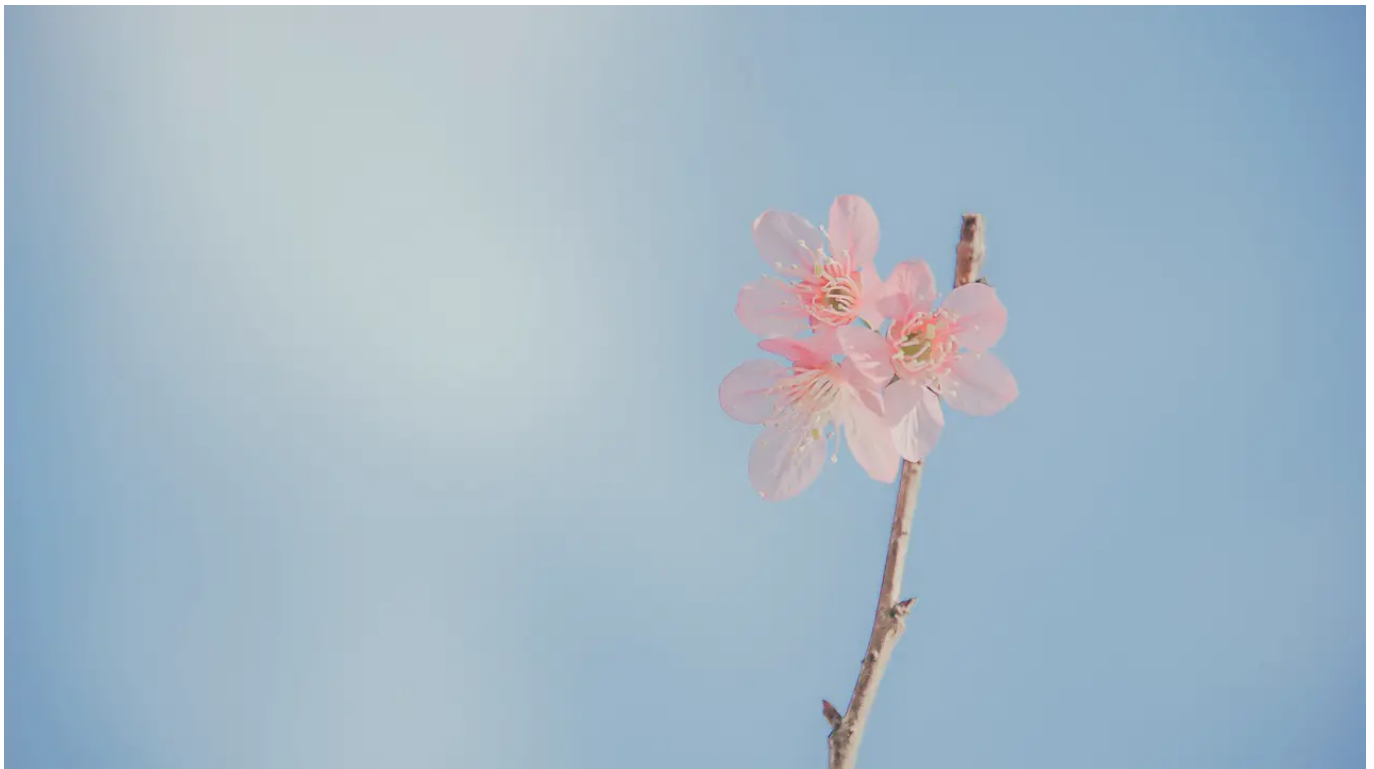
Synonyms of "Daily" as an adjective (4 Words)

- casual** Not showing effort or strain.
*Information collected by **casual** methods and in their spare time.*
- done every day** Cooked until ready to serve.
- everyday** Happening or used every day; daily.
*The familiar **everyday** world.*
- quotidian** Of or occurring every day; daily.
*His story is an aching human one mired in **quotidian** details.*

Associations of "Daily" (30 Words)

almanac	An annual publication containing tabular information in a particular field or fields arranged according to the calendar of a given year.
<u>annual</u>	An annual plant. <i>The sponsored walk became an annual event.</i>
annually	By the year; every year (usually with reference to a sum of money paid or received). <i>They travel to China annually.</i>
<u>biannual</u>	Occurring or payable twice each year. <i>The biannual meeting of the planning committee.</i>

biennial	A plant having a life cycle that normally takes two seasons from germination to death to complete flowering biennials usually bloom and fruit in the second season. <i>A biennial life cycle.</i>
bimonthly	Every two months. <i>Bimonthly visits.</i>
biweekly	A periodical that appears every two weeks or twice a week. <i>She followed her doctor's instructions to undergo health checks biweekly.</i>
calendar	Enter something in a calendar or timetable. <i>It was at their discretion whether to index or calendar the records.</i>
commute	A regular journey of some distance to and from your place of work. <i>There is standing room only on the high speed commute.</i>
cyclical	Recurring in cycles. <i>The cyclical nature of the cement industry.</i>
day-to-day	The time after sunrise and before sunset while it is light outside.
diurnal	(of animals) active in the daytime. <i>Diurnal and nocturnal offices.</i>
frequent	Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. <i>Pubs frequented by soldiers.</i>
monthly	A magazine that is published once a month. <i>Monthly payments.</i>
perennial	A perennial plant. <i>Spring streams rise from perennial springs.</i>
periodic	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>Periodic feelings of anxiety.</i>
periodical	Happening or recurring at regular intervals. <i>Britain's best periodical art magazine.</i>
periodically	From time to time; occasionally. <i>The newsletter is sent out periodically to update members.</i>
periodicity	The quality or character of being periodic; the tendency to recur at intervals. <i>The periodicity of the sunspot cycle.</i>
quarterly	Of or relating to or consisting of a quarter. <i>Interest is compounded quarterly.</i>
regular	A soldier in the regular army. <i>His regular calls on his customers.</i>
regularity	A property of polygons: the property of having equal sides and equal angles. <i>He came to see her with increasing regularity.</i>

<u>regularly</u>	In a regular manner. A regularly updated news page.
routine	Organize according to a routine. All had been routined with smoothness.
triennial	Recurring every three years. The triennial meeting of the Association.
twice	Two times; on two occasions. The tablets should be taken twice a day.
<u>weekly</u>	A periodical that is published every week (or 52 issues per year). Weekly paper.
workday	A day on which one works. Saturdays were workdays for him.
<u>year</u>	The period of 365 days or 366 days in leap years starting from the first of January used for reckoning time in ordinary circumstances. The Muslim year .
<u>yearly</u>	Once a year or every year. Rent was paid yearly .
