### **Definitions of "Damning" as an adjective**

- condemnatory** Containing or imposing condemnation or censure.  
*A **condemnatory** decree.*
- condemning** Containing or imposing condemnation or censure.
- damnatory** Expletives used informally as intensifiers.  
*The case against you was most **damnatory**.*
- full of reproof** Containing as much or as many as is possible or normal.
- incriminating** Making someone appear guilty of a crime or wrongdoing.  
***Incriminating** evidence.*
- reproachful** Expressing reproof or reproach especially as a corrective.  
*She gave him a **reproachful** look.*
- reproving** Expressing reproof or reproach especially as a corrective.  
*A **reproving** glance.*



## Usage Examples of "Damning" as an adjective

- *A damning indictment of the government's record.*
- *I was innocent but the evidence was damning.*

<b>absurdity</b>	The quality or state of being ridiculous or wildly unreasonable. <i>Duncan laughed at the <b>absurdity</b> of the situation.</i>
<b><u>anathema</u></b>	Something or someone that one vehemently dislikes. <i>He is an <b>anathema</b> to me.</i>
<b>anathematize</b>	Curse; condemn. <i>He <b>anathematized</b> them as bloody scroungers.</i>
<b>awfully</b>	Very much. <i>I m <b>awfully</b> sorry to bother you so late.</i>
<b>billingsgate</b>	Foul-mouthed or obscene abuse.
<b>blamed</b>	Expletives used informally as intensifiers. <i>It s a <b>blamed</b> shame.</i>
<b>blaspheme</b>	Speak irreverently about God or sacred things. <i><b>Blaspheme</b> God.</i>
<b>chthonic</b>	Dwelling beneath the surface of the earth. <i>A <b>chthonic</b> deity.</i>
<b>curse</b>	Invoke or use a curse against. <i>A witch put a <b>curse</b> on his whole family.</i>
<b><u>cursed</u></b>	Deserving a curse; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>Villagers shun the area believing it to be <b>cursed</b>.</i>
<b><u>diabolical</u></b>	Showing the cunning or ingenuity or wickedness typical of a devil. <i><b>Diabolical</b> sorcerers under the influence of devils.</i>
<b>execration</b>	An appeal to some supernatural power to inflict evil on someone or some group.
<b>expletive</b>	A word or phrase conveying no independent meaning but added to fill out a sentence or metrical line. <i>He was greeted by a stream of <b>expletives</b>.</i>
<b>fool</b>	Make a fool or dupe of. <i>He is the <b>fool</b> of circumstances.</i>
<b>horrible</b>	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>A <b>horrible</b> massacre.</i>
<b>imprecation</b>	The act of calling down a curse that invokes evil (and usually serves as an insult). <i>I pushed my way through screaming <b>imprecations</b>.</i>

<b>indecent</b>	Not conforming with generally accepted standards of behaviour, especially in relation to sexual matters. <i><b>Indecent</b> acts.</i>
<b>infernal</b>	Being of the underworld. <i>An <b>infernal</b> nuisance.</i>
<b>jibe</b>	Make insulting or mocking remarks; jeer. <i>A <b>jibe</b> at his old rivals.</i>
<b>malediction</b>	A magical word or phrase uttered with the intention of bringing about evil; a curse. <i>He muttered <b>maledictions</b> to himself as he trod the stone passages.</i>
<b>obscene</b>	Designed to incite to indecency or lust-Margaret Mead. <i>Using animals skins for fur coats is <b>obscene</b>.</i>
<b>stygian</b>	Dark and dismal as of the rivers Acheron and Styx in Hades.
<b>swearword</b>	Profane or obscene expression usually of surprise or anger.
<b>term</b>	Give a descriptive name to call by a specified term. <i>The musical <b>term</b> leitmotiv.</i>
<b>terrible</b>	Extreme in degree or extent or amount or impact. <i><b>Terrible</b> handwriting.</i>
<b><u>terribly</u></b>	In a terrible manner. <i>I m <b>terribly</b> sorry.</i>
<b><u>tirade</u></b>	A speech of violent denunciation. <i>A <b>tirade</b> of abuse.</i>
<b>underworld</b>	The mythical abode of the dead, imagined as being under the earth. <i>A man reputed to be a godfather of the Glasgow <b>underworld</b>.</i>
<b>word</b>	A secret word or phrase known only to a restricted group. <i>I don t like the <b>word</b> unofficial.</i>
