<u>adventurer</u>	A person who enjoys taking risks. <i>Every year adventurers attempt the Canol Trail using all manner of conveyances.</i>
exhibitionist	Someone with a compulsive desire to expose the genitals. <i>I am something of an exhibitionist.</i>
harum-scarum	A reckless impetuous irresponsible person.
hothead	A reckless impetuous irresponsible person. <i>A few hotheads urged their comrades to break the police roadblock.</i>
<u>lunatic</u>	A reckless impetuous irresponsible person. <i>This lunatic just accelerated out from the side of the road.</i>
madcap	A reckless impetuous irresponsible person.
swashbuckler	A film or book portraying daring, romantic adventures. <i>He was an explorer and something of a swashbuckler.</i>

Synonyms of "Daredevil" as an adjective (13 Words)

<u>adventurous</u>	Full of excitement. <i>An adventurous traveller.</i>
audacious	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i>Audacious explorers.</i>
bold	Very steep; having a prominent and almost vertical front. <i>A bold speech.</i>
<u>brave</u>	Brightly colored and showy. <i>A brave soldier.</i>
courageous	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching. <i>A frank courageous heart triumphed over pain.</i>
daring	Causing outrage or surprise by being boldly unconventional. <i>A daring crime.</i>

dauntless	Showing fearlessness and determination. <i>Dauntless bravery.</i>
<u>fearless</u>	Oblivious of dangers or perils or calmly resolute in facing them. <i>A fearless crusader for animal rights.</i>
heedless	Marked by or paying little heed or attention—Franklin D. Roosevelt. <i>The heedless generosity and the spasmodic extravagance of persons used to large fortunes.</i>
<u>intrepid</u>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i>Intrepid pioneers.</i>
madcap	Characterized by undue haste and lack of thought or deliberation; (‘brainish’ is archaic). <i>A madcap scheme.</i>
temerarious	Reckless; rash. <i>A young officer of a brave and even temerarious disposition.</i>
undaunted	Not intimidated or discouraged by difficulty, danger, or disappointment. <i>Undaunted in the face of death.</i>

adventurous	Involving new ideas or methods. <i>An adventurous traveller.</i>
audacity	Aggressive boldness or unmitigated effrontery. <i>He had the audacity to question my decision.</i>
bold	A bold typeface or letter. <i>A bold adventure.</i>
boldly	With boldness, in a bold manner. <i>You will have our support as long as you fight boldly against corruption.</i>
boldness	Confidence to an impudent or presumptuous degree. <i>They had the boldness to mock a man who had served his country.</i>
brave	People who are brave. <i>These six men braved the rough seas.</i>
bravely	In a courageous manner. <i>He has been hailed a hero after he bravely tackled a thief at a hotel.</i>
bravery	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>Perhaps I ll get a medal for bravery.</i>
courage	Strength in the face of pain or grief. <i>He fought his illness with great courage.</i>
courageous	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching. <i>Her courageous human rights work.</i>
daringly	In an adventurous manner.
dauntless	Showing fearlessness and determination. <i>Dauntless bravery.</i>
gall	The contents of the gall bladder bile proverbial for its bitterness. <i>The trade in animal parts such as bear galls.</i>
gallant	(of a man) flirt with (a woman). <i>Mowbray was gallanting the Polish lady.</i>
gallantry	Gallant actions or words. <i>A medal awarded for outstanding gallantry during the raid.</i>
gutsy	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited. <i>A gutsy red wine.</i>

hardy	(of a plant) able to survive outside during winter. <i>Strawberries are hardy and easy to grow.</i>
<u>heroic</u>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i>The England star is getting special treatment because of his World Cup heroics.</i>
<u>intrepid</u>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i>Intrepid pioneers.</i>
<u>lunatic</u>	A person who is mentally ill (not in technical use). <i>He would be asked to acquiesce in some lunatic scheme.</i>
madcap	An eccentric or reckless person. <i>Madcap escapades.</i>
plucky	Showing courage. <i>The plucky youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
robust	Strong enough to withstand or overcome intellectual challenges or adversity. <i>The robust flavor of fresh brewed coffee.</i>
<u>stalwart</u>	Loyal, reliable, and hard-working. <i>He was of stalwart build.</i>
stouthearted	Used especially of persons. <i>A stouthearted fellow who had an active career in the army.</i>
unflinching	Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty. <i>He has shown unflinching determination throughout the campaign.</i>
<u>valiant</u>	Possessing or showing courage or determination. <i>A valiant attempt to prevent the hijack.</i>
<u>valor</u>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for valor.</i>
valorous	Having or showing valor. <i>Valorous deeds on the field of honour.</i>
venturous	Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. <i>Five venturous young men.</i>
