- bold** Very steep; having a prominent and almost vertical front.

- brave** Brightly colored and showy.  
*A **brave** soldier.*
- courageous** Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching.  
*A frank **courageous** heart triumphed over pain.*
- daring** Causing outrage or surprise by being boldly unconventional.

<b>dauntless</b>	Showing fearlessness and determination. <i><b>Dauntless</b> bravery.</i>
<b>fearless</b>	Oblivious of dangers or perils or calmly resolute in facing them. <i>A <b>fearless</b> crusader for animal rights.</i>
<b>heedless</b>	Marked by or paying little heed or attention—Franklin D. Roosevelt. <i>The <b>heedless</b> generosity and the spasmodic extravagance of persons used to large fortunes.</i>
<b>intrepid</b>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Intrepid</b> pioneers.</i>
<b>madcap</b>	Characterized by undue haste and lack of thought or deliberation; (‘brainish’ is archaic). <i>A <b>madcap</b> scheme.</i>
<b>temerarious</b>	Reckless; rash. <i>A young officer of a brave and even <b>temerarious</b> disposition.</i>
<b>undaunted</b>	Not intimidated or discouraged by difficulty, danger, or disappointment. <i><b>Undaunted</b> in the face of death.</i>

<b>adventurous</b>	Involving new ideas or methods. <i>An <b>adventurous</b> traveller.</i>
<b>audacity</b>	Aggressive boldness or unmitigated effrontery. <i>He had the <b>audacity</b> to question my decision.</i>
<b>bold</b>	A bold typeface or letter. <i>A <b>bold</b> adventure.</i>
<b>boldly</b>	With boldness, in a bold manner. <i>You will have our support as long as you fight <b>boldly</b> against corruption.</i>
<b>boldness</b>	Confidence to an impudent or presumptuous degree. <i>They had the <b>boldness</b> to mock a man who had served his country.</i>
<b>brave</b>	People who are brave. <i>These six men <b>braved</b> the rough seas.</i>
<b>bravely</b>	In a courageous manner. <i>He has been hailed a hero after he <b>bravely</b> tackled a thief at a hotel.</i>
<b>bravery</b>	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>Perhaps I'll get a medal for <b>bravery</b>.</i>
<b>courage</b>	Strength in the face of pain or grief. <i>He fought his illness with great <b>courage</b>.</i>
<b>courageous</b>	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching. <i>Her <b>courageous</b> human rights work.</i>
<b>daringly</b>	In an adventurous manner.
<b>dauntless</b>	Showing fearlessness and determination. <i><b>Dauntless</b> bravery.</i>
<b>gall</b>	The contents of the gall bladder bile proverbial for its bitterness. <i>The trade in animal parts such as bear <b>galls</b>.</i>
<b>gallant</b>	(of a man) flirt with (a woman). <i>Mowbray was <b>gallanting</b> the Polish lady.</i>
<b>gallantry</b>	Gallant actions or words. <i>A medal awarded for outstanding <b>gallantry</b> during the raid.</i>
<b>gutsy</b>	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited. <i>A <b>gutsy</b> red wine.</i>

<b>hardy</b>	(of a plant) able to survive outside during winter. <i>Strawberries are <b>hardy</b> and easy to grow.</i>
<b>heroic</b>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i>The England star is getting special treatment because of his World Cup <b>heroics</b>.</i>
<b>intrepid</b>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Intrepid</b> pioneers.</i>
<b>lunatic</b>	A person who is mentally ill (not in technical use). <i>He would be asked to acquiesce in some <b>lunatic</b> scheme.</i>
<b>madcap</b>	An eccentric or reckless person. <i><b>Madcap</b> escapades.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Showing courage. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<b>robust</b>	Strong enough to withstand or overcome intellectual challenges or adversity. <i>The <b>robust</b> flavor of fresh brewed coffee.</i>
<b>stalwart</b>	Loyal, reliable, and hard-working. <i>He was of <b>stalwart</b> build.</i>
<b>stouthearted</b>	Used especially of persons. <i>A <b>stouthearted</b> fellow who had an active career in the army.</i>
<b>unflinching</b>	Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty. <i>He has shown <b>unflinching</b> determination throughout the campaign.</i>
<b>valiant</b>	Possessing or showing courage or determination. <i>A <b>valiant</b> attempt to prevent the hijack.</i>
<b>valor</b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for <b>valor</b>.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Having or showing valor. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>
<b>venturous</b>	Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. <i>Five <b>venturous</b> young men.</i>
