Definitions of "Dashed" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dashed” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a line on a piece of paper) composed of dashes.*
- *Having gaps or spaces.*
- *Used for emphasis.*



Synonyms of "Dashed" as an adjective (8 Words)

- accursed** Used to express strong dislike of or anger at someone or something.
*This **accursed** country.*
- damnable** Very bad or unpleasant.
*Her **damnable** pride.*
- dotted** (of a note or rest) written with a dot after it to show that the time value is increased by half.
*Sign on the **dotted** line.*
- horrible** Provoking horror.
*The tea tasted **horrible**.*
- rotten** Damaged by decay; hence unsound and useless.
***Rotten** eggs.*
- wretched** Morally reprehensible.
*She disliked the **wretched** man intensely.*



Usage Examples of "Dashed" as an adjective

- *It's a dashed shame.*
- *She was dashed rude.*



Associations of "Dashed" (30 Words)

- bustle** Cause to move hurriedly in a particular direction.
*The cheerleaders **bustled** about excitingly before their performance.*
- celerity** A rate that is rapid.
A small pointed missile with a feather or plastic flight used in the game of darts.
- dart** *The classroom was littered with paper **darts**.*
- fast** Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause- Campaign song for William Henry Harrison.
*A wide **fast** road.*
- fastness** The quality of being fixed in place as by some firm attachment.
*A remote Himalayan mountain **fastness**.*
- flirt** A person who habitually flirts.
*Jim was an outrageous **flirt**.*

flit	Move house or leave one's home, typically secretly so as to escape creditors or obligations. <i>The hummingbird flitted among the branches.</i>
<u>haste</u>	The act of moving hurriedly and in a careless manner. <i>He soon regretted his haste.</i>
hasten	Speed up the progress of; facilitate. <i>This tragedy probably hastened his own death from heart disease.</i>
hastily	With excessive speed or urgency; hurriedly. <i>Maybe I acted too hastily.</i>
hie	Go quickly. <i>I hied down to New Orleans.</i>
hurried	Done in a hurry; rushed. <i>A hurried job.</i>
hurriedly	In a hurried or hasty manner. <i>The way they buried him so hurriedly was disgraceful.</i>
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. <i>In my hurry to leave I knocked over a pile of books.</i>
<u>hustle</u>	Get by trying hard. <i>Linda hustled money from men she met.</i>
overhasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>Hard times are showing up overhasty mergers.</i>
precipitant	A cause or stimulus which precipitates a particular condition. <i>Depression may be a precipitant in many cases.</i>
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>Was quick to make friends.</i>
quicken	Give or restore life to. <i>I felt my pulse quicken.</i>
quickly	With speed. <i>He works quickly.</i>
rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>An ambulance was waiting to rush him to hospital.</i>
rushed	Done or completed too hurriedly; hasty. <i>I m too rushed to do it.</i>
scramble	Make unintelligible. <i>A local landowner allowed some kids to hold a motorbike scramble in the woods.</i>

- shove** Push (someone or something) roughly.
*Kids pushed kicked and **shoved**.*
- speed** Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit.
*The car has a top **speed** of 147 mph.*
- speedily** With speed.
*Your claim will be dealt with as **speedily** as possible.*
- sprint** An act or short spell of running at full speed.
*Team members discuss issues with each other at the end of every **sprint**.*
- swift** A swift flying insectivorous bird with long slender wings and a superficial resemblance to a swallow spending most of its life on the wing.
*A **swift** runner.*
- swiftness** Lack of delay; promptness.
*Kay had the upper hand with her agility and **swiftness**.*
- urgently** In a way which requires immediate action or attention.
*Health care reform is needed **urgently**.*
