The way they buried him so hurriedly was disgraceful.

hurryA condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry.

In my **hurry** to leave I knocked over a pile of books.

hustle Get by trying hard.

Linda **hustle**d money from men she met.

Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur

overhasty Geddes.

Hard times are showing up **overhasty** mergers.

precipitant A cause or stimulus which precipitates a particular condition.

Depression may be a **precipitant** in many cases.

quick Moving quickly and lightly.

Was quick to make friends.

quicken Give or restore life to.

I felt my pulse **quicken**.

With speed.

quickly

He works quickly.

rush Cause to move fast or to rush or race.

An ambulance was waiting to **rush** him to hospital.

rushed Done or completed too hurriedly; hasty.

I m too **rushed** to do it.

Make unintelligible.

scramble A local landowner allowed some kids to hold a motorbike **scramble** in the

woods.



shove Push (someone or something) roughly.

Kids pushed kicked and **shove**d.

Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit.

The car has a top **speed** of 147 mph.

speedily With speed.

Your claim will be dealt with as **speedily** as possible.

An act or short spell of running at full speed.

Team members discuss issues with each other at the end of every **sprint**.

A swift runner.

swiftness Lack of delay; promptness.
