Definitions of "Data" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “data” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The quantities, characters, or symbols on which operations are performed by a computer, which may be stored and transmitted in the form of electrical signals and recorded on magnetic, optical, or mechanical recording media.*
- *Things known or assumed as facts, making the basis of reasoning or calculation.*
- *A collection of facts from which conclusions may be drawn.*
- *Facts and statistics collected together for reference or analysis.*



Synonyms of "Data" as a noun (8 Words)

details	A crew of workers selected for a particular task. <i>After the trial he gave us the real details.</i>
facts	A concept whose truth can be proved. <i>Scientific hypotheses are not facts.</i>
features	The principal (full-length) film in a program at a movie theater. <i>An expression of pleasure crossed his features.</i>
figures	A model of a bodily form (especially of a person). <i>She made the best score on compulsory figures.</i>
information	In information theory a mathematical quantity expressing the probability of occurrence of a particular sequence of symbols impulses etc as against that of alternative sequences. <i>The signal contained thousands of bits of information.</i>

particulars (logic) a proposition that asserts something about some (but not all) members of a class.

He always reasons from the particular to the general.

specifics A fact about some part (as opposed to general.

Quinine is a specific for malaria.

statistics The practice or science of collecting and analysing numerical data in large quantities, especially for the purpose of inferring proportions in a whole from those in a representative sample.

Associations of "Data" (30 Words)

agglomerate	A volcanic rock consisting of large fragments bonded together. <i>An agglomerated flower head.</i>
aggregate	Amount in the aggregate to. <i>Aggregate expenses include expenses of all divisions combined for the entire year.</i>
amass	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>She is amassing a lot of data for her thesis.</i>
arithmetic	Relating to or involving arithmetic. <i>Arithmetic had never been her strong point.</i>

<u>binary</u>	A binary star. <i>A binary star is a system in which two stars revolve around each other.</i>
check	Write out a check on a bank account. <i>The dog checked.</i>
collate	Verify the number and order of (the sheets of a book). <i>All the information obtained is being collated.</i>
collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>Refuse collection.</i>
confirm	Administer the religious rite of confirmation to. <i>The organization has confirmed the appointment of Mr Collins as managing director.</i>
cumulate	Attach two double bonds to the same carbon atom. <i>They appear to have formed from cumulates in the root of a magma chamber.</i>
decimal	A number in the decimal system. <i>Decimal arithmetic.</i>
encyclopedia	A book or set of books giving information on many subjects or on many aspects of one subject and typically arranged alphabetically.
formalize	Give a definite structure or shape to. <i>We became able to formalize our thoughts.</i>
<u>oversee</u>	Supervise (a person or their work), especially in an official capacity. <i>The Home Secretary oversees the police service.</i>
<u>patrol</u>	Maintain the security of by carrying out a patrol. <i>The garrison had to patrol the streets to maintain order.</i>
philatelist	A collector and student of postage stamps.
poll	Cut off the top of a tree or plant typically to encourage further growth pollard. <i>The network manager can also use the software to poll each Mac on the net.</i>
<u>proof</u>	Proofread a text. <i>A proof copy is sent up for checking.</i>
<u>reconnaissance</u>	Military observation of a region to locate an enemy or ascertain strategic features. <i>After a reconnaissance British forces took the island.</i>
reconnoiter	Explore, often with the goal of finding something or somebody.
reconvene	Meet again. <i>The bill will be considered when the Legislature reconvenes next Fall.</i>

sentry	A soldier stationed to keep guard or to control access to a place. <i>On sentry duty.</i>
standardize	Evaluate by comparing with a standard. <i>We could standardize on US equipment.</i>
statistic	An event or person regarded as no more than a piece of data (used to suggest an inappropriately impersonal approach). <i>He was just another statistic.</i>
substantiation	The act of validating; finding or testing the truth of something.
suitability	The quality of having the properties that are right for a specific purpose. <i>The suitability of residential accommodation varied widely.</i>
surveillance	Close observation of a person or group (usually by the police). <i>He found himself put under surveillance by British military intelligence.</i>
<u>survey</u>	A written report detailing the findings of a building survey. <i>The third type of report is a full structural survey.</i>
validation	The act of validating; finding or testing the truth of something. <i>New courses subject to validation include an MSc in Urban Forestry.</i>
verification	The process of ensuring that procedures laid down in weapons limitation agreements are followed. <i>The verification of official documents.</i>
