- *The specified day of the month.*
- *The period of time to which an artefact or structure belongs.*
- *The present.*
- *The particular day, month, or year (usually according to the Gregorian calendar) that an event occurred.*
- *A social or romantic appointment or engagement.*
- *A particular day specified as the time something happens.*
- *A musical or theatrical engagement or performance, especially as part of a tour.*
- *Sweet edible fruit of the date palm with a single long woody seed.*
- *A particular but unspecified point in time.*

epoch	A period marked by distinctive character or reckoned from a fixed point or event. <i>These events marked an epoch in their history.</i>
<u>era</u>	Baseball a measure of a pitcher's effectiveness calculated as the average number of earned runs allowed by the pitcher for every nine innings pitched. <i>Leading photographers of the Victorian era.</i>
<u>girl</u>	A girl or young woman with whom a man is romantically involved. <i>A chorus girl.</i>

girlfriend	Any female friend. <i>His girlfriend kicked him out.</i>
lady friend	A woman of the peerage in Britain.
man	The generic use of the word to refer to any human being. <i>He awaited word from his man in Havana.</i>
man friend	A male person who plays a significant role (husband or lover or boyfriend) in the life of a particular woman.
meeting	A gathering of people, especially Quakers, for worship. <i>There was an informal meeting in my living room.</i>

<u>sunrise</u>	The first light of day. <i>An hour before sunrise.</i>
<u>tomorrow</u>	The future, especially the near future. <i>I have work to do tomorrow morning.</i>
tuesday	The third day of the week; the second working day.
wake	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>He was attending a friend s wake.</i>
wednesday	The fourth day of the week; the third working day.
<u>week</u>	The time spent working during a week. <i>I work during the week so I can only get to this shop on Saturdays.</i>
weekday	A day of the week other than Sunday or Saturday. <i>The weekday rush hour.</i>

workweek	The total number of hours or days worked in a week. <i>We need a shorter workweek and protected benefits for contract workers.</i>
<u>year</u>	A period of time occupying a regular part of a calendar year that is used for some particular activity. <i>She was in my year at Hoehandle High.</i>
yesterday	Used in reference to a particular time period on the day before today. <i>Yesterday s solutions are not good enough.</i>
