<b>day of the month</b>	A period of opportunity.
<b><u>decade</u></b>	A range of electrical resistances, frequencies, or other quantities spanning from one to ten times a base value. <i>He taught at the university for nearly a <b>decade</b>.</i>
<b>engagement</b>	Contact by fitting together. <i>The teacher tried to increase his students <b>engagement</b> in class activities.</i>
<b>epoch</b>	A period marked by distinctive character or reckoned from a fixed point or event. <i>These events marked an <b>epoch</b> in their history.</i>
<b><u>era</u></b>	Baseball a measure of a pitcher's effectiveness calculated as the average number of earned runs allowed by the pitcher for every nine innings pitched. <i>Leading photographers of the Victorian <b>era</b>.</i>
<b><u>girl</u></b>	A girl or young woman with whom a man is romantically involved. <i>A chorus <b>girl</b>.</i>

<b>girlfriend</b>	Any female friend. <i>His <b>girlfriend</b> kicked him out.</i>
<b>lady friend</b>	A woman of the peerage in Britain.
<b>man</b>	The generic use of the word to refer to any human being. <i>He awaited word from his <b>man</b> in Havana.</i>
<b>man friend</b>	A male person who plays a significant role (husband or lover or boyfriend) in the life of a particular woman.
<b>meeting</b>	A gathering of people, especially Quakers, for worship. <i>There was an informal <b>meeting</b> in my living room.</i>
<b>occasion</b>	A vaguely specified social event. <i>On one <b>occasion</b> I stayed up until two in the morning.</i>
<b>partner</b>	A person who is a member of a partnership. <i>Sexual <b>partners</b>.</i>

<b>stage</b>	A stagecoach. <i>All the world s a <b>stage</b>.</i>
<b>time</b>	Time or an amount of time as reckoned by a conventional standard. <i>It would be a waste of <b>time</b>.</i>
<b>woman friend</b>	Women as a class.
<b>year</b>	A year regarded in terms of the quality of something produced. <i>She had a composure well beyond her <b>years</b>.</i>
<b>young lady</b>	English poet (1683-1765).
<b>young man</b>	United States jazz tenor saxophonist (1909-1959).

<b><u>sunrise</u></b>	The first light of day. <i>An hour before <b>sunrise</b>.</i>
<b><u>tomorrow</u></b>	The future, especially the near future. <i>I have work to do <b>tomorrow</b> morning.</i>
<b>tuesday</b>	The third day of the week; the second working day.
<b>wake</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>He was attending a friend s <b>wake</b>.</i>
<b>wednesday</b>	The fourth day of the week; the third working day.
<b><u>week</u></b>	The time spent working during a week. <i>I work during the <b>week</b> so I can only get to this shop on Saturdays.</i>
<b>weekday</b>	A day of the week other than Sunday or Saturday. <i>The <b>weekday</b> rush hour.</i>
<b>weekend</b>	Spend a weekend somewhere. <i>He was <b>weekending</b> in the country.</i>
<b>workweek</b>	The total number of hours or days worked in a week. <i>We need a shorter <b>workweek</b> and protected benefits for contract workers.</i>
<b><u>year</u></b>	A period of time occupying a regular part of a calendar year that is used for some particular activity. <i>She was in my <b>year</b> at Hoehandle High.</i>
<b>yesterday</b>	Used in reference to a particular time period on the day before today. <i><b>Yesterday</b> s solutions are not good enough.</i>
