- *Used as a term of affectionate address to a woman or girl, typically by an older person.*
- *A woman considered in relation to her native country or area.*
- *A woman considered as the product of a particular person, influence, or environment.*



Synonyms of "Daughter" as a noun (9 Words)

- baby** A timid or childish person.
*The **baby** of the family.*
- child** An immature childish person.
*When **children** leave home parents can feel somewhat redundant.*
- female child** An animal that produces gametes (ova) that can be fertilized by male gametes (spermatozoa).
- girl** A person's girlfriend.
*His **girlfriend** kicked him out.*
- infant** A person who has not attained legal majority.
*Healthy **infants**.*
- little one** A small amount or duration.
- son** A man regarded as the product of a particular person influence or environment.
*One of Norfolk's most famous **sons**.*

- tot** A small amount of a strong alcoholic drink such as whisky or brandy.
A **tot** of brandy.
- youngster** A young person of either sex.
*Tiddler is a British term for **youngster**.*

- *As radon gas decays it produces daughters that attach themselves to dust particles.*
- *Italian, the eldest daughter of ancient Latin.*
- *Her daughter cared for her in her old age.*
- *The heptathlete could become one of Yorkshire's most famous daughters.*
- *A daughter of the dry savannas of Africa.*

*She was brought up by her **aunt** and uncle.*

beget

Make children.
*Killings **beget** more killings.*

dad

One's father.
*His **dad** was with him.*

daddy

The best or most successful person.
*It s you who s calling the shots now you re the **daddy**.*

darling

Used as an affectionate form of address to a beloved person.
*Good night **darling**.*

descendants All of the offspring of a given progenitor.

family	People descended from a common ancestor. <i>The message was addressed not just to employees but to every member of the company family.</i>
father	Appear as or admit that one is the father or originator of. <i>His father was born in Atlanta.</i>
grandchild	A child of your son or daughter.
grandfather	The father of one's father or mother. <i>Freud is often called the grandfather of psychoanalysis.</i>
grandparent	A parent of your father or mother. <i>It must be a great blessing to have Chloe's grandparents living nearby.</i>
maternal	Relating to or derived from one's mother. <i>A mother who radiated maternal concern.</i>
mom	Informal terms for a mother. <i>My mom gave us each a slice of pizza.</i>
mommy	Informal terms for a mother.
mother	Care for like a mother. <i>She didn't know how to mother my brother and he was very sensitive.</i>
mummy	(especially in ancient Egypt) a body of a human being or animal that has been ceremonially preserved by removal of the internal organs, treatment with natron and resin, and wrapping in bandages. <i>The mummy of Tutankhamen.</i>
offspring	The immediate descendants of a person. <i>Industrialism prepared the way for acceptance of the French Revolution's various socialistic offspring.</i>
parent	Be or act as a parent to a child. <i>God's hand had written in the hearts of our first parents all the rules of good.</i>
parental	Relating to or characteristic of or befitting a parent. <i>Parental leave.</i>
paternal	Relating to or characteristic of or befitting a parent. <i>His father and paternal grandfather were porcelain painters.</i>
paternity	The state of being a father. <i>He refused to admit paternity of the child.</i>
procreate	(of people or animals) produce young; reproduce. <i>Species that procreate by copulation.</i>

progeny	A descendant or the descendants of a person, animal, or plant; offspring. <i>Shorthorn cattle are highly effective in bestowing their characteristics on their progeny.</i>
scion	A descendant of a notable family. <i>A scion of royal stock.</i>
sibling	A person's brother or sister.
sister	A fellow woman seen in relation to feminist issues. <i>Uncloseted lesbian sisters.</i>
sisterhood	The relationship between sisters. <i>Canadian feminists acknowledge their sisterhood with women around the globe.</i>
son	A man regarded as the product of a particular person influence or environment. <i>You re on private land son.</i>
surname	Give a surname to. <i>Eddie Penham so aptly surnamed had produced a hand painted sign for us.</i>
uncle	An unrelated older male friend, especially of a child. <i>He played uncle to lonely students.</i>
