- *Confusion characterized by lack of clarity.*

fog

A state or cause of perplexity or confusion.
*The coffee helped clear the **fog** in my brain.*

haze

Atmospheric moisture or dust or smoke that causes reduced visibility.
*An alcoholic **haze**.*

jumble

Articles collected for a jumble sale.
*The books were in a chaotic **jumble**.*

muddle

A mistake arising from or resulting in confusion.
*He made a **muddle** of his marriage.*

shock

Bodily collapse or near collapse caused by inadequate oxygen delivery to the cells; characterized by reduced cardiac output and rapid heartbeat and circulatory insufficiency and pallor.
*Earthquake **shocks**.*

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| <u>spin</u> | Rapid descent of an aircraft in a steep spiral. <i>He took the new car for a spin.</i> |
| state of shock | The territory occupied by one of the constituent administrative districts of a nation. |
| state of stupefaction | The group of people comprising the government of a sovereign state. |
| <u>stupor</u> | Marginal consciousness. <i>A drunken stupor.</i> |
| trance-like state | A state of depression or agitation. |
| <u>whirl</u> | A rapid movement round and round. <i>A hazelnut whirl.</i> |



Usage Examples of "Daze" as a noun

- *His mother's death left him in a daze.*
- *He was walking around in a daze.*



Daze as a Verb

Definitions of "Daze" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "daze" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light.*
- *(especially of an emotional or physical shock) make (someone) unable to think or react properly.*
- *Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief.*

| bedaze | Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. |
| bedazzle | To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light. <i>I d bring a box of rhinestones so I could bedazzle our uniforms.</i> |
| bewilder | Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>His reaction had bewildered her.</i> |
| confound | Cause surprise or confusion in (someone), especially by not according with their expectations. <i>The rise in prices confounded expectations.</i> |
| dazzle | Amaze or bewilder, as with brilliant wit or intellect or skill. <i>She was dazzled by the bright headlights.</i> |
| devastate | Destroy or ruin. <i>She was devastated by the loss of Damian.</i> |
| disconcert | Cause to feel embarrassment. <i>The abrupt change of subject disconcerted her.</i> |
| dismay | Cause (someone) to feel concern and distress. <i>They were dismayed by the U turn in policy.</i> |
| dumbfound | Greatly astonish or amaze. <i>I was dumbfounded by the low prices there.</i> |
| knock out | Rap with the knuckles. |
| knock senseless | Rap with the knuckles. |
| knock unconscious | Knock against with force or violence. |
| lay out | Put into a certain place or abstract location. |
| nonplus | Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>Diane was nonplused by such an odd question.</i> |
| overcome | Overcome as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>You must overcome all difficulties.</i> |
| overpower | Be too intense for; overwhelm. <i>They were overpowered by the fumes.</i> |

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| <u>overwhelm</u> | Be too strong for; overpower. <i>I was overwhelmed with guilt.</i> |
| shake up | Move with or as if with a tremor. |
| shock | Affect with physiological shock or with an electric shock. <i>The revelations shocked the nation.</i> |
| stagger | Walk or move unsteadily, as if about to fall. <i>He staggered along in the heavy snow.</i> |
| <u>startle</u> | Move or jump suddenly, as if in surprise or alarm. <i>He was startled to see a column of smoke.</i> |
| stun | Hit something or somebody as if with a sandbag. <i>Stun fish.</i> |
| stupefy | Astonish and shock. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and stupefy their grandparents.</i> |
| take aback | To get into a position of having, e.g., safety, comfort. |
| take someone's breath away | Make use of or accept for some purpose. |

Associations of "Daze" (30 Words)

- amaze** Be a mystery or bewildering to.
*She **amazed** doctors by fighting back when her deteriorating condition caused her to suffer heart failure.*
- amazed** Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock.
*She shook her head in **amazed** disbelief.*
- amazement** The feeling that accompanies something extremely surprising.
*She shook her head in **amazement**.*
- astonish** Surprise or impress (someone) greatly.
*You never fail to **astonish** me.*
- astonishing** So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm.
*I find it **astonishing** that they ever thought it could work.*

| incredulity | Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in incredulity.</i> |
| <u>marvelous</u> | Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>A marvelous collection of rare books.</i> |
| <u>puzzled</u> | Unable to understand; perplexed. <i>The questioners were met with puzzled looks.</i> |
| redoubtable | Inspiring fear- G.H. Johnston. <i>He was a redoubtable debater.</i> |
| serendipity | Good luck in making unexpected and fortunate discoveries. <i>A fortunate stroke of serendipity.</i> |
| shock | Subject to electrical shocks. <i>If a patient is deeply shocked measurement of blood pressure may be difficult.</i> |
| <u>shocking</u> | Very bad. <i>She brought shocking news.</i> |
| <u>skittish</u> | Unpredictably excitable (especially of horses). <i>Skittish investors withdrew their money from equity markets.</i> |
| <u>staggering</u> | Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>The staggering bills for maintenance and repair.</i> |
| <u>startle</u> | Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm. <i>He was startled to see a column of smoke.</i> |

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| stun | Astonish or shock (someone) so that they are temporarily unable to react. <i>The community was stunned by the tragedy.</i> |
| stupefy | Make (someone) unable to think or feel properly. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and stupefy their grandparents.</i> |
| stupor | A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility. <i>Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken stupor.</i> |
| surprise | Cause to be surprised. <i>The news really surprised me.</i> |
| surprised | Feeling or showing surprise. <i>A surprised expression.</i> |
| surprising | Causing surprise; unexpected. <i>She earned a surprising amount of money.</i> |
| wondering | Showing curiosity. <i>Unsure where she was leading to I cast her a wondering look.</i> |
