### haze

Atmospheric moisture or dust or smoke that causes reduced visibility.

*The books were in a chaotic **jumble**.*

### **muddle**

A mistake arising from or resulting in confusion.  
*He made a **muddle** of his marriage.*

### **shock**

Bodily collapse or near collapse caused by inadequate oxygen delivery to the cells; characterized by reduced cardiac output and rapid heartbeat and circulatory insufficiency and pallor.  
*Earthquake **shocks**.*

<b><u>spin</u></b>	Rapid descent of an aircraft in a steep spiral. <i>He took the new car for a <b>spin</b>.</i>
<b>state of shock</b>	The territory occupied by one of the constituent administrative districts of a nation.
<b>state of stupefaction</b>	The group of people comprising the government of a sovereign state.
<b><u>stupor</u></b>	Marginal consciousness. <i>A drunken <b>stupor</b>.</i>
<b>trance-like state</b>	A state of depression or agitation.
<b><u>whirl</u></b>	A rapid movement round and round. <i>A hazelnut <b>whirl</b>.</i>

- *He was walking around in a daze.*



## Daze as a Verb

### Definitions of "Daze" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "daze" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light.*
- *(especially of an emotional or physical shock) make (someone) unable to think or react properly.*
- *Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief.*

<b>astonish</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>It <b>astonished</b> her that he was so anxious.</i>
<b>astound</b>	Shock or greatly surprise. <i>Her bluntness <b>astounded</b> him.</i>
<b>bedaze</b>	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief.
<b>bedazzle</b>	To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light. <i>I d bring a box of rhinestones so I could <b>bedazzle</b> our uniforms.</i>
<a href="#">bewilder</a>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>His reaction had <b>bewildered</b> her.</i>
<b>confound</b>	Cause surprise or confusion in (someone), especially by not according with their expectations. <i>The rise in prices <b>confounded</b> expectations.</i>
<a href="#">dazzle</a>	Amaze or bewilder, as with brilliant wit or intellect or skill. <i>She was <b>dazzled</b> by the bright headlights.</i>
<b>devastate</b>	Destroy or ruin. <i>She was <b>devastated</b> by the loss of Damian.</i>
<b>disconcert</b>	Cause to feel embarrassment. <i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>
<b>dismay</b>	Cause (someone) to feel concern and distress. <i>They were <b>dismayed</b> by the U turn in policy.</i>
<b>dumbfound</b>	Greatly astonish or amaze. <i>I was <b>dumbfounded</b> by the low prices there.</i>
<b>knock out</b>	Rap with the knuckles.
<b>knock senseless</b>	Rap with the knuckles.
<b>knock unconscious</b>	Knock against with force or violence.
<b>lay out</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>nonplus</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>Diane was <b>nonplused</b> by such an odd question.</i>
<a href="#">overcome</a>	Overcome as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>You must <b>overcome</b> all difficulties.</i>
<a href="#">overpower</a>	Be too intense for; overwhelm. <i>They were <b>overpowered</b> by the fumes.</i>

<b><u>overwhelm</u></b>	Be too strong for; overpower. <i>I was <b>overwhelmed</b> with guilt.</i>
<b>shake up</b>	Move with or as if with a tremor.
<b>shock</b>	Affect with physiological shock or with an electric shock. <i>The revelations <b>shocked</b> the nation.</i>
<b>stagger</b>	Walk or move unsteadily, as if about to fall. <i>He <b>staggered</b> along in the heavy snow.</i>
<b><u>startle</u></b>	Move or jump suddenly, as if in surprise or alarm. <i>He was <b>startled</b> to see a column of smoke.</i>
<b>stun</b>	Hit something or somebody as if with a sandbag. <i><b>Stun</b> fish.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Astonish and shock. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and <b>stupefy</b> their grandparents.</i>
<b>take aback</b>	To get into a position of having, e.g., safety, comfort.
<b>take someone's breath away</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose.

<b>astound</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>Her bluntness <b>astounded</b> him.</i>
<b><u>astounding</u></b>	Surprisingly impressive or notable. <i>The summit offers <b>astounding</b> views.</i>
<b>awesome</b>	Extremely impressive or daunting; inspiring awe. <i>The band is truly <b>awesome</b>.</i>
<b><u>blank</u></b>	Cut a metal blank. <i>We were met by <b>blank</b> looks.</i>
<b><u>flabbergasted</u></b>	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i><b>Flabbergasted</b> fans took to the streets to celebrate the team's big win.</i>
<b><u>galvanize</u></b>	Galvanized steel sheeting typically as used for roofing or fencing. <i>They promised they would <b>galvanize</b> the iron railings to prevent rusting.</i>
<b>impact</b>	Influencing strongly. <i>High interest rates have <b>impacted</b> on retail spending.</i>
<b>incredible</b>	Very good; wonderful. <i>I was mesmerized she looked so <b>incredible</b>.</i>
<b>incredulity</b>	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>
<b><u>marvelous</u></b>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>A <b>marvelous</b> collection of rare books.</i>
<b><u>puzzled</u></b>	Unable to understand; perplexed. <i>The questioners were met with <b>puzzled</b> looks.</i>
<b>redoubtable</b>	Inspiring fear- G.H. Johnston. <i>He was a <b>redoubtable</b> debater.</i>
<b>serendipity</b>	Good luck in making unexpected and fortunate discoveries. <i>A fortunate stroke of <b>serendipity</b>.</i>
<b>shock</b>	Subject to electrical shocks. <i>If a patient is deeply <b>shocked</b> measurement of blood pressure may be difficult.</i>
<b><u>shocking</u></b>	Very bad. <i>She brought <b>shocking</b> news.</i>
<b><u>skittish</u></b>	Unpredictably excitable (especially of horses). <i><b>Skittish</b> investors withdrew their money from equity markets.</i>
<b><u>staggering</u></b>	Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>The <b>staggering</b> bills for maintenance and repair.</i>
<b><u>startle</u></b>	Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm. <i>He was <b>startled</b> to see a column of smoke.</i>

<b>stun</b>	Astonish or shock (someone) so that they are temporarily unable to react. <i>The community was <b>stunned</b> by the tragedy.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Make (someone) unable to think or feel properly. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and <b>stupefy</b> their grandparents.</i>
<b>stupor</b>	A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility. <i>Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken <b>stupor</b>.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>The news really <b>surprised</b> me.</i>
<b>surprised</b>	Feeling or showing surprise. <i>A <b>surprised</b> expression.</i>
<b>surprising</b>	Causing surprise; unexpected. <i>She earned a <b>surprising</b> amount of money.</i>
<b>wondering</b>	Showing curiosity. <i>Unsure where she was leading to I cast her a <b>wondering</b> look.</i>
