<b>complete</b>	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>His range of skills made him the <b>complete</b> footballer.</i>
<b>deadened</b>	Made or become less intense. <i>The <b>deadened</b> pangs of hunger.</i>
<b>deceased</b>	Dead. <i>He is <b>deceased</b>.</i>

<b>flat</b>	Of something kept inflated especially a tyre having lost some or all of its air typically because of a puncture. <i>His sense of intoxication wore off until he felt <b>flat</b> and weary.</i>

<b>stony</b>	Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <b>Stony</b> ground.
<b>tame</b>	(of land) cultivated. Network TV on Saturday night is a pretty <b>tame</b> affair.
<b>thorough</b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. Made a <b>thorough</b> search.
<b>total</b>	Complete in extent or degree and in every particular. It is a matter of <b>total</b> indifference to me.
<b>unemotional</b>	Unsusceptible to or destitute of or showing no emotion. A flat <b>unemotional</b> voice.
<b>uneventful</b>	Not marked by interesting or exciting events. A place where dull people lead <b>uneventful</b> lives.

<b>absolutely</b>	(of a verb) without a stated object. <i>She had <b>absolutely</b> no idea what he was talking about.</i>
<b>completely</b>	So as to be complete; with everything necessary. <i>The fire <b>completely</b> destroyed the building.</i>
<b>dead on</b>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers.

<b>exceptionally</b>	Only in unusual circumstances. <i>The court allows half an hour in most cases one hour <b>exceptionally</b> for a very important case.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To an extreme degree. <i>This is an <b>extremely</b> difficult thing to do.</i>
<b>fully</b>	Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>He didn't <b>fully</b> understand.</i>
<b>hugely</b>	Very much; to a very great extent. <i>A <b>hugely</b> expensive house.</i>
<b>immediately</b>	Bearing an immediate relation. <i>They would be the states most <b>immediately</b> affected by any such action.</i>
<b>immensely</b>	To a great extent; extremely. <i>The president was <b>immensely</b> popular.</i>
<b>perfectly</b>	In a manner or way that could not be better. <i>You know <b>perfectly</b> well I can't stay.</i>
<b>plumb</b>	Conforming to the direction of a plumb line. <i>Fell <b>plumb</b> in the middle of the puddle.</i>
<b>precisely</b>	Exactly (used to emphasize the complete accuracy or truth of a statement). <i>The guidelines are <b>precisely</b> defined.</i>
<b>promptly</b>	With little or no delay. <i>He did his homework <b>promptly</b>.</i>
<b>punctually</b>	At the agreed or proper time; promptly. <i>Four out of five trains were arriving <b>punctually</b>.</i>
<b>quite</b>	All the way. <i>Her victory was <b>quite</b> something.</i>
<b>right</b>	In the right manner correctly suitably. <i>Do <b>right</b> by him.</i>
<b>sharp</b>	Precisely (used after an expression of time). <i>The road twists <b>sharply</b> after the light.</i>

<b>short</b>	Not as far as the point aimed at; not far enough. <i>He said <b>shortly</b> that he didn't like it.</i>
<b>squarely</b>	Directly and without evasion; not roundabout. <i>The responsibility lies <b>squarely</b> with them.</i>
<b><u>straight</u></b>	In a straight line directly. <i>I'll fetch up the bath to you <b>straight</b>.</i>
<b>suddenly</b>	Happening unexpectedly. <i>He made up his mind <b>suddenly</b>.</i>
<b><u>thoroughly</u></b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>
<b><u>totally</u></b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly'). <i>So then Julie like <b>totally</b> dumps her boyfriend Tommy.</i>
<b><u>tremendously</u></b>	Extremely. <i>Costs vary <b>tremendously</b> from area to area.</i>
<b>unreservedly</b>	Frankly and openly. <i>I <b>unreservedly</b> recommend the book.</i>
<b><u>utterly</u></b>	Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <i>He looked <b>utterly</b> ridiculous.</i>
<b>very</b>	Used to emphasize that the following description applies without qualification. <i>He played <b>very</b> well.</i>
<b><u>wholly</u></b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>The distinction is not <b>wholly</b> clear.</i>

<b>defunct</b>	No longer in force or use; inactive. <i>A <b>defunct</b> organization.</i>
<b>destroyed</b>	Destroyed physically or morally. <i>War left many cities <b>destroyed</b>.</i>
<b>die</b>	A cutting tool that is fitted into a diestock and used for cutting male external screw threads on screws or bolts or pipes or rods. <i>Whosoever believes in me shall never <b>die</b>.</i>
<b>doom</b>	Decree or designate beforehand. <i>A day like that of the last <b>doom</b>.</i>
<b>funeral</b>	A sermon delivered at a funeral. <i>The community would call him to preach the <b>funeral</b>.</i>
<b>inanimate</b>	Showing no sign of life; lifeless. <i><b>Inanimate</b> objects.</i>
<b>inelastic</b>	(of demand or supply) insensitive to changes in price or income. <i>Economists speak of an <b>inelastic</b> price structure.</i>
<b>inoperative</b>	Not working or taking effect. <i>An <b>inoperative</b> law.</i>
<b>lifeless</b>	Devoid of living things. <i>A <b>lifeless</b> body.</i>
<b>misadventure</b>	Death caused by a person accidentally while performing a legal act without negligence or intent to harm. <i>The petty misdemeanours and <b>misadventures</b> of childhood.</i>
<b>morgue</b>	Used in reference to a place that is quiet, gloomy, or cold. <i>She put us in that draughty <b>morgue</b> of a sitting room.</i>
<b>mortician</b>	An undertaker.
<b>mortuary</b>	Of or relating to a funeral. <i>A <b>mortuary</b> temple.</i>



<b>perish</b>	Suffer complete ruin or destruction. <i>A great part of his army <b>perished</b> of hunger and disease.</i>
<b><u>resurrection</u></b>	(in Christian belief) the rising of the dead at the Last Judgement. <i>The <b>resurrection</b> of the country under a charismatic leader.</i>
<b>sepulchral</b>	Of or relating to a sepulchre. <i>The <b>sepulchral</b> darkness of the catacombs.</i>
<b>stillborn</b>	(of newborn infant) showing no signs of life at birth; not liveborn. <i>A <b>stillborn</b> plot to assassinate the President.</i>
<b>suffocation</b>	Killing by depriving of oxygen. <i>For years I could not escape feelings of <b>suffocation</b>.</i>
<b>tombstone</b>	A large, flat inscribed stone standing or laid over a grave. <i>His grin exposed his yellowed teeth like a row of <b>tombstones</b>.</i>
<b>unanimated</b>	(of an image) not moving; still. <i>He was very dry and <b>unanimated</b>.</i>
