- A situation, typically one involving opposing parties, in which no progress can be made.






# Synonyms of "Deadlock" as a noun (11 Words)

<u>bolt</u>	A long pin with a head that screws into a nut, used to fasten things together.
catch	The act of catching an object with the hands. I mistakenly thought he would be a good <b>catch</b> .
checkmate	Said by a player to announce that the opponent s king is in the position of checkmate. If the rebel forces succeed in cutting off the road they will have achieved <b>checkmate</b> .
dead end	People who are no longer living.
fastener	A device that closes or secures something. The sleeping bag is so slim that it is impossible to do up the <b>fastener</b> once you re inside.
fastening	The act of fastening things together. A fly front <b>fastening</b> .




<u>impasse</u>	A situation in which no progress can be made or no advancement is possible. <i>The current political</i> <b>impasse</b> .
latch	A circuit which retains whatever output state results from a momentary input signal until reset by another signal. Lifting the <b>latch</b> she pushed the gate open.
<u>lock</u>	A number of interlocked or jammed items. All of this makes him a <b>lock</b> to make the Hall of Fame.
<u>stalemate</u>	Drawing position in chess: any of a player's possible moves would place his king in check. <i>The war had again reached <b>stalemate</b></i> .
standstill	A situation in which no progress can be made or no advancement is possible. <i>The traffic came to a <b>standstill</b>.</i>

## **Deadlock as a Verb**

#### **Definitions of "Deadlock" as a verb**

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "deadlock" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Secure (a door) with a deadlock.
- (of a game or match) be tied, with the score level.
- Cause (a situation or opposing parties) to come to a point where no progress can be made because of fundamental disagreement.







# Synonyms of "Deadlock" as a verb (11 Words)

barricade	Block or defend with a barricade. Detainees who <b>barricade</b> d themselves into their dormitory.
block	Shape into a block or blocks. Knight did well to <b>block</b> Soloman s shot.
<u>bolt</u>	Secure or lock with a bolt. The lid was <b>bolt</b> ed down.
draw	Engage in drawing. <b>Draw</b> a card.
fasten	Become fixed or fastened. They <b>fasten</b> ed various nicknames to each other.
latch	Fasten with a latch. <i>Latch</i> the door.
<u>lock</u>	Pass by means through a lock in a waterway. He is treated like an unpaid servant and <b>lock</b> ed in his room.
obstruct	Deliberately make (something) difficult. An indirect free kick is awarded for intentionally <b>obstruct</b> ing an opponent.
padlock	Secure with a padlock. His father had <b>padlock</b> ed the gate.
<u>secure</u>	Assure payment of. The government is concerned to <b>secure</b> the economy against too much foreign ownership.
<u>tie</u>	Unite musical notes by a tie. <i>Tie</i> a neck <b>tie</b> .

- The meeting is deadlocked.
- You can deadlock any exit door from the outside.





# Associations of "Deadlock" (30 Words)

abeyance	Temporary cessation or suspension. Matters were held in <b>abeyance</b> pending further enquiries.
<u>cease</u>	Cease is a noun only in the phrase without cease end. The hostilities <b>cease</b> d and normal life was resumed.
<u>cessation</u>	A stopping. A <b>cessation</b> of animal testing of cosmetics.
desist	Choose not to consume. Each pledged to <b>desist</b> from acts of sabotage.
<u>discontinue</u>	Cease taking (a newspaper or periodical) or paying (a subscription). The support from our sponsoring agency will <b>discontinue</b> after March 31.
discontinuity	Lack of connection or continuity. There is no significant <b>discontinuity</b> between modern and primitive societies.



Come to a halt stop moving. A <b>halt</b> in production.
Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. She speaks <b>halting</b> English with a heavy accent.
A pause or break in continuity in a sequence or activity. There was a brief <b>hiatus</b> in the war with France.
A situation in which no progress is possible, especially because of disagreement; a deadlock. <i>The current political <b>impasse</b></i> .
Cause interference to a broadcast radio signal. Light pulses <b>interfere</b> constructively in a fibre to emit a pulse.
A pause or break. The daily work goes on without <b>intermission</b> .
An act of delaying or interrupting the continuity. <i>Students returning to education after an</i> <b>interruption</b> in their career.
For an instant or moment. We paused <b>momentarily</b> before proceeding.
A time interval during which there is a temporary cessation of something. <i>She dropped me outside during a brief</i> <b>pause</b> <i>in the rain.</i>
In a way that lasts or remains unchanged indefinitely; for all time. <i>He is <b>permanently</b> disabled</i> .
A situation from which extrication is difficult especially an unpleasant or trying one. The club s financial <b>predicament</b> .
Act as president. Johnson has <b>preside</b> d over eight matches since Beck s dismissal.
A difficult situation; a practical dilemma. <i>Kate was in a <b>quandary</b>.</i>
Behave in a specified way. The landlord issued a notice to <b>quit</b> .
Put into a recess. The talks <b>recess</b> ed at 2 15.
Choose not to consume. He <b>refrain</b> ed from hitting him back.
Grant a respite to someone especially a person condemned to death. The refugee encampments will provide some <b>respite</b> from the suffering.



<u>stalemate</u>	Subject to a stalemate. The war had again reached <b>stalemate</b> .
stanch	Stop the flow of a liquid.
standstill	An interruption of normal activity. The traffic came to a <b>standstill</b> .
<u>stasis</u>	A period or state of inactivity or equilibrium. <i>Long periods of <b>stasis</b>.</i>
stop	Used in telegrams to indicate a full stop. The rain had <b>stop</b> ped and the clouds had cleared.
suspension	Temporary cessation or suspension. A <b>suspension</b> of maize starch in arachis oil.
walkout	A strike in which the workers walk out.
