Synonyms of "Deadpan" as an adjective (16 Words)

blank	(of a surface) not written or printed on. A blank cartridge.
dispassionate	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>She dealt with life's disasters in a calm dispassionate way.</i>
empty	Emptied of emotion. <i>After skipped lunch the men were empty by supertime.</i>
expressionless	(of a person's face or voice) not conveying any emotion; unemotional. <i>His face remained expressionless as the verdict was read.</i>
fixed	Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O'Brien. <i>How's the club fixed for money now.</i>

glazed	Having a shiny surface or coating. <i>She had a glazed look in her eyes.</i>
impassive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>He remained impassive showing neither interest in nor concern for our plight.</i>
inexpressive	Not expressive. <i>An inexpressive face.</i>
inscrutable	Impossible to understand or interpret. <i>Guy looked blankly inscrutable.</i>
lifeless	Not having the capacity to support life. <i>His lifeless body was taken from the river.</i>
poker-faced	Deliberately impassive in manner.
stony	(of a meteorite) consisting mostly of rock, as opposed to metal. <i>Stony ground.</i>
unexpressive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>His big brown eyes were dull and unexpressive.</i>
unresponsive	Not responsive. <i>These symptoms may be unresponsive to conventional treatment.</i>
vacant	(of a position or employment) not filled. <i>The President resigned and the post was left vacant.</i>
wooden	Like or characteristic of wood. <i>She closed the heavy wooden door.</i>

blank	Become blank or empty. <i>Blank pages.</i>
chilly	Not characterized by emotion-C.W.Cunningham. <i>A female form in marble a chilly but ideal medium for depicting abstract virtues.</i>
composure	The state or feeling of being calm and in control of oneself. <i>He accepted their problems with composure and she with equanimity.</i>

coy	Showing marked and often playful or irritating evasiveness or reluctance to make a definite or committing statement. <i>He is coy about his age.</i>
demure	Affectedly modest or shy especially in a playful or provocative way. <i>Antonia was pensive and demure.</i>
emotionless	Unmoved by feeling. <i>Her voice was flat and emotionless.</i>
impassive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>His cold impassive face.</i>
inarticulate	Without joints or articulations. <i>Mention of her mother filled her with inarticulate irritation.</i>
inaudible	Unable to be heard. <i>An inaudible conversation.</i>
indifferent	Lacking importance; not mattering one way or the other. <i>The universe is neither hostile nor friendly it is simply indifferent.</i>
monotone	(of a voice or other sound) unchanging in pitch; without intonation or expressiveness. <i>He sat and answered the questions in a monotone.</i>
muted	(of colour or lighting) not bright; subdued. <i>Muted anger.</i>
noiseless	Silent or very quiet. <i>Th inaudible and noiseless foot of time.</i>
pacific	Relating to or bordering the Pacific Ocean. <i>The result of this pacific policy was that no troops were called up.</i>
phlegmatic	Showing little emotion. <i>The phlegmatic British character.</i>
reticent	Cool and formal in manner. <i>She was extremely reticent about her personal affairs.</i>
shy	Nervous or timid in the company of other people. <i>Otters are very shy animals.</i>
silence	The fact or state of abstaining from speech. <i>There was a shocked silence.</i>
silent	(of a person) not prone to speak much; taciturn. <i>Gave silent consent.</i>
stolid	Calm, dependable, and showing little emotion or animation. <i>A stolid bourgeois gent.</i>

subdued	(of a person or their manner) quiet and rather reflective or depressed. <i>Children were subdued and silent.</i>
<u>taciturn</u>	Habitually reserved and uncommunicative. <i>After such gatherings she would be taciturn and morose.</i>
<u>tranquil</u>	Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>She became more tranquil.</i>
tranquilize	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
uncommunicative	Unwilling to talk or impart information. <i>The uncommunicative Emily disappeared.</i>
unflappable	Not easily perturbed or excited or upset; marked by extreme calm and composure. <i>I prided myself on being unflappable even in the most chaotic circumstances.</i>
unutterable	Too sacred to be uttered. <i>Moments of unutterable grief.</i>
voice	The melody carried by a particular voice or instrument in polyphonic music. <i>The Times is not the voice of New York.</i>
<u>withdrawn</u>	Withdrawn from society seeking solitude. <i>When her husband died she became very withdrawn.</i>
wordless	Expressed without speech. <i>A simple wordless melody.</i>
