darling

A special loved one.
*He is the **darling** of Labour's left wing.*

dearest

A beloved person; used as terms of endearment.
*You make me so happy **dearest**.*

endearing person

A grammatical category used in the classification of pronouns, possessive determiners, and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker, the addressee, or a third party.

honey

Any sweet substance similar to bees honey.
*It's one **honey** of an adaptation.*

lamb

The flesh of a lamb as food.
***Lamb** chops.*

love

A beloved person used as terms of endearment.
*Don't fret there's a **love**.*

loved one	Sexual activities (often including sexual intercourse) between two people.
precious	Used as a term of address for a beloved person. <i>Don't be frightened my precious.</i>
sweet	The sweet part or element of something. <i>The sweets of office.</i>
sweetheart	Any well-liked individual. <i>He's a sweetheart.</i>
treasure	A much loved or highly valued person. <i>The children returned from the seashore with their shells and other treasures.</i>

<u>delightful</u>	Causing delight; charming. <i>A delightful secluded garden.</i>
<u>devout</u>	Deeply religious. <i>She was a devout Catholic.</i>
earnest	Sincerely earnest. <i>Both sides were deeply in earnest even passionate.</i>
<u>enchanting</u>	Delightfully charming or attractive. <i>Dinah looked enchanting.</i>
<u>endearing</u>	Lovable especially in a childlike or naive way. <i>An endearing little grin.</i>
engaging	Charming and attractive. <i>An engaging smile.</i>
exorbitant	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Exorbitant rent.</i>
<u>expensive</u>	High in price or charging high prices. <i>Keeping a horse is expensive.</i>
extortionate	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Extortionate prices.</i>
favoured	Preferred or recommended. <i>The most favoured destination of visitors to Canada.</i>
favourite	Appealing to the general public. <i>Their favourite Italian restaurant.</i>
good	Having the normally expected amount. <i>A good mechanic.</i>
heartfelt	(of a feeling or its expression) deeply and strongly felt; sincere. <i>Heartfelt condolences.</i>
high-priced	Having a high price.

lovable	Inspiring or deserving love or affection. <i>He has a lovable sweet personality.</i>
loved	Held dear. <i>His loved companion of many years.</i>
lovely	Appealing to the emotions as well as the eye. <i>Lovely views.</i>
much loved	Great in quantity or degree or extent.
near	Located on the nearside of a vehicle. <i>They are near equals.</i>
nice	Socially or conventionally correct; refined or virtuous. <i>A nice shot.</i>
overpriced	Too costly for the value. <i>Overpriced hotels.</i>
<u>pleasant</u>	Having pleasing manners or behavior. <i>They found him pleasant and cooperative.</i>
precious	Held in great esteem for admirable qualities especially of an intrinsic nature. <i>Precious works of art.</i>
pricey	Having a high price. <i>Boutiques selling pricey clothes.</i>
pricy	Having a high price.
<u>prized</u>	Of superior grade. <i>The bicycle was her most prized possession.</i>
special	Used to denote education for children with particular needs especially those with learning difficulties. <i>A special adviser to the committee.</i>
<u>sweet</u>	With sweetening added. <i>A sweet little cat.</i>
<u>treasured</u>	Characterized by feeling or showing fond affection for. <i>A treasured heirloom.</i>
valued	Considered to be important or beneficial; cherished. <i>Triple valued.</i>
winning	Attractive; endearing. <i>A winning personality.</i>
winsome	Attractive or appealing in a fresh, innocent way. <i>A winsome smile.</i>

countryman	A person from the same country as someone else. <i>They trust a fellow countryman.</i>
dame	An elderly or mature woman. <i>A rich dame who took her husband to the cleaners.</i>
darling	(in affected use) pretty; charming. <i>A darling little pillbox hat.</i>
dote	A sweet or adorable person. <i>The parson is now old and dotes.</i>
eros	(Greek mythology) god of love; son of Aphrodite; identified with Roman Cupid.
esquire	(Middle Ages) an attendant and shield bearer to a knight; a candidate for knighthood. <i>The lord of the manor, Richard Bethell Esquire.</i>
fondly	With affection or liking. <i>They fondly believed the cheers were for them.</i>
friendship	A relationship between friends. <i>This is an ideal group for finding support and friendship.</i>
guy	Steady or support with a guy wire or cable. <i>She never stopped guying him about his weight.</i>
heterosexual	A heterosexual person someone having a sexual orientation to persons of the opposite sex. <i>Heterosexual relationships.</i>
husband	A married man considered in relation to his spouse. <i>She and her husband are both retired.</i>
lady	Used as a courteous designation for a female fellow member of the House of Commons. <i>A portrait of the lady of the house.</i>
lovely	Very pleasant or enjoyable; delightful. <i>Don t worry my lovely.</i>
ma'am	A woman of refinement.
madam	A conceited or bossy girl or young woman. <i>She s a proper little madam.</i>
paramour	A woman's lover.
partner	Associate or work together as partners. <i>She lived with her partner.</i>

philander	Have amorous affairs; of men. <i>Married men who philander.</i>
platonic	Free from physical desire. <i>Their relationship is purely platonic.</i>
<u>romantic</u>	A writer or artist of the romantic movement. <i>He s very handsome and so romantic.</i>
<u>sincere</u>	(of a person) saying what they genuinely feel or believe; not dishonest or hypocritical. <i>She d sounded sincere enough.</i>
<u>sir</u>	Used as a title before the forename of a knight or baronet. <i>Excuse me sir.</i>
<u>tempt</u>	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>There ll always be someone tempted by the rich pickings of poaching.</i>
valuable	Something of value. <i>Put all your valuables in the hotel safe.</i>
venerable	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a title given to a deceased person who has attained a certain degree of sanctity but has not been fully beatified or canonized. <i>A venerable statesman.</i>
