- *Capable of being disproved.*



Synonyms of "Debatable" as an adjective (28 Words)

- arguable** Open to argument or debate.
*A highly **arguable** assumption.*
- borderline** Only just acceptable in quality or as belonging to a category.
*References may be requested in **borderline** cases.*
- contentious** Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits.
*The socio economic plan had been the subject of **contentious** debate.*
- controversial** Giving rise or likely to give rise to controversy or public disagreement.
*Rushdie s **controversial** book.*
- disputable** Capable of being disproved.
*Whether it can be described as art criticism may be **disputable**.*
- doubtful** Unsettled in mind or opinion.
*The fire was of **doubtful** origin.*

dubious	Not to be relied upon; suspect. <i>Dubious about agreeing to go.</i>
in doubt	Currently fashionable.
inconclusive	Not conclusive; not putting an end to doubt or question. <i>Inconclusive evidence.</i>
moot	Open to argument or debate. <i>It is a moot point whether such a controversial scheme would have succeeded.</i>
open to debate	Full of small openings or gaps.
open to doubt	With no protection or shield.
open to question	Ready for business.
problematic	Open to doubt or debate. <i>The situation was problematic for teachers.</i>
problematical	Making great mental demands; hard to comprehend or solve or believe. <i>The weighting of votes was particularly problematical.</i>
questionable	Subject to question. <i>His questionable financial deals.</i>
subject to debate	Likely to be affected by something.
uncertain	(of a person) not completely confident or sure of something. <i>The weather is uncertain.</i>
unclear	Not easy to see, hear, or understand. <i>The motive for this killing is unclear.</i>
unconfirmed	Not finally established or settled. <i>Unconfirmed rumors.</i>
undecided	Not brought to a conclusion; subject to further thought. <i>The match was still undecided.</i>
undetermined	Not known. <i>Of undetermined species.</i>
unknown	Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>A poem by an unknown author.</i>
unresolved	Characterized by musical dissonance harmonically unresolved. <i>A number of issues remain unresolved.</i>
unsettled	Still in doubt. <i>Unsettled territory.</i>
unsure	Lacking self-confidence. <i>A very unsure young man.</i>

Usage Examples of "Debatable" as an adjective

- *It is debatable whether the country is coming out of recession.*



Associations of "Debatable" (30 Words)

- argue** Exchange or express diverging or opposite views, typically in a heated or angry way.
*The evidence **argues** for your claim.*
- argument** An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and the value is y .
*There was some **argument** about the decision.*
- cloture** A rule for limiting or ending debate in a deliberative body.
***Cloture** the discussion.*

<u>contention</u>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>Freud s contention that all dreams were wish fulfilment.</i>
<u>contentious</u>	Relating to or involving differences between contending parties. <i>The socio economic plan had been the subject of contentious debate.</i>
contentiousness	An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.
contributor	A person who donates to a cause. <i>Stress is a major contributor to most diseases.</i>
<u>controversial</u>	Marked by or capable of arousing controversy. <i>Rushdie s controversial book.</i>
<u>controversy</u>	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The announcement ended a protracted controversy.</i>
debate	Argue about (a subject), especially in a formal manner. <i>Members of the society debated for five nights.</i>
<u>discourse</u>	A connected series of utterances; a text or conversation. <i>The language of political discourse.</i>
discussion	The action or process of talking about something in order to reach a decision or to exchange ideas. <i>See Appendix One for a more detailed discussion.</i>
disproof	The act of determining that something is false. <i>The answer ought to turn on considerations that are susceptible to verification or disproof.</i>
disputable	Capable of being disproved. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be disputable.</i>
disputation	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>Scholastic disputations.</i>
disputatious	Fond of having heated arguments. <i>It s a congenial hang out for disputatious academics.</i>
<u>enthuse</u>	Utter with enthusiasm. <i>Public art is a tonic that can enthuse alienated youth.</i>
forum	A public facility to meet for open discussion. <i>We hope these pages act as a forum for debate.</i>
hassel	Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981).
interlocutor	The performer in the middle of a minstrel line who engages the others in talk.
issue	Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government. <i>The minister issued a statement.</i>

litigious	Suitable to become the subject of a lawsuit. <i>Our increasingly litigious society.</i>
<u>panel</u>	Decorate with panels. <i>Empanel prospective jurors.</i>
polemical	Of or involving strongly critical or disputatious writing or speech. <i>A polemical essay.</i>
<u>quarrel</u>	Complain or scold someone. <i>They had a quarrel.</i>
quarrelsome	Given to quarreling. <i>Quarrelsome when drinking.</i>
<u>questionable</u>	Able to be refuted. <i>A fire of questionable origin.</i>
refutable	Able to be refuted.
<u>rivalry</u>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>There always has been intense rivalry between the clubs.</i>
unconfirmed	Not confirmed as to truth or validity. <i>An unconfirmed report of shots being fired.</i>
