arduous	Taxing to the utmost; testing powers of endurance. <i>The arduous work of preparing a dictionary.</i>
backbreaking	Characterized by effort to the point of exhaustion; especially physical effort.
bored	Feeling weary and impatient because one is unoccupied or lacks interest in one’s current activity. <i>The bored gaze of the successful film star.</i>
boring	The act of drilling a hole in the earth in the hope of producing petroleum. <i>A boring evening with uninteresting people.</i>
disease	A disorder of structure or function in a human, animal, or plant, especially one that produces specific symptoms or that affects a specific location and is not simply a direct result of physical injury. <i>We are suffering from the British disease of self deprecation.</i>
draining	Having a debilitating effect.
emotionally	In an emotional manner. <i>An opportunity for parent and child to connect emotionally.</i>
ennui	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>He succumbed to ennui and despair.</i>
erosion	Erosion by chemical action. <i>The erosion of support for the party.</i>
exhausting	Producing exhaustion. <i>An exhausting march.</i>
grueling	Characterized by effort to the point of exhaustion; especially physical effort. <i>A grueling campaign.</i>
humdrum	Tediously repetitious or lacking in variety. <i>Humdrum routine work.</i>

illness	Impairment of normal physiological function affecting part or all of an organism. <i>I ve never missed a day s work through illness.</i>
irksome	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>An irksome journey.</i>
monotonous	(of a sound or utterance) lacking in variation in tone or pitch. <i>The statistics that he quotes with monotonous regularity.</i>
onerous	Not easily borne; wearing. <i>An onerous lease.</i>
overtax	Require to pay too much tax. <i>Do athletes overtax their hearts.</i>
physical	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. <i>A very physical dance performance.</i>
plumbing	The work of installing and maintaining a plumbing system. <i>The kitchen has a gas cooker point and plumbing for an automatic washing machine.</i>
taxing	Not easily borne; wearing. <i>They find the work too taxing.</i>
tedious	Too long, slow, or dull; tiresome or monotonous. <i>A tedious journey.</i>
tire	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>The media will tire of publicizing every protest.</i>
tired	In need of sleep or rest; weary. <i>She was tired out now that the strain was over.</i>
tiresome	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>Weeding is a tiresome but essential job.</i>
tiring	Causing one to need rest or sleep; fatiguing. <i>It had been a tiring day.</i>
toilet	A room building or cubicle containing a toilet or toilets. <i>Pensions are in the toilet.</i>
toilsome	Involving hard or tedious work. <i>Toilsome chores.</i>
uninteresting	Characteristic or suggestive of an institution especially in being uniform or dull or unimaginative. <i>A very uninteresting account of her trip.</i>

wearing	Geology the mechanical process of wearing or grinding something down as by particles washing over it. <i>A plan of action will make the whole event a less wearing experience.</i>
wearisome	Causing one to feel tired or bored. <i>Other people s dreams are dreadfully wearisome.</i>
