advert	An advertisement.
assemblage	Several things grouped together or considered as a whole. <i>Some vast assemblage of gears and cogs.</i>
assembly	A group of people elected to make laws or decisions for a particular country or region. <i>He was told off for talking in assembly.</i>
associational	Of or relating to associations or associationism.
attend	Pay attention to. <i>The children in the audience attended the recital quietly.</i>
attendee	A person who attends a conference or other gathering. <i>The gathering satisfied both organizers and attendees.</i>
audible	A football play is changed orally after both teams have assumed their positions at the line of scrimmage. <i>He saw two safeties sneaking up and called an audible.</i>
audience	An opportunity to state your case and be heard. <i>The programme attracted an audience of almost twenty million.</i>
brief	Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>A pair of extremely brief black shorts.</i>
conference	Take part in a conference or conference call. <i>I conferenced with a senior analyst at the Congressional Research Service.</i>
congress	A national legislative assembly. <i>An international congress of mathematicians.</i>
consult	An act of consulting a professional a consultation. <i>Patients are entitled to be consulted about their treatment.</i>
convene	Come or bring together for a meeting or activity; assemble. <i>The students were convened in the auditorium.</i>

conversation	A talk, especially an informal one, between two or more people, in which news and ideas are exchanged. <i>The two men were deep in conversation.</i>
convocation	A group gathered in response to a summons. <i>The arguments delayed the convocation of the first congress planned for February 1992.</i>
convoke	Call together. <i>She sent messages convoking a Council of Ministers.</i>
gathering	The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i>
listen	An act of listening to something. <i>If I've had a stressful day I love to chill out and listen to music.</i>
meeting	A formally arranged gathering. <i>There was an informal meeting in my living room.</i>
minutes	A written account of what transpired at a meeting.
overhear	Hear (someone or something) without meaning to or without the knowledge of the speaker. <i>We overheard the conversation at the next table.</i>
pithiness	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
plenary	Full in all respects. <i>The following speakers will present plenary addresses at the conference.</i>
report	Be responsible for reporting the details of as in journalism. <i>The report of his speech.</i>
<u>seminar</u>	A class at university in which a topic is discussed by a teacher and a small group of students. <i>A seminar group of sixteen students.</i>
<u>session</u>	A period of recording music in a studio especially by a session musician. <i>The governor called this week's special session to reconsider the decision.</i>
<u>snapshot</u>	A record of the contents of a storage location or data file at a given time. <i>A collection of family snapshots.</i>
<u>speaker</u>	A person who speaks a specified language. <i>The two speakers let the netbook feature stereo sound.</i>
succinctness	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
uninformative	Not providing particularly useful or interesting information. <i>The coverage is brief and uninformative.</i>
