affirm	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>Good teachers know that students need to be both affirmed and challenged.</i>
announce	Make known make an announcement. <i>He announced his retirement from international football.</i>
assert	Postulate positively and assertively. <i>Women should assert themselves more.</i>
aver	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>I don t have to do anything it s his problem he averred.</i>
confirm	Administer the rite of confirmation to. <i>The Senate confirmed the President s candidate for Secretary of Defense.</i>
corroborate	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The witness had corroborated the boy s account of the attack.</i>
declare	Declare to be. <i>Pakistan declared at 446 for four.</i>
denudation	The removal of covering.
disclose	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>The curtain rose to disclose a stunning set.</i>
disclosed	Made known (especially something secret or concealed). <i>The disclosed purpose of their wicked plan.</i>
disclosure	The action of making new or secret information known. <i>A judge ordered the disclosure of the government documents.</i>
display	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>Both players displayed a great deal of spirit.</i>
exhibit	An exhibition. <i>The museum had many exhibits of oriental art.</i>

expatiate	Speak or write in detail about. <i>She expatiated on working class novelists.</i>
expose	Expose or make accessible to some action or influence. <i>Students were exposed to statistics in high school.</i>
express	Give expression to. <i>She would express her milk using a pump and take it home for her baby.</i>
expressionism	A style of painting, music, or drama in which the artist or writer seeks to express the inner world of emotion rather than external reality.
fallacy	A misconception resulting from incorrect reasoning. <i>The potential for fallacy which lies behind the notion of self esteem.</i>
indicate	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>His tone indicated that he didn't hold out much hope.</i>
invalidate	Deprive (an official document or procedure) of legal validity because it contravenes a regulation or law. <i>A technical flaw in her papers invalidated her nomination.</i>
justify	Show to be reasonable or provide adequate ground for. <i>The situation was grave enough to justify further investigation.</i>
publicly	So as to be seen by other people; in public. <i>She admitted publicly to being a communist.</i>
reveal	Make (something) known to humans by divine or supernatural means. <i>The truth revealed at the Incarnation.</i>
shallowness	Lack of physical depth. <i>Take into account the shallowness at that end of the pool before you dive.</i>
substantiate	Establish or strengthen as with new evidence or facts. <i>Our ideas must be substantiated into actions.</i>
theodicy	The branch of theology that defends God's goodness and justice in the face of the existence of evil. <i>Those seeking a theodicy.</i>
uncover	Make visible. <i>He stopped short reverentially uncovered and stood bare headed till the line of mourners had passed.</i>
unveil	Remove the cover from. <i>Women must not unveil themselves in public in some religious societies.</i>
verify	Check or regulate (a scientific experiment) by conducting a parallel experiment or comparing with another standard. <i>Can you verify that the guns are licensed.</i>

vindicate

Clear (someone) of blame or suspicion.
*You must **vindicate** yourself and fight this libel.*
