<b>confirm</b>	Administer the rite of confirmation to. <i>The Senate <b>confirmed</b> the President s candidate for Secretary of Defense.</i>
<a href="#">corroborate</a>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The witness had <b>corroborated</b> the boy s account of the attack.</i>
<a href="#">declare</a>	Declare to be. <i>Pakistan <b>declared</b> at 446 for four.</i>
<b>denudation</b>	The removal of covering.
<b>disclose</b>	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>The curtain rose to <b>disclose</b> a stunning set.</i>
<b>disclosed</b>	Made known (especially something secret or concealed). <i>The <b>disclosed</b> purpose of their wicked plan.</i>
<a href="#">disclosure</a>	The action of making new or secret information known. <i>A judge ordered the <b>disclosure</b> of the government documents.</i>
<b>display</b>	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>Both players <b>displayed</b> a great deal of spirit.</i>
<b>exhibit</b>	An exhibition. <i>The museum had many <b>exhibits</b> of oriental art.</i>

<b>expatiate</b>	Speak or write in detail about. <i>She <b>expatiated</b> on working class novelists.</i>
<b>expose</b>	Expose or make accessible to some action or influence. <i>Students were <b>exposed</b> to statistics in high school.</i>
<b>express</b>	Give expression to. <i>She would <b>express</b> her milk using a pump and take it home for her baby.</i>
<b>expressionism</b>	A style of painting, music, or drama in which the artist or writer seeks to express the inner world of emotion rather than external reality.
<b>fallacy</b>	A misconception resulting from incorrect reasoning. <i>The potential for <b>fallacy</b> which lies behind the notion of self esteem.</i>
<b>indicate</b>	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>His tone <b>indicated</b> that he didn't hold out much hope.</i>
<b>invalidate</b>	Deprive (an official document or procedure) of legal validity because it contravenes a regulation or law. <i>A technical flaw in her papers <b>invalidated</b> her nomination.</i>
<b>justify</b>	Show to be reasonable or provide adequate ground for. <i>The situation was grave enough to <b>justify</b> further investigation.</i>
<b>publicly</b>	So as to be seen by other people; in public. <i>She admitted <b>publicly</b> to being a communist.</i>
<b>reveal</b>	Make (something) known to humans by divine or supernatural means. <i>The truth <b>revealed</b> at the Incarnation.</i>
<b>shallowness</b>	Lack of physical depth. <i>Take into account the <b>shallowness</b> at that end of the pool before you dive.</i>
<b>substantiate</b>	Establish or strengthen as with new evidence or facts. <i>Our ideas must be <b>substantiated</b> into actions.</i>
<b>theodicy</b>	The branch of theology that defends God's goodness and justice in the face of the existence of evil. <i>Those seeking a <b>theodicy</b>.</i>
<b>uncover</b>	Make visible. <i>He stopped short reverentially <b>uncovered</b> and stood bare headed till the line of mourners had passed.</i>
<b>unveil</b>	Remove the cover from. <i>Women must not <b>unveil</b> themselves in public in some religious societies.</i>
<b>verify</b>	Check or regulate (a scientific experiment) by conducting a parallel experiment or comparing with another standard. <i>Can you <b>verify</b> that the guns are licensed.</i>
