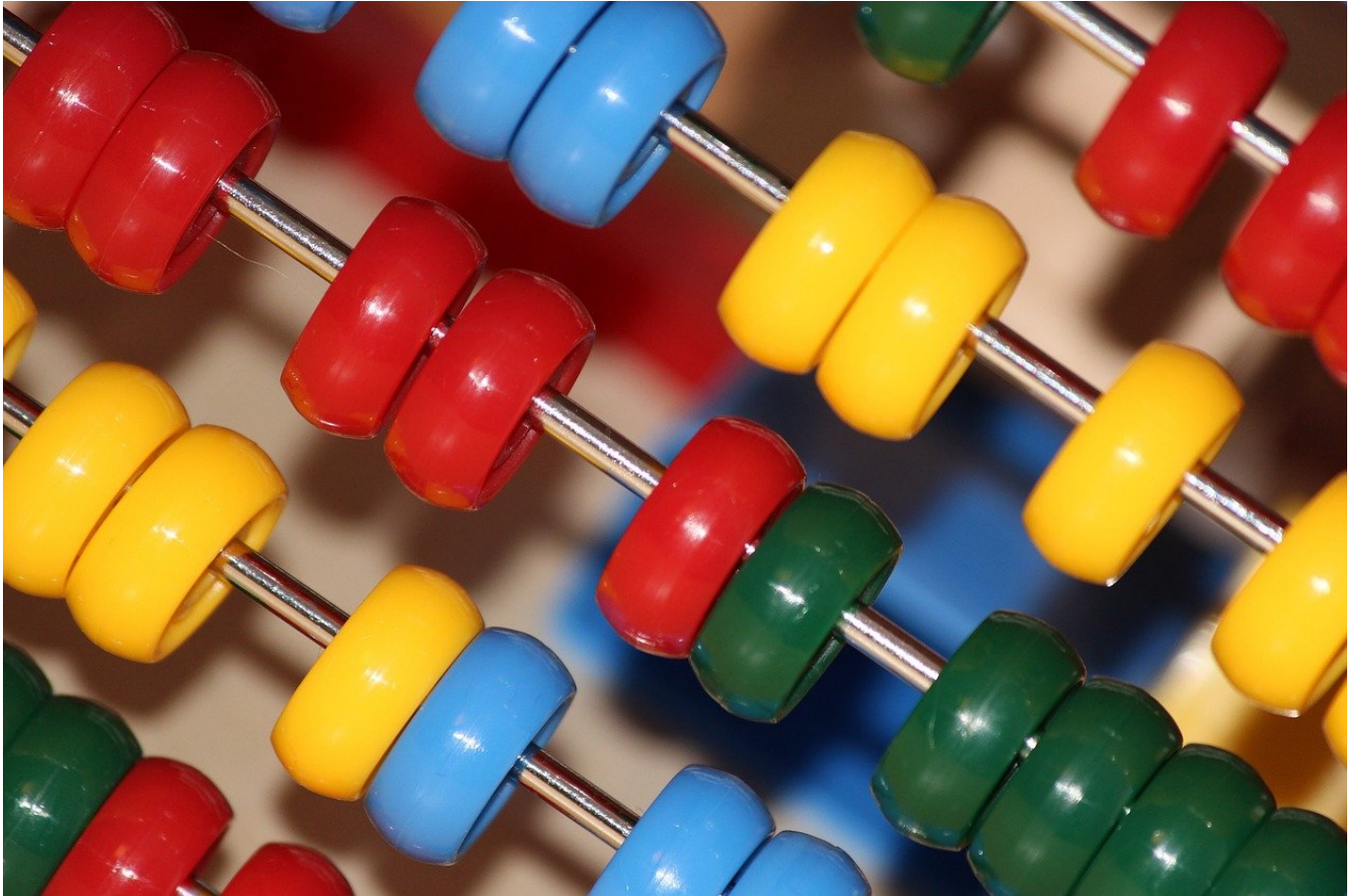

<b>dissoluteness</b>	The process of going into solution.

<b>epicureanism</b>	A person devoted to refined sensuous enjoyment (especially good food and drink).
<b>hedonism</b>	An ethical system that evaluates the pursuit of pleasure as the highest good.
<b>immoderateness</b>	The quality of being excessive and lacking in moderation.
<b>immorality</b>	Morally objectionable behavior. <i>He believed his father had been punished by God for his <b>immorality</b>.</i>
<b>intemperance</b>	Excessive indulgence, especially in alcohol. <i>His occasional <b>intemperance</b> of tone.</i>
<b>lack of control</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of morals</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of principles</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of restraint</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of self-control</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>licentiousness</b>	The quality of being lewd and lascivious.
<b>moral decay</b>	The significance of a story or event.
<b>self-indulgence</b>	Excess in action and immoderate indulgence of bodily appetites, especially in passion or indulgence.
<b>sinfulness</b>	Estrangement from god.
<b>vice</b>	An immoral or wicked personal characteristic. <i><b>Vice</b> offends the moral standards of the community.</i>
<b>wantonness</b>	The trait of lacking restraint or control; reckless freedom from inhibition or worry.

- decay** Fall into decay or ruin.  
*He developed a detector for **decays** of carbon 14.*
- declension** Process of changing to an inferior state.  
*This **declension** involves only two endings a nominative and an oblique.*

<b>decline</b>	A gradual decrease; as of stored charge or current. <i>He <b>declined</b> to join the group on a hike.</i>
<b>degeneracy</b>	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>Moral <b>degeneracy</b> followed intellectual degeneration.</i>
<b>degeneration</b>	The process of declining from a higher to a lower level of effective power or vitality or essential quality. <i>Overgrazing has caused serious <b>degeneration</b> of grassland.</i>
<b>depravity</b>	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>Its brothels its opium parlors its <b>depravity</b>.</i>
<b>deteriorate</b>	Grow worse. <i>Her condition <b>deteriorated</b>.</i>
<b>deterioration</b>	A symptom of reduced quality or strength. <i>A <b>deterioration</b> in the condition of the patient.</i>
<b>egoism</b>	Concern for your own interests and welfare.
<b>greed</b>	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>Mercenaries who had allowed <b>greed</b> to overtake their principles.</i>
<b>hedonism</b>	The pursuit of pleasure as a matter of ethical principle.
<b>hedonistic</b>	Engaged in the pursuit of pleasure; sensually self-indulgent. <i>A <b>hedonistic</b> existence of booze drugs and parties.</i>
<b>immoral</b>	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. <i>Unseemly and <b>immoral</b> behaviour.</i>
<b>lurid</b>	Horrible in fierceness or savagery. <i><b>Lurid</b> details of the accident.</i>
<b>narcissism</b>	Excessive interest in or admiration of oneself and one's physical appearance.
<b>promiscuity</b>	The fact or state of being promiscuous. <i>Some fear this will lead to greater sexual <b>promiscuity</b> amongst teens.</i>
<b>putrefaction</b>	The process of decay caused by bacterial or fungal action. <i>The breeze shifted and we caught the stench of <b>putrefaction</b>.</i>
<b>regressive</b>	Adjusted so that the rate decreases as the amount of income increases. <i>Indirect taxes are as a group <b>regressive</b>.</i>
<b>selfish</b>	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others- Maria Weston Chapman. <i>I joined them for <b>selfish</b> reasons.</i>
<b>selfishness</b>	The quality or state of being selfish; lack of consideration for other people. <i>An act of pure <b>selfishness</b>.</i>



Lack of thoroughness, depth of character, or serious thought.

**superficiality** *The ignorance and **superficiality** of the media hinder a serious examination of the question.*

**uncivil**

Discourteous; impolite.

*He d been short and **uncivil** with her.*

**vanity**

The quality of being valueless or futile.

*A **vanity** press.*

**venereal**

Relating to venereal disease.

***Venereal** disease.*

**worse**

Changed for the worse in health or fitness.

*The movement made the pain **worse**.*

**worsen**

Grow worse.

*Her condition **worsened** on the flight.*
