genteel	Marked by refinement in taste and manners. A genteel old lady.
good	Most suitable or right for a particular purpose. <i>Accustom the child to being rewarded for good behaviour.</i>
good enough	Morally admirable.
honest	Not forged. An honest working stiff.
honourable	Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent. A long and honourable career.
in good taste	Holding office.
incorrupt	Not decayed. A policeman who was incorrupt and incorruptible .
law-abiding	Adhering strictly to laws and rules and customs.
modest	(of clothing) not revealing or emphasizing a person's body. Drink modest amounts of alcohol.

suitable	Right or appropriate for a particular person, purpose, or situation. <i>These toys are not suitable for children under five.</i>
tasteful	Having or showing or conforming to good taste. <i>A tasteful lounge bar.</i>
tolerable	About average; acceptable. <i>The climate is at least tolerable.</i>

innocent	Free from moral wrong; not corrupted. <i>A man innocent of war s cruelties.</i>
inoffensive	Giving no offense. <i>Inoffensive behavior.</i>
intermediate	A person at an intermediate level of knowledge or skill. <i>Intermediate stages in a process.</i>
moderate	A person who holds moderate views especially in politics. <i>John moderated the discussion.</i>
<u>modest</u>	Relatively moderate, limited, or small. <i>Modest dress means that hemlines must be below the knee.</i>
<u>outspoken</u>	Frank in stating one's opinions, especially if they are shocking or controversial. <i>Outspoken in their opposition to segregation.</i>
