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## Associations of "Decimated" (30 Words)

<b>ablation</b>	The erosive process that reduces the size of glaciers.
<b>abolish</b>	Formally put an end to (a system, practice, or institution). <i>The tax was <b>abolished</b> in 1977.</i>
<b><a href="#">annihilate</a></b>	Convert (a subatomic particle) into radiant energy. <i>The stronger force <b>annihilated</b> its opponent virtually without loss.</i>
<b><a href="#">cull</a></b>	An inferior or surplus livestock animal selected for culling. <i>He sees <b>culling</b> deer as a necessity.</i>
<b><a href="#">delete</a></b>	Remove or obliterate (written or printed matter), especially by drawing a line through it. <i>If one important gene is <b>deleted</b> from an animal s DNA other genes can stand in.</i>
<b><a href="#">demolish</a></b>	Humiliate or depress completely. <i>The wrecking ball <b>demolished</b> the building.</i>
<b>demolition</b>	The act of demolishing. <i>Ireland s <b>demolition</b> of England.</i>
<b>destroy</b>	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>He has been determined to <b>destroy</b> her.</i>
<b><a href="#">destruction</a></b>	The termination of something by causing so much damage to it that it cannot be repaired or no longer exists. <i>The avalanche left a trail of <b>destruction</b>.</i>
<b>efface</b>	Cause (a memory or emotion) to disappear completely. <i>Nothing could <b>efface</b> the bitter memory.</i>
<b>eliminate</b>	Eliminate from the body. <i><b>Eliminate</b> my debts.</i>
<b>eradicate</b>	Kill in large numbers. <i>This disease has been <b>eradicated</b> from the world.</i>

<b>erasable</b>	Capable of being effaced. <i>A signal too loud to be <b>erasable</b> in a single pass through the erase head.</i>
<b>erase</b>	Rub out or remove (writing or marks). <i>The file has been <b>erased</b> from the hard disk.</i>
<b>eraser</b>	A piece of soft rubber or plastic used to rub out something written.
<b>excision</b>	The act of pulling up or out; uprooting; cutting off from existence. <i>Both parties agreed on the <b>excision</b> of the proposed clause.</i> Kill (a pest).
<b>exterminate</b>	<i>Hitler wanted to <b>exterminate</b> the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
<b>extirpate</b>	Surgically remove (an organ). <i>Timber wolves were <b>extirpated</b> from New England more than a century ago.</i>
<b>extirpation</b>	The act of pulling up or out; uprooting; cutting off from existence.
<b>null</b>	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <b>Null and void.</b>
<b>nullify</b>	Make legally null and void; invalidate. <i>Judges were unwilling to <b>nullify</b> government decisions.</i>
<b>obliterate</b>	Remove completely from recognition or memory. <i>The memory was so painful that he <b>obliterated</b> it from his mind.</i>
<b>obviate</b>	Do away with. <i>The presence of roller blinds <b>obviated</b> the need for curtains.</i>
<b>raze</b>	Completely destroy (a building, town, or other settlement). <i>Villages were <b>razed</b> to the ground.</i>
<b>remove</b>	Remove from a position or an office. <i>He <b>removed</b> his children to the countryside.</i>
<b>ruthlessly</b>	Without pity or compassion for others. <i>They fell prey to money lenders who <b>ruthlessly</b> exploited them.</i>
<b>squander</b>	Spend thoughtlessly; throw away. <i>100m of taxpayers money has been <b>squandered</b> on administering the tax.</i>
<b>stump</b>	Use a stump on a drawing line etc. <i>Education chiefs were <b>stumped</b> by some of the exam questions.</i>
<b>uproot</b>	Move (people) forcibly from their homeland into a new and foreign environment. <i>The war <b>uprooted</b> many people.</i>
