Associations of "Decimated" (30 Words)

ablation	The erosive process that reduces the size of glaciers.
abolish	Formally put an end to (a system, practice, or institution). <i>The tax was abolished in 1977.</i>
annihilate	Convert (a subatomic particle) into radiant energy. <i>The stronger force annihilated its opponent virtually without loss.</i>
cull	An inferior or surplus livestock animal selected for culling. <i>He sees culling deer as a necessity.</i>
delete	Remove or obliterate (written or printed matter), especially by drawing a line through it. <i>If one important gene is deleted from an animal s DNA other genes can stand in.</i>
demolish	Humiliate or depress completely. <i>The wrecking ball demolished the building.</i>
demolition	The act of demolishing. <i>Ireland s demolition of England.</i>
destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>He has been determined to destroy her.</i>
destruction	The termination of something by causing so much damage to it that it cannot be repaired or no longer exists. <i>The avalanche left a trail of destruction.</i>
efface	Cause (a memory or emotion) to disappear completely. <i>Nothing could efface the bitter memory.</i>
eliminate	Eliminate from the body. <i>Eliminate my debts.</i>
eradicate	Kill in large numbers. <i>This disease has been eradicated from the world.</i>

erasable	Capable of being effaced. <i>A signal too loud to be erasable in a single pass through the erase head.</i>
erase	Rub out or remove (writing or marks). <i>The file has been erased from the hard disk.</i>
eraser	A piece of soft rubber or plastic used to rub out something written.
excision	The act of pulling up or out; uprooting; cutting off from existence. <i>Both parties agreed on the excision of the proposed clause.</i> Kill (a pest).
exterminate	<i>Hitler wanted to exterminate the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
extirpate	Surgically remove (an organ). <i>Timber wolves were extirpated from New England more than a century ago.</i>
extirpation	The act of pulling up or out; uprooting; cutting off from existence.
null	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. Null and void.
nullify	Make legally null and void; invalidate. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
obliterate	Remove completely from recognition or memory. <i>The memory was so painful that he obliterated it from his mind.</i>
obviate	Do away with. <i>The presence of roller blinds obviated the need for curtains.</i>
raze	Completely destroy (a building, town, or other settlement). <i>Villages were razed to the ground.</i>
remove	Remove from a position or an office. <i>He removed his children to the countryside.</i>
ruthlessly	Without pity or compassion for others. <i>They fell prey to money lenders who ruthlessly exploited them.</i>
squander	Spend thoughtlessly; throw away. <i>100m of taxpayers money has been squandered on administering the tax.</i>
stump	Use a stump on a drawing line etc. <i>Education chiefs were stumped by some of the exam questions.</i>
uproot	Move (people) forcibly from their homeland into a new and foreign environment. <i>The war uprooted many people.</i>
