- *A plaintiff's statement of claims in proceedings.*

annunciation	The announcement of something. <i>The annunciation of a set of rules applying to the relationships between states.</i>
assertion	A confident and forceful statement of fact or belief. <i>His assertion that his father had deserted the family.</i>
<u>attestation</u>	The action of being a witness to or formally certifying something. <i>All employees must provide a written attestation that they have read and abided by this code.</i>
broadcasting	Taking part in a radio or tv program. <i>The state monopoly on broadcasting.</i>
<u>bulletin</u>	A short official statement or broadcast summary of news.
certification	The action or process of providing someone or something with an official document attesting to a status or level of achievement. <i>A fundamental requirement for organic certification.</i>
communication	Social contact. <i>Television is an effective means of communication.</i>
communiqué	An official report (usually sent in haste).
confirmation	A ceremony held in the synagogue (usually at Pentecost) to admit as adult members of the Jewish community young men and women who have successfully completed a course of study in Judaism. <i>The kind of joy mixed with tears one finds at weddings and confirmations.</i>
contract	Contract bridge the highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make. <i>The contract between the Bride and the Bridegroom was renewed.</i>
<u>disclosure</u>	A fact, especially a secret, that is made known. <i>A judge ordered the disclosure of the government documents.</i>
<u>dispatch</u>	An official report (usually sent in haste). <i>In his battle dispatch he described the gunner's bravery.</i>

edict	An official order or proclamation issued by a person in authority. <i>Clovis issued an edict protecting Church property.</i>
<u>manifestation</u>	The action or fact of showing something. <i>The manifestation of anxiety over disease.</i>
<u>manifesto</u>	A public declaration of intentions (as issued by a political party or government). <i>He may fudge key issues in the Labour manifesto.</i>
memorandum	A written message in business or diplomacy. <i>Articles of association must be signed by subscribers to the memorandum.</i>
notification	The action of notifying someone or something. <i>The notification stated the grace period and the penalties for defaulting.</i>
<u>proclamation</u>	The public or official announcement of an important matter. <i>The government restricted the use of water by proclamation.</i>
<u>profession</u>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>They were baptized on profession of faith.</i>
promulgation	The formal act of proclaiming; giving public notice. <i>His promulgation of the policy proved to be premature.</i>
pronouncement	An authoritative declaration. <i>Distrust of the pronouncements of politicians was endemic.</i>
<u>proof</u>	The strength of distilled alcoholic spirits relative to proof spirit taken as a standard of 100. <i>You will be asked to give proof of your identity.</i>
report	An employee who reports to another employee. <i>The report of his speech.</i>
resolution	Computer science the number of pixels per square inch on a computer generated display the greater the resolution the better the picture. <i>They never did achieve a final resolution of their differences.</i>
resolve	Firm determination to do something. <i>She received information that strengthened her resolve.</i>
<u>revelation</u>	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i>The revelation of a plot to assassinate the king.</i>
statement	(in the UK) an official assessment made by a local education authority concerning a child's special educational needs. <i>The hope is that they will fill the stands and terraces to make a statement about the importance of this club.</i>

testimony

A public recounting of a religious conversion or experience.
*His blackened finger was **testimony** to the fact that he had played in pain.*

validation

The action of making or declaring something legally or officially acceptable.
*We did independent **validations** for studies of therapy.*

Associations of "Declaration" (30 Words)

absolution

The act of absolving or remitting; formal redemption as pronounced by a priest in the sacrament of penance.

*She had been granted **absolution** for her sins.*

affirm

To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true.

*The referendum **affirmed** the republic's right to secede.*

affirmation

(religion) a solemn declaration that serves the same purpose as an oath (if an oath is objectionable to the person on religious or ethical grounds).
*The lack of one or both parents **affirmation** leaves some children emotionally crippled.*

allege

Claim or assert that someone has done something illegal or wrong, typically without proof.

*He **alleged** that he had been assaulted.*

announce

Make known make an announcement.

*I have a confession to make she **announced**.*

announcement	The action of making an announcement. <i>A loudspeaker announcement echoed across the field.</i>
annunciation	The announcement of something. <i>The annunciation of a set of rules applying to the relationships between states.</i>
asserting	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.
assertion	A declaration that is made emphatically (as if no supporting evidence were necessary). <i>The assertion of his legal rights.</i>
claim	Ask for legally or make a legal claim to as of debts for example. <i>The Prime Minister claimed that he was concerned about Third World debt.</i>
declamation	A rhetorical exercise or set speech. <i>Shakespearean declamation.</i>
declarative	A declarative sentence or phrase. <i>Declarative statements.</i>
declaratory	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration. <i>The decision was declaratory of the law.</i>
<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>Pakistan declared at 446 for four.</i>
emancipation	The fact or process of being set free from legal, social, or political restrictions; liberation. <i>The early struggle for emancipation from slavery.</i>
exaction	The action of demanding and obtaining something from someone, especially a payment. <i>Exaction of tribute.</i>
<u>exclaim</u>	Cry out suddenly in surprise, strong emotion, or pain. <i>Well I never she exclaimed.</i>
<u>herald</u>	Praise vociferously. <i>The speech heralded a change in policy.</i>
incriminate	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>He refused to answer questions in order not to incriminate himself.</i>
<u>manifesto</u>	A public declaration of intentions (as issued by a political party or government). <i>A manifesto for gay liberation.</i>
notification	The action of notifying someone or something. <i>We have yet to receive formal notification of the announcement.</i>

outcry	A strong expression of public disapproval or anger. <i>The public outcry over the bombing.</i>
<u>predicate</u>	One of the two main constituents of a sentence the predicate contains the verb and its complements. <i>Solving the problem is predicated on understanding it well.</i>
<u>proclaim</u>	Affirm or declare as an attribute or quality of. <i>He had a rolling gait that proclaimed him a man of the sea.</i>
<u>proclamation</u>	A clear declaration of something. <i>The government restricted the use of water by proclamation.</i>
profess	Teach a subject as a professor. <i>Though knowing little of the arts I professed he proved a natural adept.</i>
promulgate	Put (a law or decree) into effect by official proclamation. <i>These objectives have to be promulgated within the organization.</i>
promulgation	The official announcement of a new law or ordinance whereby the law or ordinance is put into effect. <i>His promulgation of the policy proved to be premature.</i>
pronouncement	A formal or authoritative announcement or declaration. <i>Distrust of the pronouncements of politicians was endemic.</i>
statement	The presentation of a musical theme. <i>She accessorized with a dazzling orange scarf and a statement necklace.</i>
