<b><u>aver</u></b>	Allege as a fact in support of a plea. <i>I don t have to do anything it s his problem he <b>averred</b>.</i>
<b>avow</b>	Admit openly and bluntly; make no bones about. <i>He <b>avowed</b> that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
<b>blazon</b>	Report (news), especially in a sensational manner. <i>Accounts of their ordeal were <b>blazoned</b> to the entire nation.</i>
<b>bring into the open</b>	Attract the attention of.
<b>broadcast</b>	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>They regularly <b>broadcast</b> on Radio 2.</i>
<b>certify</b>	Authorize officially. <i>The Law Society will <b>certify</b> that the sum charged is fair and reasonable.</i>
<b><u>circulate</u></b>	Cause to move around. <i>She <b>circulates</b> among royalty.</i>
<b>claim</b>	Ask for legally or make a legal claim to as of debts for example. <i>He <b>claimed</b> his suitcases at the airline counter.</i>
<b>communicate</b>	Transfer to another. <i>Please <b>communicate</b> this message to all employees.</i>
<b><u>contend</u></b>	Come to terms with. <i>Factions within the government were <b>contending</b> for the succession to the presidency.</i>

<b><u>disseminate</u></b>	Spread throughout an organ or the body. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can <b>disseminate</b> and migrate.</i>
<b><u>divulge</u></b>	Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>I do not want to <b>divulge</b> my plans at the moment.</i>
<b>express</b>	Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>She would <b>express</b> her milk using a pump and take it home for her baby.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Contain or hold have within. <i>A strawberry margarita but <b>hold</b> the tequila.</i>
<b><u>insist</u></b>	State positively and assertively. <i>He <b>insisted</b> that she came.</i>
<b>maintain</b>	Maintain for use and service. <i>He has always <b>maintained</b> his innocence.</i>
<b>make known</b>	Organize or be responsible for.
<b>make public</b>	Behave in a certain way.
<b>mention</b>	Make mention of. <i>I <b>mentioned</b> that my father was meeting me later.</i>
<b><u>moot</u></b>	Raise (a question or topic) for discussion; suggest (an idea or possibility). <i>The scheme was first <b>mooted</b> last October.</i>
<b>move</b>	Have a turn make one's move in a game. <i>She felt deeply <b>moved</b> by this picture of his plight.</i>
<b><u>proclaim</u></b>	Declare formally; declare someone to be something; of titles. <i>The government's chief scientific adviser <b>proclaimed</b> that the epidemic was under control.</i>
<b>profess</b>	Practice as a profession teach or claim to be knowledgeable about. <i>He <b>professes</b> to be a Communist.</i>
<b>promulgate</b>	Put (a law or decree) into effect by official proclamation. <i>These objectives have to be <b>promulgated</b> within the organization.</i>
<b>pronounce</b>	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. <i>Allow history to <b>pronounce</b> the verdict.</i>
<b>publicize</b>	Make (something) widely known. <i>Judy had started to <b>publicize</b> books and celebrities.</i>

<b><u>publish</u></b>	Communicate (a libel) to a third party. <i>A few hours after <b>publishing</b> the post I received a response from the founder of the company.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Raise the level or amount of something. <i><b>Raise</b> the roof.</i>
<b>reveal</b>	Cause or allow (something) to be seen. <i>Brenda was forced to <b>reveal</b> Robbie's whereabouts.</i>
<b>set forth</b>	Put into a position that will restore a normal state.
<b>state</b>	Present or introduce (a theme or melody) in a composition. <i>People will be invited to <b>state</b> their views.</i>
<b>swear</b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>He forced them to <b>swear</b> an oath of loyalty to him.</i>
<b>talk about</b>	Deliver a lecture or talk.
<b>testify</b>	Provide evidence for. <i>The bleak lines <b>testify</b> to inner torment.</i>
<b>trumpet</b>	Play a trumpet. <i>Elephants are <b>trumpeting</b>.</i>
<b>vent</b>	Discharge or expel (air, gas, or liquid) through an outlet. <i>The plant was isolated and the gas <b>vented</b>.</i>
<b>voice</b>	Give voice to. <i>He <b>voiced</b> his concern.</i>
<b><u>vow</u></b>	Dedicate to a deity by a vow. <i>The rebels <b>vowed</b> to continue fighting.</i>

<b>adjudge</b>	(in legal use) condemn (someone) to pay a penalty. <i>The defaulter was <b>adjudged</b> to pay the whole amount.</i>
<b><u>affirm</u></b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>He refused to take the oath but chose simply to <b>affirm</b> on being admitted to the Privy Council.</i>
<b>allege</b>	Report or maintain. <i>He <b>alleged</b> that he was the victim of a crime.</i>

<b>announce</b>	Make known make an announcement. <i>The President s office <b>announced</b> that the siege would be lifted.</i>

<b>asserting</b>	Relating to the use of or having the nature of a declaration.
<b>assertion</b>	A declaration that is made emphatically (as if no supporting evidence were necessary). <i>His <b>assertion</b> that his father had deserted the family.</i>
<b>claim</b>	Ask for legally or make a legal claim to as of debts for example. <i>The court had denied their <b>claims</b> to asylum.</i>
<b>confidently</b>	With confidence; in a confident manner. <i>I strode <b>confidently</b> up to the rope.</i>
<b>conspirator</b>	A member of a conspiracy. <i><b>Conspirators</b> had planned to seize the state.</i>
<b>declamation</b>	The action or art of declaiming. <i><b>Declamations</b> of patriotism.</i>
<b><u>declaration</u></b>	An act of declaring an innings closed. <i>A <b>declaration</b> of love.</i>
<b>declarative</b>	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <i><b>Declarative</b> statements.</i>
<b>declaratory</b>	Having the function of declaring or explaining something. <i>The decision was <b>declaratory</b> of the law.</i>

<b>playbill</b>	A poster announcing a theatrical performance. <i>Her name occupied third place in the <b>playbills</b>.</i>
