belittle	Cause to seem less serious; play down. <i>Don t belittle his influence.</i>
corpse	Spoil a piece of acting by forgetting one’s lines or laughing uncontrollably. <i>One singer ad libbed and corpsed his colleagues on stage.</i>
corrupt	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>A corrupt and incompetent city government.</i>
corruptive	Tending to corrupt or pervert.
decay	An inferior state resulting from the process of decaying. <i>Facilities decay when money is not spent on refurbishment.</i>
decomposition	In a decomposed state. <i>The decomposition of organic waste.</i>
deconstruct	Interpret a text or an artwork by the method of deconstructing. <i>I want to deconstruct this myth that poverty breeds crime.</i>
depravity	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>Its brothels its opium parlors its depravity.</i>
deteriorate	Become progressively worse. <i>If the situation continues to deteriorate the consequences could be severe.</i>
disassemble	Translate (a program) from machine code into a higher-level programming language. <i>It is permissible for a lawful user to disassemble a computer program to determine its interfaces.</i>
disband	Stop functioning or cohering as a unit. <i>The principal disbanded the political student organization.</i>
disintegrate	Lose a stored charge, magnetic flux, or current. <i>A meson can spontaneously disintegrate.</i>

disintegration	The spontaneous disintegration of a radioactive substance along with the emission of ionizing radiation. <i>The twin problems of economic failure and social disintegration.</i>
dismantle	Tear down so as to make flat with the ground. <i>The old regime was dismantled.</i>
dismember	Partition or divide up (a territory or organization). <i>The tiger dismembered the tourist.</i>
dissolution	Separation into component parts. <i>An advanced state of dissolution.</i>
dissolve	Bring the association of to an end or cause to break up. <i>She suddenly dissolved into floods of tears.</i>
erosive	Wearing away by friction. <i>The erosive effects of waves on the shoreline.</i>
foul	In sport commit a foul against an opponent. <i>The weather turned foul.</i>
iron	A shot made with an iron. <i>The iron grip of the president on every aspect of foreign policy.</i>
malodorous	Smelling very unpleasant. <i>Leaking taps and malodorous drains.</i>
molder	Break down.
perishable	Liable to perish; subject to destruction or death or decay. <i>The shipment was delivered eventually though some of the perishables had gone off.</i>
putrefaction	(biology) the process of decay caused by bacterial or fungal action. <i>The breeze shifted and we caught the stench of putrefaction.</i>
putrescent	Undergoing the process of decay; rotting. <i>The odour of putrescent flesh.</i>
putrid	In an advanced state of decomposition and having a foul odor. <i>A butcher who sold putrid meat.</i>
rot	Rotten or decayed matter. <i>The leaves were turning black with rot.</i>
rotten	Very bad. <i>She tried to tell me she felt rotten.</i>
solvable	Capable of being solved. <i>Such problems are perfectly solvable.</i>
spoilage	Waste produced by material being spoilt, especially paper that is spoilt in printing.
