#### **Definitions of "Deduce" as a verb**

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "deduce" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Conclude by reasoning; in logic.
- Arrive at (a fact or a conclusion) by reasoning; draw as a logical conclusion.
- Trace the course or derivation of.
- Reason by deduction; establish by deduction.

#### Synonyms of "Deduce" as a verb (9 Words)

come to the conclusion	Reach or enter a state, relation, condition, use, or position.
<u>conclude</u>	Come to a close. They <b>conclude</b> their study with these words.
deduct	Reason by deduction establish by deduction. Tax has been <b>deduct</b> ed from the payments.
derive	(of a substance) be formed or prepared by (a chemical or physical process affecting another substance. <i>The present name <b>derive</b>s from an older form.</i>



draw the inference	Remove the entrails of.
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. <i>Gather</i> some stones.
<u>infer</u>	Reason by deduction; establish by deduction. From these facts we can <b>infer</b> that crime has been increasing.
reason	Present reasons and arguments. I tried to <b>reason</b> with her but without success.
work out	Cause to work.

### Usage Examples of "Deduce" as a verb

- *He cannot deduce his descent wholly by heirs male.*
- Little can be safely deduced from these figures.
- They deduced that the fish died because of water pollution.

# Associations of "Deduce" (30 Words)

antimony	A metallic element having four allotropic forms; used in a wide variety of alloys; found in stibnite.
<u>assume</u>	Take on or adopt (a manner or identity), sometimes falsely. This is the day when Mary was <b>assume</b> d into heaven.
augur	(ancient Rome) a religious official who interpreted omens to guide public policy. <i>The end of the cold war seemed to <b>augur</b> well.</i>
<u>clue</u>	A word or words giving an indication as to what is to be inserted in a particular space in a crossword. Archaeological evidence can give <b>clue</b> s about the past.
cue	Sports implement consisting of a tapering rod used to strike a cue ball in pool or billiards. Ros and Guil <b>cue</b> d by Hamlet also bow deeply.
deduction	The action of deducting or subtracting something. <i>Tax <b>deduction</b>s</i> .
derive	Reason by deduction; establish by deduction. The word punch <b>derive</b> s from the Hindustani pancha.
<u>evoke</u>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. The sight <b>evoke</b> d pleasant memories of his childhood.



extrapolate	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. The results cannot be <b>extrapolate</b> d to other patient groups.
guess	An estimate or conclusion formed by guessing. My <b>guess</b> is that within a year we will have a referendum.
hint	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. Randall smiled with a <b>hint</b> of mockery.
implication	An accusation that brings into intimate and usually incriminating connection. The <b>implication</b> is that no one person at the bank is responsible.
<u>imply</u>	Suggest that someone is guilty. Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.
indicant	Something that serves to indicate or suggest. Symptoms are the prime <b>indicant</b> s of disease.
indication	A reason to prescribe a drug or perform a procedure. An <b>indication</b> of foul play.
inductive	Characterized by the inference of general laws from particular instances. <i>Inductive</i> to the sin of Eve.
<u>infer</u>	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. From these facts we can <b>infer</b> that crime has been increasing.
inference	The process of inferring something. His emphasis on order and health and by <b>inference</b> cleanliness.
lead	Cause something to pass or lead somewhere. The goal of marketing is to generate <b>lead</b> s so the sales people can close them.
logic	Logical operations collectively. The <b>logic</b> of private competition was to replace small firms by larger firms.
<u>prophetic</u>	Accurately predicting what will happen in the future. <b>Prophetic</b> writings.
ratiocination	The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism.
<u>reasoning</u>	Endowed with the capacity to reason. He explained the <b>reasoning</b> behind his decision at a media conference.
remind	Cause someone to think of (something) because of a resemblance. The barman <b>remind</b> ed them that singing was not permitted.
signal	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. The champion s announcement that he was retiring was the <b>signal</b> for scores of journalists to gather at his last match.



suggestion	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. There is no <b>suggestion</b> that he was involved in any wrongdoing.
<u>surmise</u>	Infer from incomplete evidence. I don t think they re locals she <b>surmise</b> d.
<u>theorize</u>	Construct a theory about. <i>He thinks and <b>theorize</b>s all day.</i>
think	An act of thinking. I <b>think</b> he is very smart.
tip	Remove the tip from. He got a <b>tip</b> on the stock market.
