## Deduce as a Verb

### Definitions of "Deduce" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “deduce” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Conclude by reasoning; in logic.*
- *Arrive at (a fact or a conclusion) by reasoning; draw as a logical conclusion.*
- *Trace the course or derivation of.*
- *Reason by deduction; establish by deduction.*

### Synonyms of "Deduce" as a verb (9 Words)

<b>come to the conclusion</b>	Reach or enter a state, relation, condition, use, or position.
<b><a href="#">conclude</a></b>	Come to a close. <i>They <b>conclude</b> their study with these words.</i>
<b>deduct</b>	Reason by deduction establish by deduction. <i>Tax has been <b>deducted</b> from the payments.</i>
<b>derive</b>	(of a substance) be formed or prepared by (a chemical or physical process affecting another substance). <i>The present name <b>derives</b> from an older form.</i>

<b>draw the inference</b>	Remove the entrails of.
<b>gather</b>	Collect or gather. <i><b>Gather</b> some stones.</i>
<b>infer</b>	Reason by deduction; establish by deduction. <i>From these facts we can <b>infer</b> that crime has been increasing.</i>
<b>reason</b>	Present reasons and arguments. <i>I tried to <b>reason</b> with her but without success.</i>
<b>work out</b>	Cause to work.

## Usage Examples of "Deduce" as a verb

- *He cannot deduce his descent wholly by heirs male.*
- *Little can be safely deduced from these figures.*
- *They deduced that the fish died because of water pollution.*

## Associations of "Deduce" (30 Words)

<b>antimony</b>	A metallic element having four allotropic forms; used in a wide variety of alloys; found in stibnite.
<b>assume</b>	Take on or adopt (a manner or identity), sometimes falsely. <i>This is the day when Mary was <b>assumed</b> into heaven.</i>
<b>augur</b>	(ancient Rome) a religious official who interpreted omens to guide public policy. <i>The end of the cold war seemed to <b>augur</b> well.</i>
<b>clue</b>	A word or words giving an indication as to what is to be inserted in a particular space in a crossword. <i>Archaeological evidence can give <b>clues</b> about the past.</i>
<b>cue</b>	Sports implement consisting of a tapering rod used to strike a cue ball in pool or billiards. <i>Ros and Guil <b>cued</b> by Hamlet also bow deeply.</i>
<b>deduction</b>	The action of deducting or subtracting something. <i>Tax <b>deductions</b>.</i>
<b>derive</b>	Reason by deduction; establish by deduction. <i>The word punch <b>derives</b> from the Hindustani pancha.</i>
<b>evoke</b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>The sight <b>evoked</b> pleasant memories of his childhood.</i>

<b>extrapolate</b>	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>The results cannot be <b>extrapolated</b> to other patient groups.</i>
<b>guess</b>	An estimate or conclusion formed by guessing. <i>My <b>guess</b> is that within a year we will have a referendum.</i>
<b>hint</b>	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>Randall smiled with a <b>hint</b> of mockery.</i>
<b>implication</b>	An accusation that brings into intimate and usually incriminating connection. <i>The <b>implication</b> is that no one person at the bank is responsible.</i>
<b>imply</b>	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.</i>
<b>indicant</b>	Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>Symptoms are the prime <b>indicants</b> of disease.</i>
<b>indication</b>	A reason to prescribe a drug or perform a procedure. <i>An <b>indication</b> of foul play.</i>
<b>inductive</b>	Characterized by the inference of general laws from particular instances. <i><b>Inductive</b> to the sin of Eve.</i>
<b>infer</b>	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>From these facts we can <b>infer</b> that crime has been increasing.</i>
<b>inference</b>	The process of inferring something. <i>His emphasis on order and health and by <b>inference</b> cleanliness.</i>
<b>lead</b>	Cause something to pass or lead somewhere. <i>The goal of marketing is to generate <b>leads</b> so the sales people can close them.</i>
<b>logic</b>	Logical operations collectively. <i>The <b>logic</b> of private competition was to replace small firms by larger firms.</i>
<b>prophetic</b>	Accurately predicting what will happen in the future. <i><b>Prophetic</b> writings.</i>
<b>ratiocination</b>	The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism).
<b>reasoning</b>	Endowed with the capacity to reason. <i>He explained the <b>reasoning</b> behind his decision at a media conference.</i>
<b>remind</b>	Cause someone to think of (something) because of a resemblance. <i>The barman <b>reminded</b> them that singing was not permitted.</i>
<b>signal</b>	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>The champion s announcement that he was retiring was the <b>signal</b> for scores of journalists to gather at his last match.</i>

<b>suggestion</b>	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>There is no <b>suggestion</b> that he was involved in any wrongdoing.</i>
<u><b>surmise</b></u>	Infer from incomplete evidence. <i>I don't think they're locals she <b>surmised</b>.</i>
<u><b>theorize</b></u>	Construct a theory about. <i>He thinks and <b>theorizes</b> all day.</i>
<b>think</b>	An act of thinking. <i>I <b>think</b> he is very smart.</i>
<b>tip</b>	Remove the tip from. <i>He got a <b>tip</b> on the stock market.</i>
