Deduce as a Verb

Definitions of "Deduce" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “deduce” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Conclude by reasoning; in logic.*
- *Arrive at (a fact or a conclusion) by reasoning; draw as a logical conclusion.*
- *Trace the course or derivation of.*
- *Reason by deduction; establish by deduction.*

Synonyms of "Deduce" as a verb (9 Words)

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| come to the conclusion | Reach or enter a state, relation, condition, use, or position. |
| conclude | Come to a close. <i>They conclude their study with these words.</i> |
| deduct | Reason by deduction establish by deduction. <i>Tax has been deducted from the payments.</i> |
| derive | (of a substance) be formed or prepared by (a chemical or physical process affecting another substance). <i>The present name derives from an older form.</i> |

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| draw the inference | Remove the entrails of. |
| gather | Collect or gather. <i>Gather some stones.</i> |
| infer | Reason by deduction; establish by deduction. <i>From these facts we can infer that crime has been increasing.</i> |
| reason | Present reasons and arguments. <i>I tried to reason with her but without success.</i> |
| work out | Cause to work. |

Usage Examples of "Deduce" as a verb

- *He cannot deduce his descent wholly by heirs male.*
- *Little can be safely deduced from these figures.*
- *They deduced that the fish died because of water pollution.*

Associations of "Deduce" (30 Words)

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| antimony | A metallic element having four allotropic forms; used in a wide variety of alloys; found in stibnite. |
| assume | Take on or adopt (a manner or identity), sometimes falsely. <i>This is the day when Mary was assumed into heaven.</i> |
| augur | (ancient Rome) a religious official who interpreted omens to guide public policy. <i>The end of the cold war seemed to augur well.</i> |
| clue | A word or words giving an indication as to what is to be inserted in a particular space in a crossword. <i>Archaeological evidence can give clues about the past.</i> |
| cue | Sports implement consisting of a tapering rod used to strike a cue ball in pool or billiards. <i>Ros and Guil cued by Hamlet also bow deeply.</i> |
| deduction | The action of deducting or subtracting something. <i>Tax deductions.</i> |
| derive | Reason by deduction; establish by deduction. <i>The word punch derives from the Hindustani pancha.</i> |
| evoke | Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>The sight evoked pleasant memories of his childhood.</i> |

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| extrapolate | Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>The results cannot be extrapolated to other patient groups.</i> |
| guess | An estimate or conclusion formed by guessing. <i>My guess is that within a year we will have a referendum.</i> |
| hint | Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>Randall smiled with a hint of mockery.</i> |
| implication | An accusation that brings into intimate and usually incriminating connection. <i>The implication is that no one person at the bank is responsible.</i> |
| imply | Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to imply superior knowledge.</i> |
| indicant | Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>Symptoms are the prime indicants of disease.</i> |
| indication | A reason to prescribe a drug or perform a procedure. <i>An indication of foul play.</i> |
| inductive | Characterized by the inference of general laws from particular instances. <i>Inductive to the sin of Eve.</i> |
| infer | Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>From these facts we can infer that crime has been increasing.</i> |
| inference | The process of inferring something. <i>His emphasis on order and health and by inference cleanliness.</i> |
| lead | Cause something to pass or lead somewhere. <i>The goal of marketing is to generate leads so the sales people can close them.</i> |
| logic | Logical operations collectively. <i>The logic of private competition was to replace small firms by larger firms.</i> |
| prophetic | Accurately predicting what will happen in the future. <i>Prophetic writings.</i> |
| ratiocination | The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism). |
| reasoning | Endowed with the capacity to reason. <i>He explained the reasoning behind his decision at a media conference.</i> |
| remind | Cause someone to think of (something) because of a resemblance. <i>The barman reminded them that singing was not permitted.</i> |
| signal | Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>The champion s announcement that he was retiring was the signal for scores of journalists to gather at his last match.</i> |

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| suggestion | Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>There is no suggestion that he was involved in any wrongdoing.</i> |
| <u>surmise</u> | Infer from incomplete evidence. <i>I don t think they re locals she surmised.</i> |
| <u>theorize</u> | Construct a theory about. <i>He thinks and theorizes all day.</i> |
| think | An act of thinking. <i>I think he is very smart.</i> |
| tip | Remove the tip from. <i>He got a tip on the stock market.</i> |
