<b>account</b>	To give an account or representation of in words. <i>Her visit could not be <b>accounted</b> a success.</i>
<b>adjudge</b>	Consider or declare to be true or the case. <i>She was <b>adjudged</b> guilty.</i>
<b>calculate to be</b>	Make a mathematical calculation or computation.
<b>class as</b>	Arrange or order by classes or categories.
<b>consider</b>	Show consideration for take into account. <i>I <b>consider</b> her to be shallow.</i>

<b>count</b>	Include as if by counting. <i>It did not matter what the audience thought it was the critics that <b>counted</b>.</i>
<b>esteem</b>	Consider; deem. <i>I should <b>esteem</b> it a favour if you could speak to them.</i>
<b>estimate as</b>	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of (quantities or time).
<b>find</b>	Make a discovery make a new finding. <i>Lindsey looked up to <b>find</b> Neil watching her.</i>
<b>gauge</b>	Measure the dimensions of an object with a gauge. <i>When dry the assemblies can be <b>gauged</b> exactly and planed to width.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Hold the attention of. <i>The flask <b>holds</b> one gallon.</i>
<b>hold to be</b>	Keep in a certain state, position, or activity.
<b>interpret as</b>	Make sense of a language.
<b>judge</b>	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of. <i>It is hard to <b>judge</b> whether such opposition is justified.</i>
<b>look on as</b>	Perceive with attention; direct one's gaze towards.
<b>rate</b>	Be worthy of; merit. <i>The program has been <b>rated</b> a great success.</i>
<b>reckon</b>	Consider or regard in a specified way. <i>In college he was always <b>reckoned</b> among the brainiest.</i>
<b>regard as</b>	Connect closely and often incriminatingly.
<b>see as</b>	Perceive or be contemporaneous with.
<b>suppose</b>	Expect believe or suppose. <i>I shouldn't have been in the study I'm not <b>supposed</b> to go in there.</i>
<b>take for</b>	Take on a certain form, attribute, or aspect.
<b>take to be</b>	Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere.
<b>view as</b>	Look at carefully; study mentally.

<b>according</b>	In proportion or relation to. <i><b>According</b> to instructions.</i>
<b><u>anticipatory</u></b>	In anticipation. <i>An <b>anticipatory</b> flash of excitement.</i>
<b>assuming</b>	Excessively forward. <i>On a subject like this it would be too <b>assuming</b> for me to decide.</i>
<b><u>brood</u></b>	A family of birds or other young animals produced at one hatching or birth. <i>Birds <b>brood</b>.</i>
<b>cogitate</b>	Consider carefully and deeply; reflect upon; turn over in one's mind. <i>He stroked his beard and retired to <b>cogitate</b>.</i>
<b>consider</b>	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes. <i>I <b>consider</b> him irresponsible.</i>
<b>consideration</b>	A fact or a motive taken into account in deciding something. <i>He showed no <b>consideration</b> for her feelings.</i>
<b>contemplate</b>	Consider as a possibility. <i><b>Contemplate</b> one's navel.</i>
<b><u>infer</u></b>	Believe to be the case. <i>From these facts we can <b>infer</b> that crime has been increasing.</i>
<b>inference</b>	The process of inferring something. <i>It seemed a fair <b>inference</b> that such books would be grouped together.</i>
<b><u>intend</u></b>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>A series of questions <b>intended</b> as a checklist.</i>
<b>intentionality</b>	Expressive of intentions.
<b>logically</b>	According to logical reasoning. <i>These suggestions are <b>logically</b> impossible.</i>
<b>mistakenly</b>	By accident or oversight; accidentally. <i>He <b>mistakenly</b> believed it.</i>
<b>mull</b>	An island in western Scotland in the Inner Hebrides. <i>The government is <b>mulling</b> an overhaul of outdated insurance laws.</i>
<b><u>muse</u></b>	A person or personified force who is the source of inspiration for a creative artist. <i>Euterpe was his <b>muse</b>.</i>
<b>opine</b>	Hold and state as one's opinion. <i>The man is a genius he <b>opined</b>.</i>

<u>optimistically</u>	In a way that shows hope and confidence about the future. <i>The bank <b>optimistically</b> predicts an economic growth rate of 5 percent.</i>
<u>ponder</u>	Think about (something) carefully, especially before making a decision or reaching a conclusion. <i>I <b>pondered</b> the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.</i>
<b>ponderable</b>	Having appreciable weight or significance. <i>Something <b>ponderable</b> from the outer world something of which we can say that its weight is so and so.</i>
<b>reckon</b>	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>I don't <b>reckon</b> his chances.</i>
<u>reconsider</u>	Consider (something) again, especially for a possible change of decision regarding it. <i>They called on the US government to <b>reconsider</b> its policy.</i>
<u>reflect</u>	Be bright by reflecting or casting light. <i>When the sun's rays hit the Earth a lot of the heat is <b>reflected</b> back into space.</i>
<b>regard</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>He shifted uneasily before their clear <b>regard</b>.</i>
<u>reminisce</u>	Recall the past. <i>They <b>reminisced</b> about their summers abroad.</i>
<u>ruminate</u>	Think deeply about something. <i>Cows <b>ruminate</b>.</i>
<u>speculate</u>	Form a theory or conjecture about a subject without firm evidence. <i>Philosophers have <b>speculated</b> on the question of God for thousands of years.</i>
<b>think</b>	An act of thinking. <i>Can you <b>think</b> what to do next.</i>
<b>thoughtfulness</b>	Kind and considerate regard for others. <i>The jury was impressed by the <b>thoughtfulness</b> of the project.</i>
<b>wrongheaded</b>	Obstinately perverse in judgment or opinion. <i>A <b>wrongheaded</b> policy.</i>
