
Deface as a Verb

damage Suffer or be susceptible to damage.

The car was badly **damage**d in the accident.

deformBecome distorted or misshapen undergo deformation.

The sidewalk **deform**ed during the earthquake.



disfigure Spoil the appearance of.

The vandals **disfigure**d the statue.

mar Destroy or injure severely.

Violence **mar**red a number of New Year celebrations.

ruin Reduce to ruins.

They were **ruin**ed by the highest interest rates this century.

spoil Hinder or prevent (the efforts, plans, or desires) of.

She was afraid of **spoil**ing Christmas for the rest of the family.

sully Charge falsely or with malicious intent.

They were outraged that anyone should **sully** their good name.

Make dirty or spotty, as by exposure to air; also used metaphorically.

Silver tarnishes too easily.


vandalize Destroy wantonly, as through acts of vandalism. Stations have been vandalized beyond recognition.

damaged Harmed or injured or spoiled.

defect A failing or deficiency.

deformed So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.

vitiate Destroy or impair the legal validity of.

The insurance is **vitiate**d because of foolish acts on the part of the tenant.

wound Inflict a wound on.

Mound A knife wound.
