Definitions of "Deface" as a verb

- *Mar or spoil the appearance of.*
- *Spoil the surface or appearance of (something), for example by drawing or writing on it.*

- blemish** Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective.
*Thousands of Web pages are **blemished** with embarrassing typos.*
- damage** Suffer or be susceptible to damage.
*The car was badly **damaged** in the accident.*
- deform** Become distorted or misshapen undergo deformation.
*The sidewalk **deformed** during the earthquake.*

- disfigure** Spoil the appearance of.
*The vandals **disfigured** the statue.*
- mar** Destroy or injure severely.
*Violence **marred** a number of New Year celebrations.*
- ruin** Reduce to ruins.
*They were **ruined** by the highest interest rates this century.*
- spoil** Hinder or prevent (the efforts, plans, or desires) of.
*She was afraid of **spoiling** Christmas for the rest of the family.*
- sully** Charge falsely or with malicious intent.
*They were outraged that anyone should **sully** their good name.*
- tarnish** Make dirty or spotty, as by exposure to air; also used metaphorically.
*Silver **tarnishes** too easily.*
- vandalize** Destroy wantonly, as through acts of vandalism.
*Stations have been **vandalized** beyond recognition.*



Usage Examples of "Deface" as a verb

- *Scars defaced her cheeks.*
- *He defaced library books.*



Associations of "Deface" (30 Words)

- blemish** Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective.
*The girl s hands were without a **blemish**.*
- corpse** Cause (an actor) to forget their lines and start laughing.
*He believed that fascism would revive the **corpse** of Europe.*
- damaged** Harmed or injured or spoiled.
*Her **damaged** reputation.*

defect	A failing or deficiency. <i>That interpretation is an unfortunate defect of our lack of information.</i>
deform	Become distorted or misshapen undergo deformation. <i>The heat deformed the plastic sculpture.</i>
<u>deformed</u>	So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly. <i>His deformed hands.</i>
demerit	A fault or disadvantage. <i>They discussed the merits and demerits of her novel.</i>
<u>disable</u>	(of a disease, injury, or accident) limit (someone) in their movements, senses, or activities. <i>It s an injury that could disable somebody for life.</i>
disadvantage	Put at a disadvantage hinder harm. <i>A major disadvantage is the limited nature of the data.</i>
disfigure	Spoil the appearance of. <i>Litter disfigures the countryside.</i>
dismember	Divide into pieces. <i>The tiger dismembered the tourist.</i>
<u>distort</u>	Give a misleading or false account or impression of. <i>The pipe will distort as you bend it.</i>
hamstring	Cripple by cutting the hamstring. <i>He pulled a hamstring.</i>
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. <i>Ow You re hurting me.</i>
<u>impair</u>	Make imperfect. <i>His vision was impaired.</i>
injury	An instance of being injured. <i>All escaped without serious injury.</i>
<u>lame</u>	Make a person or animal lame. <i>A lame argument.</i>
maim	Injure or wound seriously and leave permanent disfiguration or mutilation. <i>People were maimed by the explosion.</i>
mangle	Press with a mangle. <i>Mangle the sheets.</i>
mar	A mark or flaw that spoils the appearance of something especially on a person s body. <i>Violence marred a number of New Year celebrations.</i>

maul	Take part in a maul. <i>The forwards rucked and mauled to near perfection.</i>
mutilate	Alter so as to make unrecognizable. <i>Mutilated bodies.</i>
ruin	A ruined building. <i>This behavior will ruin your chances of winning the election.</i>
spoil	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>I wouldn't want to spoil your fun.</i>
stride	Significant progress especially in the phrase make strides. <i>Great strides have been made towards equality.</i>
trample	Tread or stomp heavily or roughly. <i>The soldiers trampled across the fields.</i>
<u>tread</u>	Crush as if by treading on. <i>Shoppers will soon be treading the floors of the new shopping mall.</i>
vitiate	Destroy or impair the legal validity of. <i>The insurance is vitiating because of foolish acts on the part of the tenant.</i>
<u>wound</u>	Inflict a wound on. <i>A knife wound.</i>
