- *Imperfect or faulty.*
- *Having a defect.*



## Synonyms of "Defective" as an adjective (18 Words)

### bad

Feeling physical discomfort or pain though is occasionally used colloquially for bad.

A **bad** storm.

### deficient

Not having enough of a specified quality or ingredient.

A **deficient** education.

### faulty

(of reasoning and other mental processes) mistaken or misleading because of flaws.

He submitted a **faulty** report.

### flawed

(of a person) having a weakness in character.

A **flawed** diamond.

### imperfect

(of a cadence) ending on the dominant chord.

**Imperfect** mortals.

### inadequate

Lacking the requisite qualities or resources to meet a task.

An **inadequate** income.

### inoperative

Not working or taking effect.

An **inoperative** law.

<b><u>insufficient</u></b>	Of a quantity not able to fulfill a need or requirement. <i><b>Insufficient</b> funds.</i>
<b>lacking</b>	Inadequate in amount or degree. <i>The students are not <b>lacking</b> in intellectual ability.</i>
<b><u>low</u></b>	Used of sounds and voices low in pitch or frequency. <i><b>Low</b> back pain.</i>
<b>malfunctioning</b>	Not performing or able to perform its regular function. <i>A <b>malfunctioning</b> valve.</i>
<b>not working</b>	Adopted as a temporary basis for further work.
<b>out of order</b>	Not allowed to continue to bat or run.
<b>scant</b>	Barely amounting to a specified number or quantity. <i>She weighed a <b>scant</b> two pounds.</i>
<b><u>shoddy</u></b>	Cheap and shoddy Judith Crist. <i>We re not paying good money for <b>shoddy</b> goods.</i>
<b>short</b>	Tending to crumble or break into flakes due to a large amount of shortening. <i>Regularly gives <b>short</b> weight.</i>
<b><u>unsound</u></b>	Physically unsound or diseased. <i>This line of argument is <b>unsound</b>.</i>
<b>wanting</b>	Lacking in a required or necessary quality. <i>Mandibles are <b>wanting</b> in many of these insects.</i>

<b>defect</b>	A failing or deficiency. <i>This device permits detection of <b>defects</b> in the lungs.</i>
<b>deficiency</b>	The amount by which something, especially revenue, falls short; a deficit. <i>Water is the critical <b>deficiency</b> in desert regions.</i>
<b>demerit</b>	A fault or disadvantage. <i>The merits and <b>demerits</b> of these proposals.</i>
<b>disadvantage</b>	Put at a disadvantage hinder harm. <i>This rule clearly <b>disadvantages</b> me.</i>
<u><a href="#">drawback</a></u>	A feature that renders something less acceptable; a disadvantage or problem. <i>He pointed out all the <b>drawbacks</b> to my plan.</i>

<b><u>error</u></b>	A mistake in matter of law appearing in the proceedings of a court of record. <i>She was quick to point out my <b>errors</b>.</i>
<b>failing</b>	Below acceptable in performance. <i>Pride is a terrible <b>failing</b>.</i>
<b>fallibility</b>	The likelihood of making errors. <i>Studies on the <b>fallibility</b> of memory and perception.</i>
<b>fallible</b>	Capable of making mistakes or being wrong. <i>Everyone is <b>fallible</b> to some degree.</i>
<b><u>fault</u></b>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>It was John s <b>fault</b>.</i>
<b><u>faulty</u></b>	Having or displaying weaknesses. <i><b>Faulty</b> logic.</i>
<b>flaw</b>	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>The computer game was <b>flawed</b> by poor programming.</i>
<b><u>flawed</u></b>	Having a blemish or flaw. <i>A <b>flawed</b> diamond.</i>
<b>gaffe</b>	An unintentional act or remark causing embarrassment to its originator; a blunder. <i>His comments are a major diplomatic <b>gaffe</b>.</i>
<b><u>imperfect</u></b>	The imperfect tense. <i><b>Imperfect</b> mortals.</i>
<b>inaccurate</b>	Not accurate. <i>False or <b>inaccurate</b> descriptions of goods.</i>
<b><u>inadequacy</u></b>	Inability to deal with a situation or with life. <i>The <b>inadequacy</b> of unemployment benefits.</i>
<b>incompetence</b>	Inability of a part or organ to function properly. <i>Allegations of professional <b>incompetence</b>.</i>
<b>ineptitude</b>	Lack of skill or ability. <i>The officials displayed remarkable <b>ineptitude</b>.</i>
<b>inexact</b>	Not exact. <i>An <b>inexact</b> description.</i>
<b>insufficiency</b>	A lack of competence. <i>Renal <b>insufficiency</b>.</i>
<b>lacking</b>	Inadequate in amount or degree. <i>There was something <b>lacking</b> in our marriage.</i>

<b>lapse</b>	Pass into a specified state or condition. <i>The girls <b>lapsed</b> into French.</i>
<b>mistake</b>	To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>He made a bad <b>mistake</b>.</i>
<b><u>misunderstanding</u></b>	A failure to understand something correctly. <i>He left the army after a slight <b>misunderstanding</b> with his commanding officer.</i>
<b><u>mutant</u></b>	A mutant form. <i>Frequently only a small percentage of the offspring of <b>mutants</b> resemble their parents.</i>
<b>oversight</b>	The action of overseeing something. <i>Effective <b>oversight</b> of the financial reporting process.</i>
<b><u>shortcoming</u></b>	A fault or failure to meet a certain standard, typically in a person's character, a plan, or a system. <i>He is so forthright about his <b>shortcomings</b> it's hard to chastise him.</i>
<b>solecism</b>	A grammatical mistake in speech or writing.
<b>unreliable</b>	Lacking a sense of responsibility. <i>In the early 1950s computers were large and expensive and <b>unreliable</b>.</i>
