<b> fight down</b>	Exert oneself continuously, vigorously, or obtrusively to gain an end or engage in a crusade for a certain cause or person; be an advocate for.
<b> give an apology for</b>	Emit or utter.
<b> guard</b>	Watch over (someone) to prevent them from escaping. <i>The company fiercely <b>guarded</b> its independence.</i>
<b> hold</b>	Contain or hold have within. <i>The boat's anchor would not <b>hold</b>.</i>
<b><u>justify</u></b>	Show to be right by providing justification or proof. <i><b>Justify</b> the margins.</i>
<b> keep from harm</b>	Stop (someone or something) from doing something or being in a certain state.
<b> maintain</b>	Maintain by writing regular records. <i>He <b>maintained</b> his innocence.</i>
<b> make a case for</b>	Charge with a function; charge to be.

<b> oppose</b>	Actively resist (a person or system). <i>The board <b>opposed</b> his motion.</i>

<b>sentry</b>	A soldier stationed to keep guard or to control access to a place. <i>On <b>sentry</b> duty.</i>
<b><u>shield</u></b>	A stylized representation of a shield used for displaying a coat of arms. <i>Cylindrical ducts <b>shield</b> the propellers.</i>
<b><u>soldier</u></b>	Serve as a soldier in the military. <i>I <b>soldiered</b> with your father on his last four campaigns.</i>
<b><u>sword</u></b>	A cutting or thrusting weapon that has a long metal blade and a hilt with a hand guard. <i>Not many perished by the <b>sword</b>.</i>
