decided	(of a person) having clear opinions; resolute. <i>At a distinct or decided disadvantage.</i>
<u>decisive</u>	Determining or having the power to determine an outcome. <i>She gave him a decisive answer.</i>
defined	Showing clearly the outline or profile or boundary. <i>Lost in a maze of words both defined and undefined.</i>
delimited	Having the limits or boundaries established. <i>Cava is made in a number of delimited regions in Spain.</i>
distinct	Physically separate. <i>Management had interests quite distinct from those of their employees.</i>
<u>exact</u>	(of a subject of study) permitting precise measurements as a basis for rigorously testable theories. <i>An exact replica two feet tall was constructed.</i>
<u>explicit</u>	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>Explicit sexual scenes.</i>
express	Without unnecessary stops. <i>An express train.</i>
<u>final</u>	Allowing no further doubt or dispute. <i>The final cost will easily run into six figures.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>She had no firm plans for the next day.</i>
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>How s the club fixed for money now.</i>
irrefutable	Impossible to deny or disprove. <i>An irrefutable argument.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Clear or obvious to the eye or mind. <i>Her manifest charm and proven ability.</i>
marked	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>Walked with a marked limp.</i>
not in doubt	Directed or bound inward.
not in question	Currently fashionable.
obvious	Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind. <i>Obvious errors.</i>
particular	Especially great or intense. <i>A particular description of the room.</i>
<u>patent</u>	Made and marketed under a patent proprietary. <i>The patient is usually left with a patent vessel.</i>

positive	Having a positive charge. <i>A player had tested positive for cocaine use.</i>
<u>precise</u>	Marked by exactness and accuracy of expression or detail. <i>Specified a precise amount.</i>
<u>proven</u>	Established beyond doubt. <i>A system based on proven technologies.</i>
<u>specific</u>	Clearly defined or identified. <i>Savings were made by increasing the electricity supply only until it met specific development needs.</i>
<u>stipulated</u>	Demanded or specified, typically as part of an agreement. <i>The stipulated time has elapsed.</i>
<u>sure</u>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>The drawings impress by their sure sense of rhythm.</i>
<u>unambiguous</u>	Having or exhibiting a single clearly defined meaning. <i>As a horror apartheid is absolutely unambiguous.</i>
<u>unarguable</u>	Not open to disagreement; indisputable. <i>Unarguable proof of conspiracy.</i>
<u>undisputed</u>	Not disputed or called in question; accepted. <i>The undisputed fact.</i>
<u>unequivocal</u>	Clearly defined or formulated- R.B.Taney. <i>An unequivocal or univocal statement.</i>
<u>unmistakable</u>	Not able to be mistaken for anything else; very distinctive. <i>The unmistakable sound of his laughter.</i>
<u>unquestionable</u>	Not able to be disputed or doubted. <i>Unquestionable authority.</i>
<u>unquestioned</u>	Not examined or inquired into. <i>His loyalty to John is unquestioned.</i>
<u>well defined</u>	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

- avowal** A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
- certain** Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured.
*Be **certain** to disconnect the iron when you are through.*
- certainly** Used to emphasize the speaker's belief that what is said is true.
*The prestigious address **certainly** adds to the firm s appeal.*
- certainty** A general air of confidence.
*There is a bewildering lack of **certainty** and clarity in the law.*
- certitude** Total certainty or greater certainty than circumstances warrant.
*The question may never be answered with **certitude**.*

conclusive	(of a victory) achieved easily or by a large margin. <i>Conclusive evidence.</i>
confirming	Serving to support or corroborate.
convinced	Completely certain about something. A <i>convinced</i> pacifist.
corroborative	Serving to support or corroborate.
decided	(of a legal case) having been resolved. <i>The sunshine is a decided improvement.</i>
declared	Declared as fact explicitly stated. <i>He has no declared conflict of interest.</i>
definitive	A definitive postage stamp. A <i>definitive</i> verdict.
determinate	Precisely determined or limited or defined; especially fixed by rule or by a specific and constant cause. A <i>determinate</i> answer to the problem.
explicit	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>She made her wishes explicit.</i>
incontestable	Incapable of being contested or disputed.
indisputable	Impossible to doubt or dispute. <i>A far from indisputable fact.</i>
irreversible	Incapable of being reversed. <i>She suffered irreversible damage to her health.</i>
noticed	Being perceived or observed. <i>An easily noticed effect on the rate of growth.</i>
overt	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. <i>In untreated cases overt psychosis may occur.</i>
perspicuous	Transparently clear; easily understandable- Robert Burton. <i>It provides simpler and more perspicuous explanations than its rivals.</i>
plain	Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. <i>An insurance policy written in plain English.</i>
positivistic	Of or relating to positivism.
pronounced	Very noticeable or marked; conspicuous. <i>He had a pronounced squint.</i>
straightforward	Free from ambiguity. <i>In a straightforward case no fees will be charged.</i>
sure	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. A <i>sure</i> hand on the throttle.

trenchant Clearly or sharply defined to the mind.
A ***trenchant*** argument.

unambiguous Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion.
*Instructions should be **unambiguous**.*

unequivocal Leaving no doubt; unambiguous.
An ***unequivocal*** answer.
