distinct	Physically separate. Management had interests quite <b>distinct</b> from those of their employees.
<u>exact</u>	(of a subject of study) permitting precise measurements as a basis for rigorously testable theories. An <b>exact</b> replica two feet tall was constructed.
<u>explicit</u>	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>Explicit</i> sexual scenes.
express	Without unnecessary stops. An <b>express</b> train.
<u>final</u>	Allowing no further doubt or dispute. The <b>final</b> cost will easily run into six figures.
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. She had no <b>firm</b> plans for the next day.
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>How s the club <b>fixed</b> for money now.</i>
irrefutable	Impossible to deny or disprove. An <b>irrefutable</b> argument.
<u>manifest</u>	Clear or obvious to the eye or mind. Her <b>manifest</b> charm and proven ability.
marked	Strongly marked easily noticeable. Walked with a <b>marked</b> limp.
not in doubt	Directed or bound inward.
not in question	Currently fashionable.
obvious	Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind. <i>Obvious</i> errors.
particular	Especially great or intense. A <b>particular</b> description of the room.
<u>patent</u>	Made and marketed under a patent proprietary. The patient is usually left with a <b>patent</b> vessel.



positive	Having a positive charge. A player had tested <b>positive</b> for cocaine use.
<u>precise</u>	Marked by exactness and accuracy of expression or detail. Specified a <b>precise</b> amount.
<u>proven</u>	Established beyond doubt. A system based on <b>proven</b> technologies.
<u>specific</u>	Clearly defined or identified. Savings were made by increasing the electricity supply only until it met <b>specific</b> development needs.
<u>stipulated</u>	Demanded or specified, typically as part of an agreement. The <b>stipulated</b> time has elapsed.
<u>sure</u>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. The drawings impress by their <b>sure</b> sense of rhythm.
<u>unambiguous</u>	Having or exhibiting a single clearly defined meaning. As a horror apartheid is absolutely <b>unambiguous</b> .
unarguable	Not open to disagreement; indisputable. <b>Unarguable</b> proof of conspiracy.
<u>undisputed</u>	Not disputed or called in question; accepted. <i>The <b>undisputed</b> fact.</i>
<u>unequivocal</u>	Clearly defined or formulated- R.B.Taney. An <b>unequivocal</b> or univocal statement.
<u>unmistakable</u>	Not able to be mistaken for anything else; very distinctive. <i>The <b>unmistakable</b> sound of his laughter.</i>
unquestionable	Not able to be disputed or doubted. <b>Unquestionable</b> authority.
unquestioned	Not examined or inquired into. <i>His loyalty to John is <b>unquestioned</b>.</i>
well defined	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

# Associations of "Definite" (30 Words)

<u>absolute</u>	(of powers or rights) not subject to any limitation; unconditional. <i>Absolute</i> secrecy.
<u>apparent</u>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. It became <b>apparent</b> that he was talented.
avowal	A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
<u>certain</u>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. Be <b>certain</b> to disconnect the iron when you are through.
<u>certainly</u>	Used to emphasize the speaker's belief that what is said is true. The prestigious address <b>certainly</b> adds to the firm s appeal.
<u>certainty</u>	A general air of confidence. There is a bewildering lack of <b>certainty</b> and clarity in the law.
certitude	Total certainty or greater certainty than circumstances warrant. The question may never be answered with <b>certitude</b> .



conclusive	(of a victory) achieved easily or by a large margin. <i>Conclusive</i> evidence.
confirming	Serving to support or corroborate.
convinced	Completely certain about something. A <b>convinced</b> pacifist.
corroborative	Serving to support or corroborate.
decided	(of a legal case) having been resolved. The sunshine is a <b>decided</b> improvement.
declared	Declared as fact explicitly stated. He has no <b>declared</b> conflict of interest.
definitive	A definitive postage stamp. A <b>definitive</b> verdict.
determinate	Precisely determined or limited or defined; especially fixed by rule or by a specific and constant cause. A <b>determinate</b> answer to the problem.
<u>explicit</u>	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>She made her wishes <b>explicit</b>.</i>
incontestable	Incapable of being contested or disputed.
indisputable	Impossible to doubt or dispute. A far from <b>indisputable</b> fact.
<u>irreversible</u>	Incapable of being reversed. She suffered <b>irreversible</b> damage to her health.
noticed	Being perceived or observed. An easily <b>noticed</b> effect on the rate of growth.
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. In untreated cases <b>overt</b> psychosis may occur.
perspicuous	Transparently clear; easily understandable- Robert Burton. It provides simpler and more <b>perspicuous</b> explanations than its rivals.
plain	Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. An insurance policy written in <b>plain</b> English.
positivistic	Of or relating to positivism.
pronounced	Very noticeable or marked; conspicuous. <i>He had a <b>pronounced</b> squint.</i>
<u>straightforward</u>	Free from ambiguity. In a <b>straightforward</b> case no fees will be charged.
<u>sure</u>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. A <b>sure</b> hand on the throttle.



<u>trenchant</u>	Clearly or sharply defined to the mind. A <b>trenchant</b> argument.
<u>unambiguous</u>	Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion. <i>Instructions should be unambiguous</i> .
<u>unequivocal</u>	Leaving no doubt; unambiguous. An <b>unequivocal</b> answer.
