Definitions of "Deflection" as a noun

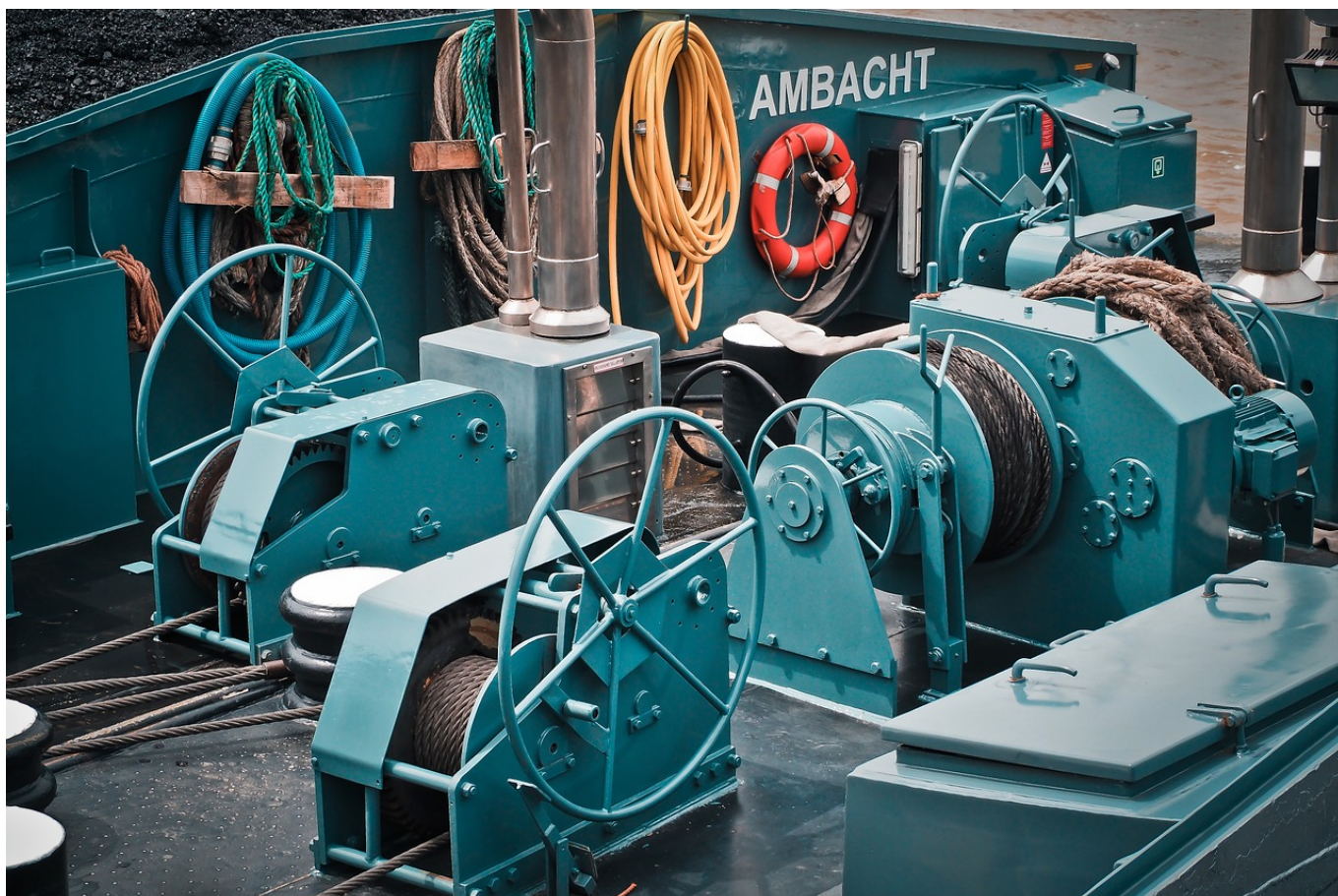
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “deflection” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The property of being bent or deflected.*
- *The movement of the pointer or pen of a measuring instrument from its zero position.*
- *The amount by which a propagating wave is bent.*
- *A turning aside (of your course or attention or concern.*
- *A twist or aberration; especially a perverse or abnormal way of judging or acting.*
- *The action or process of deflecting or being deflected.*



Synonyms of "Deflection" as a noun (12 Words)

bending	The act of bending something.
deflexion	The movement of the pointer or pen of a measuring instrument from its zero position.
deviation	The amount by which a single measurement differs from a fixed value such as the mean. <i>A significant deviation from the average value.</i>
digression	A temporary departure from the main subject in speech or writing. <i>A digression into irrelevant details.</i>
divagation	A turning aside (of your course or attention or concern.
<u>diversion</u>	An alternative route for use by traffic when the usual road is temporarily closed. <i>The road was closed and diversions put into operation.</i>
drawing away	Act of getting or draining something such as electricity or a liquid from a source.
refraction	Change in direction of propagation of any wave as a result of its travelling at different speeds at different points along the wave front.
turning	A shaving created when something is produced by turning it on a lathe. <i>The law took many turnings over the years.</i>
turning aside	Taking a short walk out and back.
turning away	The act of turning away or in the opposite direction.
warp	A shape distorted by twisting or folding. <i>The warp and weft are the basic constituents of all textiles.</i>

aberration	An optical phenomenon resulting from the failure of a lens or mirror to produce a good image. <i>I see these activities as some kind of mental aberration.</i>
abnormality	The quality or state of being abnormal. <i>Miscarriage can be caused by fetal abnormality.</i>
<u>adolescent</u>	An adolescent boy or girl. <i>Adolescent boys and girls.</i>
<u>anomaly</u>	(astronomy) position of a planet as defined by its angular distance from its perihelion (as observed from the sun). <i>The position abounds in anomaly.</i>
<u>aside</u>	On or to one side. <i>A day set aside for relaxing.</i>
bending	The act of bending something.

bias	Cause to be biased. <i>His work showed a discernible bias towards philosophy.</i>
bracket	Enclose words or figures in brackets. <i>Please bracket this remark.</i>
changed	Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism. <i>He s an altered or changed man since his election to Congress.</i>
convert	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>Faulkner gave away a penalty corner which was converted by Saeed Anjum.</i>
deviation	The error of a compass due to local magnetic disturbances. <i>The deviation from the mean.</i>
digression	Wandering from the main path of a journey. <i>Let s return to the main topic after that brief digression.</i>
<u>dissimilar</u>	Marked by dissimilarity. <i>A collection of dissimilar nations lacking overall homogeneity.</i>
divagation	A message that departs from the main subject.
<u>divergence</u>	An infinite series that has no limit. <i>A fundamental divergence of attitude.</i>
diverse	Many and different. <i>Celebrities as diverse as Bob Hope and Bob Dylan.</i>
<u>diversion</u>	An activity that diverts or amuses or stimulates. <i>The road was closed and diversions put into operation.</i>
diversity	A range of different things. <i>There was considerable diversity in the style of the reports.</i>
<u>eccentric</u>	A person of a specified kind usually with many eccentricities. <i>Eccentric circles.</i>
manifold	Make multiple copies of. <i>The appeal of the crusade was manifold.</i>
<u>mirage</u>	An optical illusion caused by atmospheric conditions, especially the appearance of a sheet of water in a desert or on a hot road caused by the refraction of light from the sky by heated air. <i>The hope of sanctuary initially proved a mirage.</i>
multiplicity	A large number or variety. <i>The demand for higher education depends on a multiplicity of factors.</i>
parenthesis	A pair of round brackets () used to mark off a parenthetical word or phrase. <i>The three months of coalition government were a lamentable political parenthesis.</i>

pluralism	A social organization in which diversity of racial or religious or ethnic or cultural groups is tolerated.
protean	Able to do many different things; versatile. <i>Eyes of that baffling protean grey which is never twice the same.</i>
refraction	The change in direction of a propagating wave (light or sound) when passing from one medium to another.
transformed	Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the transformed landscape.</i>
<u>variant</u>	(biology) a group of organisms within a species that differ in trivial ways from similar groups. <i>A variant of the same word.</i>
<u>varied</u>	Widely different. <i>Varied motives prompt people to join a political party.</i>
<u>vary</u>	Change from one condition, form, or state to another. <i>He tried to vary his diet.</i>
