Deformed as an Adjective

Definitions of "Deformed" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “deformed” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a person or part of the body) not having the normal or natural shape or form; misshapen.*
- *So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.*



Synonyms of "Deformed" as an adjective (4 Words)

- distorted** Giving a misleading or false account or impression; misrepresented.
*His report gives a **distorted** view of the meeting.*
- ill-shapen** So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.
- malformed** So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.
*A limp caused by a **malformed** foot.*
- misshapen** So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.
***Misshapen** fruit.*



Usage Examples of "Deformed" as an adjective

- *His deformed hands.*
- *Deformed thalidomide babies.*



Associations of "Deformed" (30 Words)

atrocious	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>Atrocious weather.</i>
changed	Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism. <i>Changed attitudes.</i>
contort	Twist and press out of shape. <i>A spasm of pain contorted his face.</i>
crimp	A small connecting piece for crimping wires or lines together. <i>The crimp on take home pay has been even tighter since taxes were raised.</i>
damaged	Being unjustly brought into disrepute. <i>The storm left a wake of badly damaged buildings.</i>
deform	Become distorted or misshapen undergo deformation. <i>The heat deformed the plastic sculpture.</i>

deformity	An appearance that has been spoiled or is misshapen. <i>Respiratory problems caused by spinal deformity.</i>
disfigure	Spoil the appearance of. <i>The vandals disfigured the statue.</i>
<u>disingenuous</u>	Not straightforward or candid; giving a false appearance of frankness- David Cannadine. <i>A disingenuous excuse.</i>
<u>distorted</u>	So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly. <i>His report gives a distorted view of the meeting.</i>
exaggerated	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>Comic book characters are drawn with exaggerated features so you will remember them.</i>
garble	A garbled account or transmission. <i>Most readers assumed the word was a typographical garble.</i>
hideous	Extremely ugly. <i>A hideous scar.</i>
irreparable	Impossible to repair, rectify, or amend. <i>They were doing irreparable damage to my heart and lungs.</i>
irreversibly	In an irreversible manner. <i>Our landscape will be irreversibly damaged.</i>
maim	Injure or wound seriously and leave permanent disfiguration or mutilation. <i>100 000 soldiers were killed or maimed.</i>
<u>manipulate</u>	Manipulate in a fraudulent manner. <i>Nations may still be able to manipulate their own data.</i>
mar	A mark or flaw that spoils the appearance of something especially on a person's body. <i>Nothing marred her beauty.</i>
<u>mutant</u>	A mutant form. <i>A mutant gene.</i>
mutate	(with reference to a cell, DNA molecule, etc.) undergo or cause to undergo change in a gene or genes. <i>The virus is able to mutate into new forms that are immune to the vaccine.</i>
plastically	In a plastic manner.
spoil	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>I wouldn't want to spoil your fun.</i>
transformed	Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the transformed landscape.</i>

- turn** Cause to change or turn into something different assume new characteristics.
*The water **turned** into ice.*
- twisted** (of a personality or a way of thinking) unpleasantly or unhealthily abnormal; warped.
*Many of the facts seemed **twisted** out of any semblance to reality.*
- unlovely** Without beauty or charm.
***Unlovely** tower blocks.*
- unsightly** Unpleasant to look at; ugly.
*An **unsightly** rubbish tip.*
- warped** Used especially of timbers or boards; bent out of shape usually by moisture.
***Warped** wooden planks.*
- wrench** Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench.
***Wrench** oneself free from somebody's grip.*
- wrest** A key for tuning a harp or piano.
*You appear convinced of my guilt and **wrest** every reply I have made.*
