<b>bm</b>	A euphemism for defecation.
<b>depression</b>	A period during the 1930s when there was a worldwide economic depression and mass unemployment. <i>The original shallow <b>depressions</b> were slowly converted to creeks.</i>
<a href="#"><u>desolation</u></a>	The state of being decayed or destroyed. <i>In choked <b>desolation</b> she watched him leave.</i>

<b>despair</b>	A state in which all hope is lost or absent. <i>A voice full of self hatred and <b>despair</b>.</i>
<b>despondency</b>	Low spirits from loss of hope or courage; dejection. <i>An air of <b>despondency</b>.</i>
<b><u>disappointment</u></b>	A person or thing that causes disappointment. <i>I was a big <b>disappointment</b> to her.</i>
<b>disconsolateness</b>	Feeling downcast and disheartened and hopeless.
<b><u>discouragement</u></b>	A loss of confidence or enthusiasm; dispiritedness. <i>The <b>discouragement</b> of crime.</i>
<b>dispiritedness</b>	A feeling of low spirits.
<b>dolefulness</b>	Sadness caused by grief or affliction.
<b>downheartedness</b>	A feeling of low spirits.
<b>faecal matter</b>	That which has mass and occupies space.
<b>faeces</b>	Solid excretory product evacuated from the bowels.
<b>fecal matter</b>	Some situation or event that is thought about.
<b><u>feces</u></b>	Solid excretory product evacuated from the bowels.
<b>forlornness</b>	Sadness resulting from being forsaken or abandoned.
<b>gloom</b>	An atmosphere of depression and melancholy. <i><b>Gloom</b> pervaded the office.</i>
<b>gloominess</b>	An atmosphere of depression and melancholy.
<b>glumness</b>	An atmosphere of depression and melancholy.
<b>low spirits</b>	A low level or position or degree.
<b><u>melancholy</u></b>	A humor that was once believed to be secreted by the kidneys or spleen and to cause sadness and melancholy. <i>An air of <b>melancholy</b> surrounded him.</i>
<b><u>misery</u></b>	A feeling of intense unhappiness. <i>A man who had brought her nothing but <b>misery</b>.</i>
<b>ordure</b>	Excrement; dung. <i>Can you give credence to this <b>ordure</b>.</i>
<b>sadness</b>	The quality of excessive mournfulness and uncheerfulness. <i>She tired of his perpetual <b>sadness</b>.</i>
<b><u>sorrow</u></b>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>He drank to drown his <b>sorrows</b>.</i>
<b>sorrowfulness</b>	A state of gloomy sorrow.

<b>stool</b>	(forestry) the stump of a tree that has been felled or headed for the production of saplings. <i>Fibre in the child s diet will soften the <b>stools</b>.</i>
<b>unhappiness</b>	State characterized by emotions ranging from mild discontentment to deep grief. <i>Residents expressed their <b>unhappiness</b> at the council s decision.</i>
<b>wretchedness</b>	A state of ill-being due to affliction or misfortune. <i>The grey <b>wretchedness</b> of the rain.</i>

## Associations of "Dejection" (30 Words)

<b>affliction</b>	A state of great suffering and distress due to adversity. <i>Poor people in great <b>affliction</b>.</i>
<b>agony</b>	Extreme physical or mental suffering. <i>His last <b>agony</b>.</i>
<b>anguish</b>	Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. <i>I spent the next two weeks <b>anguishing</b> about whether I d made the right decision.</i>
<b>anxiety</b>	A relatively permanent state of worry and nervousness occurring in a variety of mental disorders, usually accompanied by compulsive behavior or attacks of panic. <i>She suffered from <b>anxiety</b> attacks.</i>
<b>dejected</b>	Sad and depressed; dispirited. <i>Is <b>dejected</b> but trying to look cheerful.</i>
<b>deplorable</b>	Bad; unfortunate. <i>Her spelling was <b>deplorable</b>.</i>
<b>depression</b>	A state of depression and anhedonia so severe as to require clinical intervention. <i><b>Depression</b> of the plunger delivers two units of insulin.</i>
<b>despair</b>	A state in which all hope is lost or absent. <i>One harsh word would send her into the depths of <b>despair</b>.</i>
<b>disappoint</b>	Fail to fulfil the hopes or expectations of. <i>I have no wish to <b>disappoint</b> everyone by postponing the visit.</i>

<u>disappointment</u>	A person or thing that causes disappointment. <i>To her <b>disappointment</b> there was no chance to talk privately with Luke.</i>
<u>distraught</u>	Very worried and upset. <i><b>Distraught</b> with grief.</i>
<b>distress</b>	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>She was the classic maiden in <b>distress</b>.</i>
<b>distressed</b>	Impoverished. <i>A <b>distressed</b> leather jacket.</i>
<u>grief</u>	Something that causes great unhappiness. <i>We were too tired to cause any <b>grief</b>.</i>
<b>grieve</b>	Cause great distress to (someone). <i>His behavior <b>grieves</b> his mother.</i>
<b>heartache</b>	Intense sorrow caused by loss of a loved one (especially by death). <i>A good friend understands your <b>heartaches</b> as well as your joys.</i>
<u>miserable</u>	Of very poor quality or condition. <i>His <b>miserable</b> treatment of his family.</i>
<b>mourning</b>	Black clothes worn as an expression of sorrow when someone dies. <i>She s still in <b>mourning</b> after the death of her husband.</i>
<u>nervous</u>	Of or relating to the nervous system. <i>Those <b>nervous</b> moments before takeoff.</i>
<u>pitiful</u>	Very small or poor; inadequate. <i>A <b>pitiful</b> attempt to impress her.</i>
<b>sad</b>	Of things that make you feel sad. <i><b>Sad</b> news.</i>
<b>sadness</b>	The quality of excessive mournfulness and uncheerfulness. <i>She tired of his perpetual <b>sadness</b>.</i>
<u>sorrowful</u>	Feeling or showing grief. <i>Even in laughter the heart is <b>sorrowful</b>.</i>
<u>sorry</u>	Filled with compassion for. <i>I was <b>sorry</b> to hear about what happened to your family.</i>
<b>suffering</b>	Psychological suffering. <i>A message of hope for <b>suffering</b> humanity.</i>
<u>troubled</u>	Characterized by or indicative of distress or affliction or danger or need. <i>Fell into a <b>troubled</b> sleep.</i>
<u>uncomfortable</u>	Providing or experiencing physical discomfort. <i>An <b>uncomfortable</b> day in the hot sun.</i>

uneasy

Lacking or not affording physical or mental rest.

An **uneasy** calm.

**woe**

Great sorrow or distress (often used hyperbolically).

To add to his **woes** customers have been spending less.

**wretched**

Deserving or inciting pity.

I felt so **wretched** because I thought I might never see you again.
