The action of assigning to an inferior rank or position.
- relegation** *The team manager refuses to throw in the towel and admit that **relegation** is inevitable.*

allow	Allow or plan for a certain possibility concede the truth or validity of something. <i>She was allowed a higher profile.</i>
appellation	A name or title. <i>The city fully justifies its appellation the Pearl of the Orient.</i>
appoint	Decide the disposition of (property of which one is not the owner) under powers granted by the owner. <i>A beautifully appointed house.</i>
assign	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>It is difficult to decide whether to assign the victory to Godwin.</i>
assignment	(law) a transfer of property by deed of conveyance. <i>The first task is the assignment of an address to each datum.</i>
authorize	Give or delegate power or authority to. <i>The rock star never authorized this slanderous biography.</i>
candidate	A politician who is running for public office. <i>The Green Party candidate.</i>
caucus	Hold or form a legislative caucus. <i>Up to fifty caucuses met daily on conference grounds to discuss lobbying strategies.</i>
colonel	A commissioned military officer in the United States Army or Air Force or Marines who ranks above a lieutenant colonel and below a brigadier general.
commissioned	(of an officer in the army, navy, or air force) holding a rank conferred by a commission. <i>She was painting commissioned portraits in her late teens.</i>
commissioner	A government administrator. <i>A baseball commissioner.</i>
delegation	A group of representatives or delegates. <i>The delegation of power to the district councils.</i>
denominate	(of sums of money) be expressed in a specified monetary unit. <i>The borrowings were denominated in US dollars.</i>
deputation	A group of representatives or delegates. <i>He had been a member of a deputation to Napoleon III.</i>
deputy	A person appointed to represent or act on behalf of others. <i>His deputy has been largely running the business for the past year.</i>

<u>designate</u>	Decree or designate beforehand. <i>Certain schools are designated science schools.</i>
<u>designation</u>	The action of choosing a place for a special purpose or giving it a special status. <i>A leader s designation of his own successor.</i>
<u>empower</u>	Make (someone) stronger and more confident, especially in controlling their life and claiming their rights. <i>Movements to empower the poor.</i>
excellency	An outstanding feature; something in which something or someone excels. <i>His Excellency the Indian Consul General.</i>
glyph	A hieroglyphic character or symbol. <i>Flanges painted with esoteric glyphs.</i>
leader	The person or team that is winning a sporting competition at a particular time. <i>Nora was up among the leaders.</i>
mayor	The head of a city government.
<u>name</u>	Give a name to. <i>Specialized name brands geared to niche markets.</i>
nominate	Put forward nominate for appointment to an office or for an honor or position. <i>A day was nominated for the exchange of contracts.</i>
ordained	Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>An ordained priest.</i>
<u>permit</u>	Officially allow (someone) to do something. <i>He would not permit anybody access to the library.</i>
<u>president</u>	The head administrative officer of a college or university. <i>The Irish president.</i>
<u>qualify</u>	Make (someone) competent or knowledgeable enough to do something. <i>Qualify these remarks.</i>
represent	Be representative or typical for. <i>Santos are small wooden figures representing saints.</i>
representative	Being or characteristic of government by representation in which citizens exercise power through elected officers and representatives. <i>The new government lacked a representative assembly.</i>
