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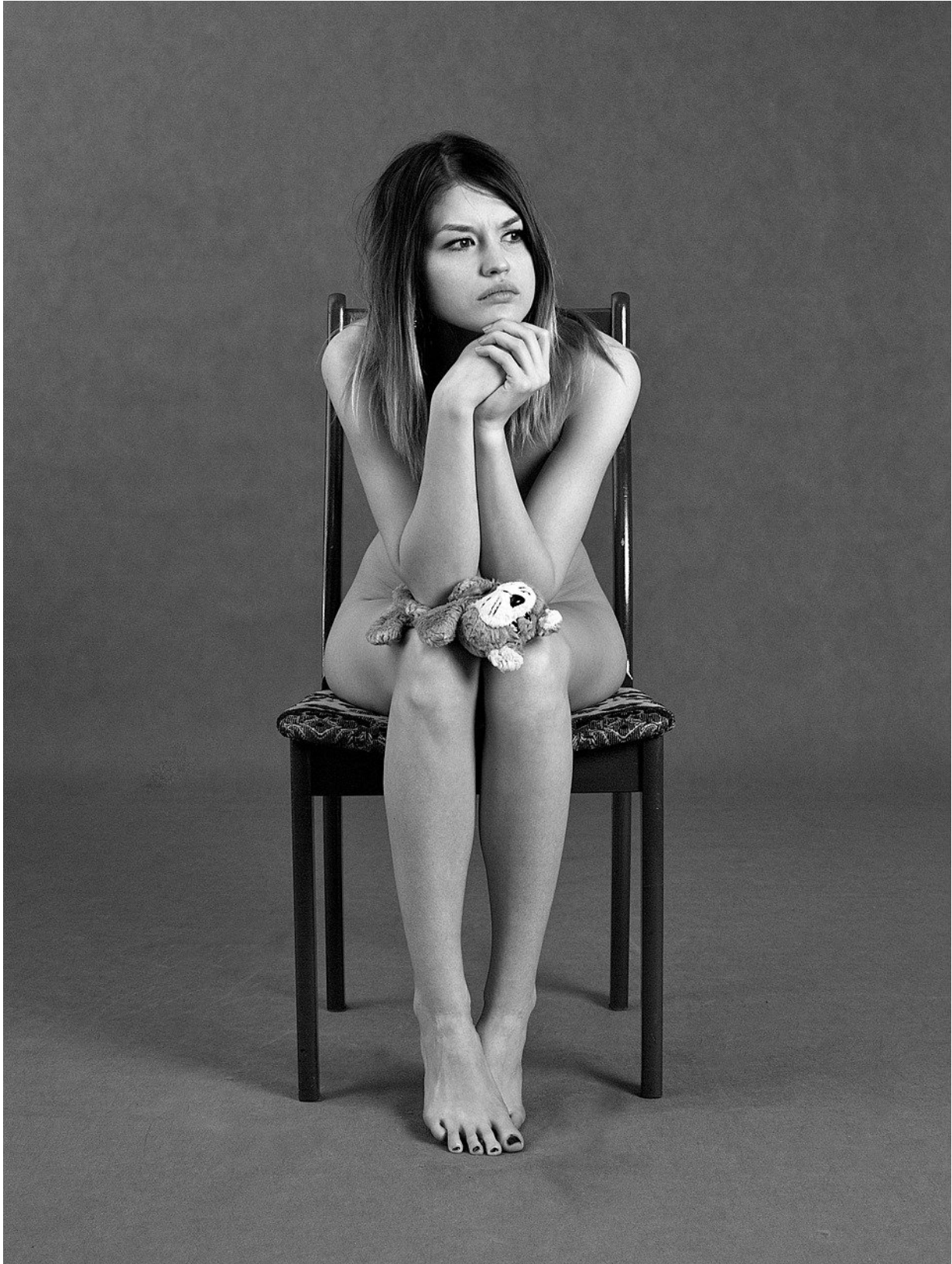

calculation	Problem solving that involves numbers or quantities. <i>Decisions are shaped by political calculations.</i>

carefulness	The quality of being careful and painstaking. <i>I admired the carefulness of his work.</i>
cogitation	The action of thinking deeply about something; contemplation. <i>After much cogitation he rejected the offer.</i>

reflection	A calm, lengthy, intent consideration. <i>He doesn t get much time for reflection.</i>
ruminantion	Regurgitation of small amounts of food; seen in some infants after feeding. <i>Ruminants have remarkable powers of ruminantion.</i>
slowness	A rate demonstrating an absence of haste or hurry. <i>Elizabeth made her way upstairs with painful slowness.</i>
steadiness	The quality of being regular, even, and continuous in development, frequency, or intensity. <i>The steadiness of his gaze.</i>
thinking	A person's ideas or opinions. <i>His thinking is reflected in his later autobiography.</i>
thought	To a small extent; somewhat. <i>Sophie sat deep in thought.</i>
unhurriedness	A rate demonstrating an absence of haste or hurry.

exactness	The quality of being accurate or correct; precision. <i>It is impossible to calculate with mathematical exactness.</i>
forethought	Judiciousness in avoiding harm or danger. <i>Jim had the forethought to book in advance.</i>
forgery	A forged document, signature, banknote, or work of art. <i>He was found guilty of forgery.</i>
intended	The person one intends to marry; one's fiancé or fiancée. <i>She used to be my intended.</i>
juror	A person taking an oath, especially one of allegiance.
mathematical	Resembling mathematics in being rigorously precise. <i>Mathematical thinking.</i>

meditative	Deeply or seriously thoughtful. <i>Meditative techniques.</i>
<u>muse</u>	The source of an artist's inspiration. <i>Euterpe was his muse.</i>
<u>ponder</u>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>I pondered the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.</i>
precaution	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>We never took precautions.</i>
premeditated	(of an action, especially a crime) thought out or planned beforehand. <i>A premeditated crime.</i>
premeditation	(law) thought and intention to commit a crime well in advance of the crime; goes to show criminal intent. <i>The defendant said there was no planning or premeditation.</i>
<u>prudent</u>	Acting with or showing care and thought for the future. <i>A prudent manager.</i>
reckon	Have faith or confidence in. <i>In college he was always reckoned among the brainiest.</i>
review	Hold a review of troops. <i>The Queen reviewed her brightly arrayed troops.</i>
<u>sabotage</u>	Deliberately destroy, damage, or obstruct (something), especially for political or military advantage. <i>A coordinated campaign of sabotage.</i>
<u>sum</u>	Be a summary of. <i>They could not afford such a sum.</i>
think	An act of thinking. <i>One should always think positive.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>How very thoughtful of you.</i>
