<b>amount</b>	Be tantamount or equivalent to. <i>The substance is harmless if taken in small <b>amounts</b>.</i>
<b>calculation</b>	A mathematical determination of the amount or number of something. <i>Finding ways of saving money involves complicated <b>calculations</b>.</i>
<b>careful</b>	Prudent in the use of something, especially money. <i><b>Careful</b> with money.</i>
<b>cautious</b>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>The plan received a <b>cautious</b> welcome.</i>
<b>compute</b>	Reckon or calculate (a figure or amount). <i>The hire charge is <b>computed</b> on a daily basis.</i>
<b>computerize</b>	Provide with computers. <i>Our office is fully <b>computerized</b> now.</i>
<b>computing</b>	The branch of engineering science that studies (with the aid of computers) computable processes and structures. <i><b>Computing</b> facilities.</i>
<b>consider</b>	Show consideration for take into account. <i>I <b>consider</b> him irresponsible.</i>
<b>counterfeit</b>	Not genuine; imitating something superior. <i><b>Counterfeit</b> emotion.</i>
<b>discreetly</b>	In an intentionally unobtrusive manner. <i>He <b>discreetly</b> inquired whether the position was still available.</i>
<b>estimate</b>	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>An <b>estimate</b> of what it would cost.</i>
<b>exactness</b>	The quality of being accurate or correct; precision. <i>He demanded <b>exactness</b> in all details.</i>
<b>forethought</b>	Careful consideration of what will be necessary or may happen in the future. <i>Jim had the <b>forethought</b> to book in advance.</i>
<b>forgery</b>	A forged document, signature, banknote, or work of art. <i>He was found guilty of <b>forgery</b>.</i>
<b>intended</b>	Planned or meant. <i>Your <b>intended</b> trip abroad.</i>
<b>juror</b>	A member of a jury.
<b>mathematical</b>	Of or pertaining to or of the nature of mathematics. <i>A <b>mathematical</b> whiz.</i>

<b>meditative</b>	Relating to or absorbed in meditation or considered thought. <i><b>Meditative</b> techniques.</i>
<u><b>muse</b></u>	(in Greek and Roman mythology) each of nine goddesses, the daughters of Zeus and Mnemosyne, who preside over the arts and sciences. <i>Euterpe was his <b>muse</b>.</i>
<u><b>ponder</b></u>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>She sat <b>pondering</b> over her problem.</i>
<b>precaution</b>	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>He put an ice pack on the injury as a <b>precaution</b>.</i>
<b>premeditated</b>	(of an action, especially a crime) thought out or planned beforehand. <i>A <b>premeditated</b> crime.</i>
<b>premeditation</b>	Planning or plotting in advance of acting. <i>The defendant said there was no planning or <b>premeditation</b>.</i>
<u><b>prudent</b></u>	Careful and sensible; marked by sound judgment. <i><b>Prudent</b> rulers.</i>
<b>reckon</b>	Include someone or something in (a class or group). <i>I don't <b>reckon</b> his chances.</i>
<b>review</b>	Hold a review of troops. <i>I <b>reviewed</b> his first novel.</i>
<u><b>sabotage</b></u>	A deliberate act of destruction or disruption in which equipment is damaged. <i>Power lines from South Africa were <b>sabotaged</b> by rebel forces.</i>
<u><b>sum</b></u>	Be a summary of. <i>The <b>sum</b> of his own knowledge.</i>
<b>think</b>	An instance of deliberate thinking. <i>Just <b>think</b> you could be rich one day.</i>
<b>thoughtful</b>	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>A deeply <b>thoughtful</b> essay.</i>
