airiness	The property of something spacious and abounding in fresh air.
daintiness	Any of numerous composite plants having flower heads with well-developed ray flowers usually arranged in a single whorl. <i>The daintiness of her touch.</i>
<u>dainty</u>	Something considered choice to eat. <i>Home-made breads, jams, and dainties.</i>
diplomacy	Negotiation between nations. <i>With perfect diplomacy he divided his attention between Meryl and Anthea.</i>
discreetness	Knowing how to avoid embarrassment or distress.
<u>discretion</u>	The trait of judging wisely and objectively. <i>I ll be the soul of discretion.</i>
fineness	The property of being very narrow or thin. <i>He marvelled at the fineness of her hair.</i>
finesse	Great subtlety and tact in handling or manipulating people or difficult situations. <i>Clients want advice and action that calls for considerable finesse.</i>
fragility	Quality of being easily damaged or destroyed. <i>Osteoporosis is characterized by bone fragility.</i>
goody	Something considered choice to eat.
kickshaw	An elegant but insubstantial trinket.
slightness	The quality of being unimportant and petty or frivolous.
treat	An act of treating someone to something. <i>My treat he insisted reaching for the bill.</i>

breakable	An article that is fragile and easily broken. <i>An encrypted password isn't easily breakable.</i>
brittle	A brittle sweet made from nuts and set melted sugar. <i>Brittle bones.</i>
caustic	A caustic substance. <i>Caustic jokes about political assassination talk show hosts and medical ethics.</i>
dainty	Affectedly dainty or refined. <i>A dainty morsel.</i>
delicate	A delicate fabric or garment. <i>A delicate violin passage.</i>
effeminacy	The trait of being effeminate (derogatory of a man). <i>The students associated science with masculinity and arts with effeminacy.</i>

emaciation	The state of being abnormally thin or weak. <i>Thin to the point of emaciation.</i>
feeble	Lacking strength or vigor. <i>Feeble efforts.</i>
femininity	The trait of behaving in ways considered typical for women. <i>She alternated between embracing her femininity and concealing it.</i>
fragile	Easily destroyed or threatened. <i>A fragile claim to fame.</i>
fragility	The quality of being easily broken or damaged. <i>A film about the fragility of relationships.</i>
frailty	Weakness in character or morals. <i>All drama begins with human frailty.</i>
friable	Easily crumbled. <i>Friable curds formed in the stomach.</i>
graceful	Suggesting taste, ease, and wealth. <i>She was a tall girl slender and graceful.</i>
infirm	(of a person or their judgement) weak; irresolute. <i>Elderly and infirm people.</i>
infirmity	The state of being weak in health or body (especially from old age). <i>Old age and infirmity come to men and women alike.</i>
particulate	Matter in the form of minute separate particles. <i>Particulate pollution.</i>
sensitiveness	(physiology) responsiveness to external stimuli; the faculty of sensation. <i>The sensitiveness of Mimosa leaves does not depend on a change of growth.</i>
sensitivity	Sensitivity to emotional feelings of self and others. <i>A total lack of common decency and sensitivity.</i>
sensitization	The state of being sensitive (as to an antigen). <i>Too much silver nitrate would cause improper sensitization of the plates placed in it.</i>
sensitize	Cause to sense; make sensitive. <i>Long term exposure to this medicine may sensitize you to the allergen.</i>
softness	The property of giving little resistance to pressure and being easily cut or molded. <i>Sales suffered from softness.</i>

- susceptibility** The state or fact of being likely or liable to be influenced or harmed by a particular thing.
*Lack of exercise increases **susceptibility** to disease.*
- tender** Make a tender of in legal settlements.
***Tender** green beans.*
- ticklish** (of a cough) characterized by persistent irritation in the throat.
*Hesitates to be explicit on so **ticklish** a matter.*
- touchy** (of an issue or situation) requiring careful handling; delicate.
*The monarchy has become a **touchy** topic.*
- vulnerable** Capable of being wounded or hurt.
*Small fish are **vulnerable** to predators.*
- weak** Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin.
*The central government had grown too **weak** to impose order.*
- weakly** Lacking bodily or muscular strength or vitality.
*If the lambs were **weakly** we had to feed them by hand.*
- weakness** A flaw or weak point.
*You re his one **weakness** he should never have met you.*
