<b>babbling</b>	(of flowing water) making a continuous murmuring sound. <i>A gently <b>babbling</b> brook.</i>
<a href="#">ecstatic</a>	Feeling great rapture or delight. <i><b>Ecstatic</b> fans filled the stadium.</i>

<b>elated</b>	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>The <b>elated</b> winner.</i>
<b><u>euphoric</u></b>	Characterized by or feeling intense excitement and happiness. <i>A <b>euphoric</b> sense of freedom.</i>
<b>excited</b>	In an aroused state. <i>They were <b>excited</b> about the prospect.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b><u>feverish</u></b>	Having or affected by a fever. <i>A <b>feverish</b> cold.</i>
<b><u>frantic</u></b>	Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion. <i>Something <b>frantic</b> in their gaiety.</i>
<b>frenzied</b>	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>The prosecutor's <b>frenzied</b> denunciation of the accused.</i>
<b>hallucinating</b>	Experiencing delirium.
<b><u>hysterical</u></b>	Characterized by or arising from psychoneurotic hysteria- Morris Fishbein. <i>Janet became <b>hysterical</b> and began screaming.</i>
<b>in a frenzy of delight</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>in raptures</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>in seventh heaven</b>	Holding office.
<b>in transports of delight</b>	Holding office.
<b><u>incoherent</u></b>	(of a person) unable to speak intelligibly. <i><b>Incoherent</b> with grief.</i>
<b><u>irrational</u></b>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i><b>Irrational</b> feelings of hostility.</i>
<b>jubilant</b>	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
<b>mad</b>	Affected with madness or insanity. <i>Another myth is that Scorpios are sex <b>mad</b>.</i>
<b><u>overjoyed</u></b>	Extremely happy. <i>All of them were <b>overjoyed</b> at my success.</i>

<b>rapturous</b>	Feeling great rapture or delight. <i>He was greeted with <b>rapturous</b> applause.</i>
<b>raving</b>	Used to emphasize a particular quality. <i>Have you gone <b>raving</b> mad.</i>
<b>thrilled</b>	Feeling intense pleasurable excitement.
<b>unrestrained</b>	Not subject to restraint. <i><b>Unrestrained</b> laughter.</i>
<b>walking on air</b>	Close enough to be walked to.
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>Performing in Hollywood was beyond my <b>wildest</b> dreams.</i>
<b>wild with excitement</b>	In a state of extreme emotion.

## Associations of "Delirious" (30 Words)

<b>afflicted</b>	Mentally or physically unfit.
<b>ailing</b>	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. <i>My poor <b>ailing</b> grandmother.</i>
<b>bedridden</b>	Confined to bed (by illness).
<b>bilious</b>	Suffering from or suggesting a liver disorder or gastric distress. <i>A <b>bilious</b> attack.</i>
<b>catching</b>	The act of detecting something catching sight of something. <i>Her enthusiasm is <b>catching</b>.</i>
<b>consumptive</b>	A person with pulmonary tuberculosis. <i>From birth he was sickly and <b>consumptive</b>.</i>
<b>convalescent</b>	(of a person) recovering from an illness or medical treatment. <i><b>Convalescent</b> children are difficult to keep in bed.</i>
<b>delayed</b>	Not as far along as normal in development.
<b>dizzy</b>	Make dizzy or giddy. <i>He looked around <b>dizzy</b> with happiness.</i>
<b>dyspeptic</b>	Having indigestion or a consequent air of irritable bad temper.

<b>embolism</b>	Obstruction of an artery, typically by a clot of blood or an air bubble. <i>One patient died of a pulmonary <b>embolism</b>.</i>
<b>giddy</b>	Disorientating and alarming, but exciting. <i>Her <b>giddy</b> rise to power.</i>
<b><u>hysterical</u></b>	Extremely funny. <b><i>Hysterical</i></b> amnesia.
<b><u>ill</u></b>	Ill is often used as a combining form in a poor or improper or unsatisfactory manner not well. <i>It <b>ill</b> befits a man to betray old friends.</i>
<b>indisposed</b>	Strongly opposed. <i>Clearly <b>indisposed</b> to grant their request.</i>
<b>mad</b>	Make someone mad. <i>I got <b>mad</b> respect for him.</i>
<b>malingering</b>	Avoid responsibilities and duties, e.g., by pretending to be ill. <i>People who had psychosomatic complaints were probably <b>malingering</b>.</i>
<b>nauseous</b>	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>The smell was <b>nauseous</b>.</i>
<b>pallid</b>	Lacking in vitality or interest or effectiveness. <i>A <b>pallid</b> ray of winter sun.</i>
<b><u>paralyzed</u></b>	Affected with paralysis.
<b>pathological</b>	Of or relating to the practice of pathology. <b><i>Pathological</i></b> laboratory.
<b><u>poorly</u></b>	(`ill' is often used as a combining form) in a poor or improper or unsatisfactory manner; not well. <i>Feeling <b>poorly</b>.</i>
<b>sallow</b>	Cause to become sallow. <i>The illness has <b>sallowed</b> her face.</i>
<b>seedy</b>	Shabby and squalid. <i>He was soiled and <b>seedy</b> and fragrant with gin.</i>
<b>sick</b>	People who are sick. <i>He looked pretty <b>sick</b> at that but he eventually agreed.</i>
<b><u>unbridled</u></b>	Not restrained or controlled. <b><i>Unbridled</i></b> lust.
<b><u>unhealthy</u></b>	Not conducive to good health. <i>An <b>unhealthy</b> obsession with fast cars.</i>
<b><u>unrestrained</u></b>	Not subject to restraint. <b><i>Unrestrained</i></b> laughter.
