## Synonyms of "Deliverance" as a noun (15 Words)

<b>announcement</b>	The action of making an announcement. <i>An <b>announcement</b> is appearing in the Morning Post tomorrow.</i>
<b><u>declaration</u></b>	A formal expression by a meeting; agreed to by a vote. <i>His <b>declaration</b> of innocence.</i>
<b>delivery</b>	Your characteristic style or manner of expressing yourself orally. <i>Injuries sustained during <b>delivery</b>.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	A substance that has been discharged. <i>The <b>discharge</b> of pus.</i>
<b>emancipation</b>	The fact or process of being set free from legal, social, or political restrictions; liberation. <i>The early struggle for <b>emancipation</b> from slavery.</i>
<b>freeing</b>	The act of liberating someone or something.
<b><u>liberation</u></b>	Freedom from limits on thought or behaviour. <i>She worked for women s <b>liberation</b>.</i>
<b><u>proclamation</u></b>	A formal public statement. <i>The issuing by the monarch of a <b>proclamation</b> dissolving Parliament.</i>
<b>pronouncement</b>	A formal or authoritative announcement or declaration. <i>Distrust of the <b>pronouncements</b> of politicians was endemic.</i>

<b>ransom</b>	The holding or freeing of a captive in return for payment of a ransom. <i>The kidnappers demanded a <b>ransom</b>.</i>
<b>release</b>	A device that when pressed will release part of a mechanism. <i>A new <b>release</b> from the London Symphony Orchestra.</i>
<b>rescue</b>	Denoting or relating to a domestic animal that has been removed from a situation of abuse or neglect by a welfare organization. <i>The dramatic <b>rescue</b> of nine trapped coal miners.</i>
<b>saving</b>	The money one has saved, especially through a bank or official scheme. <i>The agents were cheating them out of their life <b>savings</b>.</i>
<b>statement</b>	(in the UK) an official assessment made by a local education authority concerning a child's special educational needs. <i>This is correct as a <b>statement</b> of fact.</i>
<b>utterance</b>	An uninterrupted chain of spoken or written language. <i>He whispered as if to lend his <b>utterances</b> an added confidentiality.</i>

## Associations of "Deliverance" (30 Words)

<b><u>ambulance</u></b>	Convey in an ambulance. <i>We called an <b>ambulance</b>.</i>
<b>atonement</b>	Compensation for a wrong. <i>An annual ceremony of confession and <b>atonement</b> for sin.</i>
<b><u>crisis</u></b>	The turning point of a disease when an important change takes place, indicating either recovery or death. <i>They went bankrupt during the economic <b>crisis</b>.</i>
<b>danger</b>	A dangerous place. <i>He feared the <b>dangers</b> of traveling by air.</i>
<b>deliver</b>	Deliver a speech oration or idea. <i>The pitcher <b>delivered</b> the ball.</i>
<b>depositor</b>	A person who has deposited money in a bank or similar institution.
<b>economical</b>	(of a person or lifestyle) careful not to waste money or resources. <i>Aspects of social political and <b>economical</b> life.</i>
<b>financial</b>	The finances or financial situation of an organization or individual. <i>At the end of the year fund managers sell their worst performing stocks and <b>financials</b> have fared badly this year.</i>
<b>frugal</b>	Simple and plain and costing little. <i>A <b>frugal</b> farmer.</i>
<b>help</b>	A person or thing that helps. <i>She has taught herself to cook since the defection of the last of the village <b>helps</b>.</i>
<b>hostage</b>	A person seized or held as security for the fulfilment of a condition. <i>Three <b>hostages</b> were released but only after their families paid an estimated 200 000 to the guerrillas.</i>
<b>lifeboat</b>	A small boat kept on a ship for use in emergency, typically one of a number on deck or suspended from davits.
<b>lifeguard</b>	An attendant employed at a beach or pool to protect swimmers from accidents.

<b>lifesaver</b>	A lifeguard working on a beach. <i>A microwave could be a <b>lifesaver</b> this Christmas.</i>
<b>parsimony</b>	Extreme unwillingness to spend money or use resources. <i>A great tradition of public design has been shattered by government <b>parsimony</b>.</i>
<b>passbook</b>	A record of deposits and withdrawals and interest held by depositors at certain banks.
<b>redemption</b>	The act of purchasing back something previously sold. <i>Serfs began paying <b>redemption</b> dues.</i>
<b>redemptive</b>	Of or relating to or resulting in redemption- E.K.Brown. <i>The healing power of <b>redemptive</b> love.</i>
<b>rescue</b>	Denoting the emergency excavation of archaeological sites threatened by imminent building or road development. <i>The dramatic <b>rescue</b> of nine trapped coal miners.</i>
<b>salvage</b>	Payment made or due to a person who has saved a ship or its cargo. <i>It was the only crumb of comfort he could <b>salvage</b> from the ordeal.</i>
<b>salvation</b>	Deliverance from sin and its consequences, believed by Christians to be brought about by faith in Christ. <i>They turned to individualism as their <b>salvation</b>.</i>
<b>save</b>	Save from sins. <i>I'll <b>save</b> you the trouble.</i>
<b>saving</b>	Characterized by thriftiness. <i>This resulted in a considerable <b>saving</b> in development costs.</i>
<b>scrimp</b>	Be thrifty or parsimonious; economize. <i>Scratch and <b>scrimp</b>.</i>
<b>skimp</b>	A fashionably short or revealing garment. <i>She wore a yellow <b>skimp</b>.</i>
<b>sparing</b>	Avoiding waste. <i>Physicians advised <b>sparing</b> use of the ointment.</i>
<b>sparingly</b>	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used <b>sparingly</b>.</i>
<b>stinginess</b>	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
<b>survivor</b>	A person who survives, especially a person remaining alive after an event in which others have died. <i>The <b>survivors</b> of the fire were taken to a hospital.</i>
<b>thrifty</b>	Using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully. <i>He had been brought up to be <b>thrifty</b> and careful.</i>
